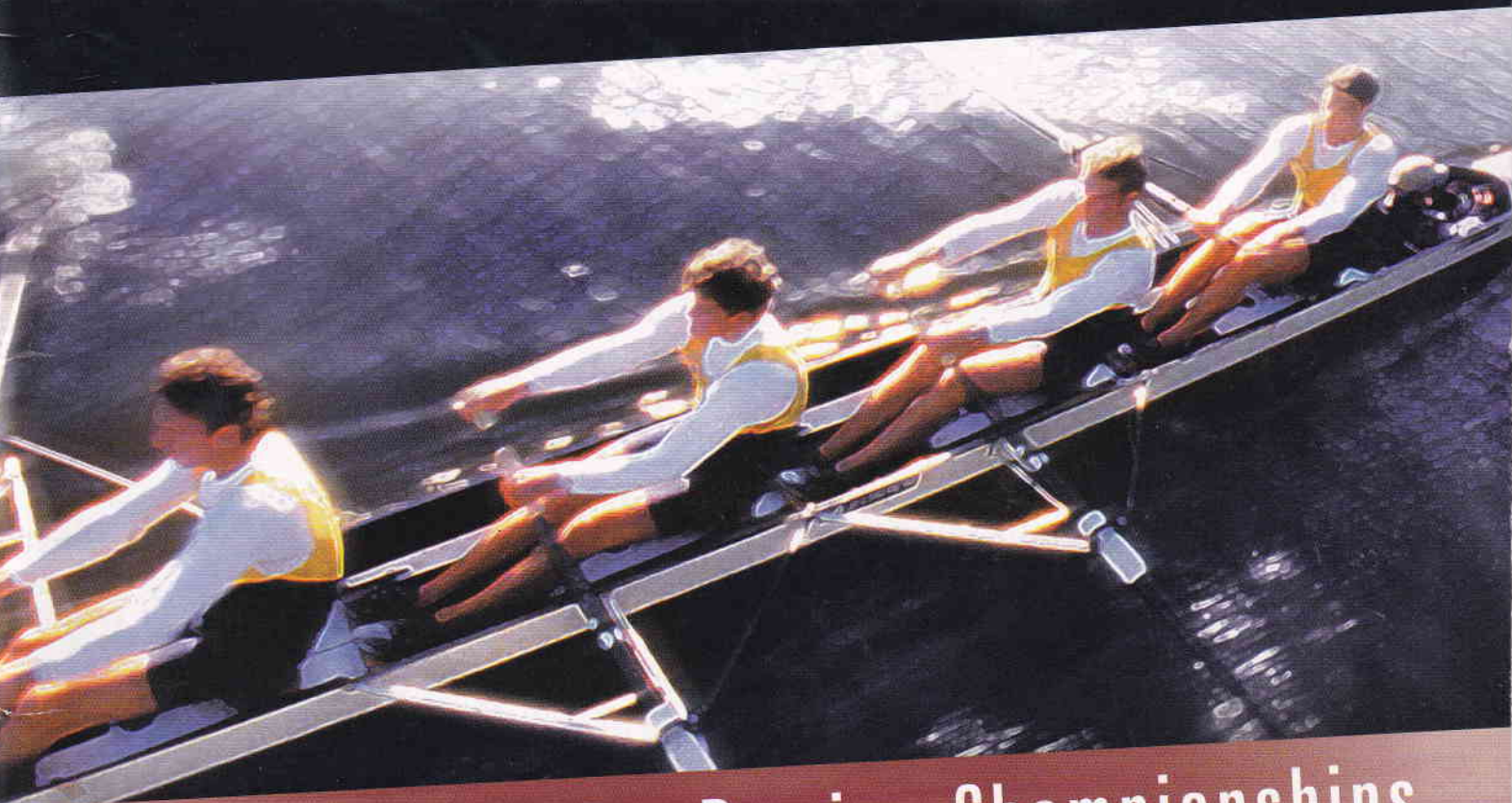
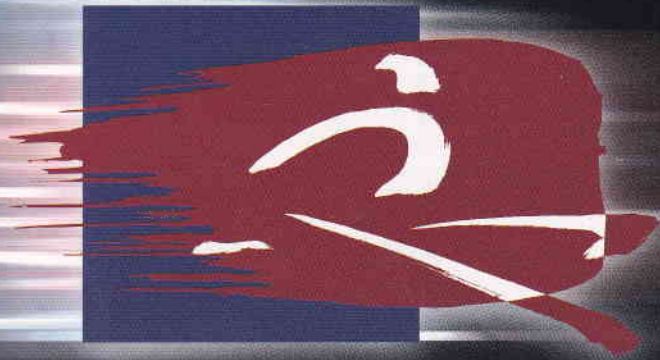

Rowing Australia

Rowing Australia (RA) is the governing body of one of Australia's most successful sports. Its growing participation rates show equal numbers of men and women joining the sport. Rowing's gains in popularity within Australia have included an increase in spectators at recent events. Coverage of a special TV documentary of the 1998 World Rowing Championships held in Cologne, Germany (an event at which the Australian team performed very well – winning two gold, one silver and two bronze medals) attracted approximately 250,000 viewers nationwide.

With links to approximately 140 rowing clubs and 140 rowing schools nationwide, and plans for the integration of the sport fully through Australia's private and public school systems, Rowing Australia is well on the way to 'taking the sport to the people'.

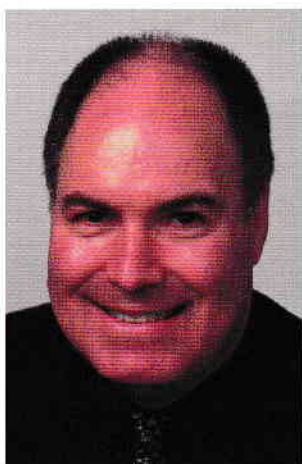
The Governor General's trophy was introduced in 1998 for presentation to the champion crew for the Interstate Women's Coxed Eight race.

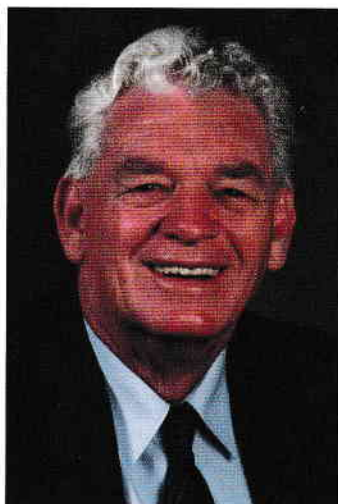
You may also care to take advantage of other action orientated activities located within the region.

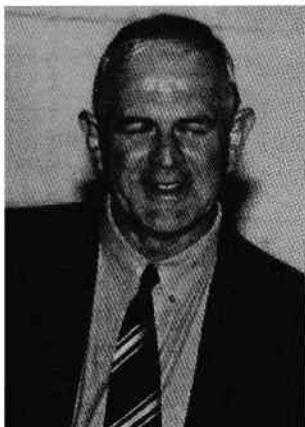

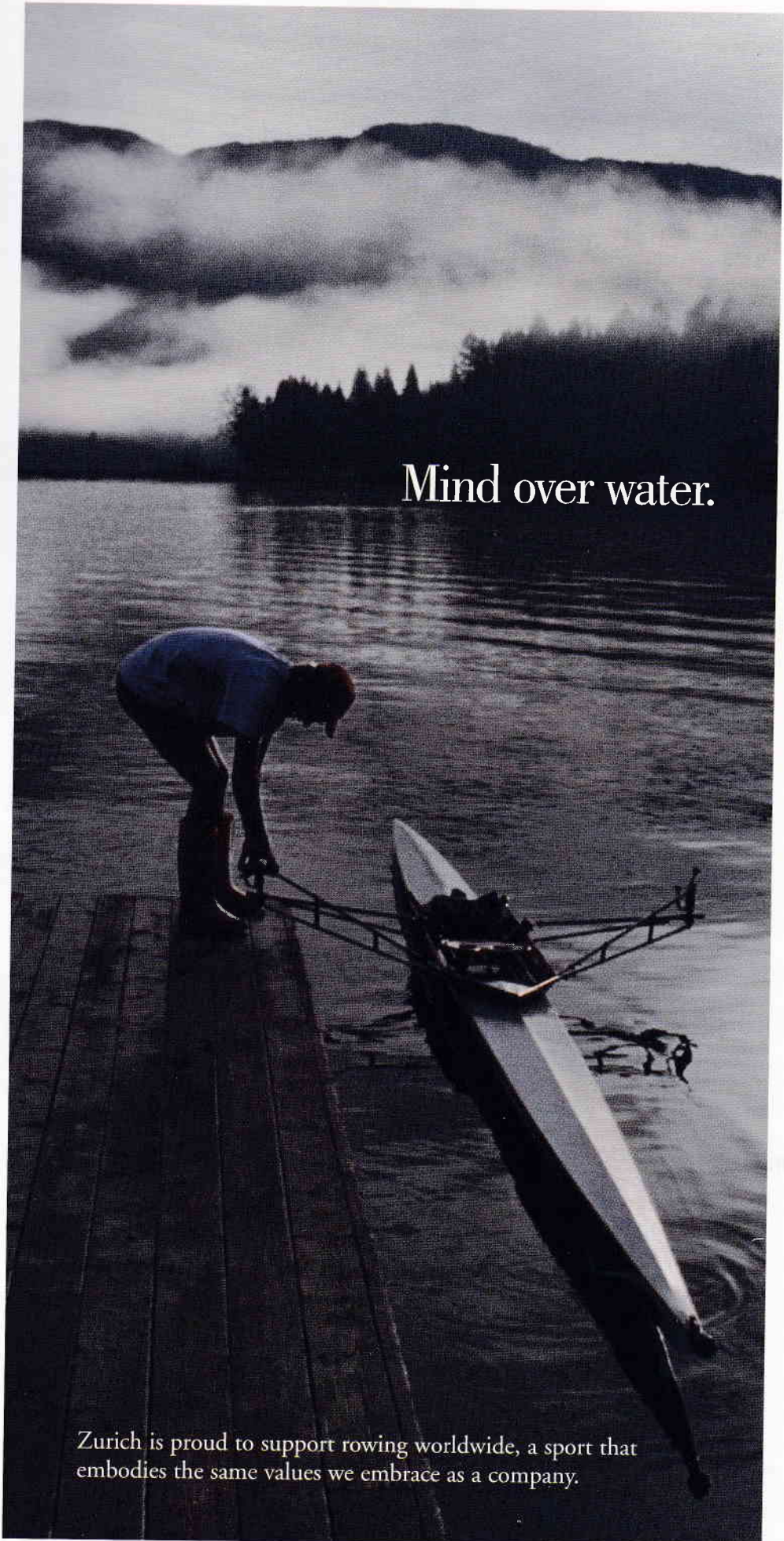

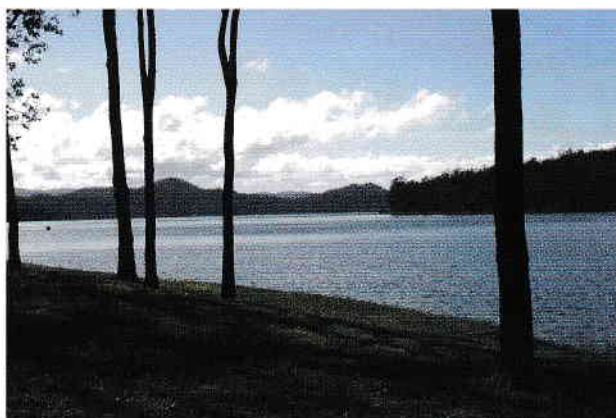

Welcome to Sheepstation Inlet



Sheepstation Inlet rowing course is a multi-purpose recreation and rowing course area developed in partnership between SEQWater and Rowing Queensland.

SEQWater is:

- The successor to the South East Queensland Water Board, whose assets and business were acquired on 17 March 2000, pursuant to a Sale of Business Agreement entered into on 20 September 1999;
- Owned by the Queensland Government (20%); Brisbane City Council (45%); and 11 other Local Governments in south-east Queensland (35%);
- The major supplier of untreated water in bulk to Local Governments in the south-east Queensland region, through ownership of Wivenhoe, Somerset and North Pine Dams;
- Committed to providing quality products to its customers in an efficient and competitive environment;
- A company which is responsive to the needs and expectations of its customers; and
- An environmentally-aware company, which actively supports the principles of ecologically sustainable development.

SEQWater's Charter and Functions

SEQWater's charter is to "engage in the business of conservation, storage, distribution, treatment and supply of water in south-east Queensland". Within the context of this charter, SEQWater's major current functions are:

- Ownership and management of dams to conserve and store water.
- Sale of untreated water in bulk to Local Governments, and to industry.

- Management and operation of the dams to mitigate, to the extent practicable, the effects of river flooding upstream and downstream of the dam.
- Taking measures to ensure and maintain the quality of present water supplies.
- Administration and management of property owned by SEQWater which is located at and around its dams.
- Provision of recreational facilities at its dams to manage public access and minimise impact on water quality.

Recreation Services

Although SEQWater's core business is water supply, it provides a limited range of recreational facilities so that public access to its lakes is managed to minimise the effects on water quality from recreational activities, and from the concentration of people.

As a consequence, Lakes Wivenhoe, Somerset and Samsonvale, and their environs have come to represent an important regional recreational and tourist resource for south-east Queensland. Their locations, within easy driving distance of the major population centres of south-east Queensland, combined with the diversity of opportunities available, make them a popular recreational destination, with about 1.5 million visitors per year. SEQWater provides a variety of facilities for recreational visitors within its financial constraints.

Lake Wivenhoe, the largest of SEQWater's dams, provides a focus for quiet and relaxed land and water-based family-style recreation. Only non-fuel powered boats are permitted on Lake Wivenhoe.

Lake Somerset enjoys a regional reputation as being the premier freshwater motorised water sports venue, and one of the best freshwater fishing destinations in south-east Queensland. Fuel-powered boats are permitted on Lake Somerset.

Lake Samsonvale is the smallest of SEQWater's three lakes, and enjoys increasing popularity as a rural/urban lakeside park, in a relatively quiet natural setting. Sailing, rowing and canoeing are the only permitted water sports on the lake, via membership of the Lake Samsonvale Water Sports Association.

Behind the Sydney Olympic Rowing Team

It is Tuesday 3rd October 2000, 48 hours after the closing of the greatest event in Australia's history. The whole Australian Olympic Team has just taken part in the Sydney Celebration street parade. Our Rowing Team is one of the biggest. We have all been overcome with emotion, largely due to the huge crowd that packed the streets; up to 300,000 cheering the route from the Sydney Opera House to the Town Hall. As a Team and a nation we are still celebrating the success and victory for Australia of our Home Olympics.

During the past 48 hours the Team was kept busy. We had the celebration dinner the night before. The Rowers were the ones who decided to hoist the Prime Minister and crowd-surf him, much to the joy of the audience and with little concern from the PM's bodyguards. But now our home Olympics are over. Most team members will return to their home states for more street parades and catch-ups with family, friends, partners and others. The medallists have been given the opportunity to travel to each state if they wish.

It is a time to say farewell. There are tears and hugs and kisses. We have spent months and, in some cases, years with our Team members chasing the dream to perform at our best in front of our home crowd, at our Olympics. It is probably more time than we've spent with anyone else and it is now finished. We now realise what we have just been a part of.

The Sydney Olympic campaign was a long campaign for everyone. As Team members, we all experienced the mixed emotions of being at the forefront of the biggest global event to be staged in our country's history. From Sally Robbins, the youngest member of the Rowing Team, who only finalised her position in the team a few weeks before the Opening Ceremony, right through to the Chef de Mission, the 'boss', John Coates who started his sports career as a coxswain for Homebush Boys High. We have all been through the highs and lows.

The rowing campaign started in earnest a little over 12 months out from the Games, at the 1999 World Championships in St Catherines, Canada. Under the Olympic qualifying rules, all countries must initially qualify at the World Championships preceding the Olympics. Rowing, unlike many other Olympic sports, makes no exceptions for the home country. If our crews did not qualify at St Catherines, their only other chance was in Lucerne, Switzerland, shortly before the Games. A crew that qualified in Lucerne could not be changed at the Olympics. So it was imperative that as many crews as possible qualified at St Catherines 13 months before the Olympics.

The Australian Team had a very good 1999 World Championships. Of the 14 boats attempting qualification,



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11 finished with the desired result. Victory came with ease for James Tomkins and Drew Ginn in the Pairs, a 3rd Olympic gold too seemed achievable for "Jazz". The new look Men's Four that replaced the Oarsome Foursome finished a close second to the Great Britain Four; that combination's Steven Redgrave would be aiming for his 5th gold medal in Sydney. Also picking up silver medals were the Men's Lightweight Four and Lightweight Double Scull. Bronze medals were won by Kate Slatter who would be defending her 1996 Olympic Gold medal, with new partner Rachel Taylor. The Men's Quad and Women's Lightweight Double Scull also won bronze medals.

But the 1999 Worlds was all about qualifying for our home Olympics and at the end of the regatta the Men's and Women's Eights had qualified as well as the Women's Double and Single. Eleven of the 14 crews had qualified. Trying to qualify shortly before the Olympics were the Women's Quad, Men's Double Scull and Men's Single Scull. One of the most important aspects of our pre-Olympic competition, the qualification of boats, was achieved. There were high expectations of the Rowing Team for the Olympics.

It was made clear through the selection policy that no crew would be pre-selected following the 1999 World Championships. All rowers would have to partake in the selection process. This included attending training camps and selection regattas. There would however be an early chance given to any crews that won a medal at the World Championships to be nominated for selection if they won at the 2000 Zurich National Championships.

With the selection of the Olympic Team not finalised until early August, trialing and making the Team was stressful for all concerned. It could be said that perhaps current 'real life' television shows such as 'Survivor' were conceived from Olympic Selection.

Following a series of long distance trials and other testing, a squad of approximately double the final Team assembled at the AIS in Canberra in January, nine months before the Olympics. The feeling in the Team was very positive. Co-operation and focus were the key words. Co-operation and teamwork made the camp a success. The only negative about the camp was that the squad knew that not all would be racing in Sydney in September. As well as rowing many kilometres, there was various testing as well as training in such things as media skills. The whole squad enjoyed the Rower of the Year and rounded the night off with the singing of Advance Australia Fair. Some excellent rowing was done with rowers mixing and matching in a variety of boats.

The next major selection process for the Team was the Zurich Australian Championships in March, on the Olympic course. It would be at this Regatta that the crews that won a medal at 1999 World Championships would have an early chance to be nominated for selection. It was however between the January camp and the Australian Championships that a major setback occurred with the Team's preparation. Drew Ginn suffered a major back injury. Drew, who had so comfortably fitted into the Oarsome Foursome before Atlanta, now had a major question mark as to whether he would be fit for the Olympics.

James Tomkins and Drew Ginn, who had so easily won the previous World Championship in the Pair and were looking hot favourites for the gold medal, were unable to row. Drew's injury would not allow them to race at the National Championships, making their selection impossible at the Championships. Everybody hoped Drew's back would be Okay.

The Zurich 2000 Championships had some great racing and were a real test for the Olympics in September. The first crew that showed they were ready was the pair of Kate Slatter and Rachel Taylor. On a sunny and calm Thursday afternoon, Kate and Rachel crossed the line and the smiles on their faces showed it all. They were the first crew nominated for selection and, on form, were a strong medal chance.

One race that drew much attention was the Men's Pair. The two Pair combinations of Bo Hanson and Ben Dodwell, and Geoff and James Stewart, formed the coxless four that won silver at the World Championships. To be nominated for selection at the National Championships as well as winning the four, they would be required to be placed first and second in the pair. This was the case for all big boats, Men's Quad, Men's Lightweight Four and Lightweight Double and the Women's Lightweight Double.

Also racing in the Pair were Dave Weightman and Rob Scott who had shown dramatic improvement over previous months. Scott and Weightman had been quiet since their silver medal in Atlanta but now desperately wanted to race the boat and go one better in Sydney. As they had done in 1996, they won the event and the selection of the Men's Sweep was wide open. It also gave a time for the injured Ginn to recover.

The following day the quiet boys of the squad, the Men's Lightweight Four, won their final. By coming first and second in various Pair combinations and then winning the Four, the Lightweight Four had gained selection. The crew that had been training in isolation in southern Tasmania now firmly

had their sights set on the Olympics. Also gaining selection from the Championships were the two Lightweight Double Sculls of Hamish Karrasch and Bruce Hick, and Virginia Lee and Sally Newmarch. With four crews now selected, the other squad members would have to return to the Olympic course in four weeks for more trials.

At the second selection regatta, Drew Ginn was still unable to race. If Scott and Weightman were to win they would have a strong case for selection in the Pair. However the race was won by Bo Hanson and Ben Dodwell with Geoff and James Stewart second. Scott and Weightman finished third. If Hanson, Dodwell and the two Stewarts could win the Four, they would earn the right for selection.

With the Oarsome Foursome taking out two back-to-back gold medals, the coxless four has become Australian rowing's flagship. The Four race generates huge media interest. However Dodwell, Hanson and the two Stewarts were pushed for most of the race and managed to win by a length. The selection of the Four was now complete and Hanson, Dodwell and the two Stewarts could now firmly focus on September. Two other crews were selected, the Women's Double Scull of Marina Hatzakis and Bronwyn

Roye as well as the Women's Single Scull of Georgina Douglas.

The final selection regatta was held in May, again at the Olympic course. The Men's and Women's Eights were finalised along with the crews that had not yet qualified for the Olympics; the Women's Quad, Men's Double and Single. With the selection of Peter Antonie in the Double Scull, much interest had been generated. At 42 and with 23 years of International Competition, "Ants" was aiming to qualify the boat he had won a gold medal in with Steve Hawkins in 1992.

The only crew that had not been finalised was the Men's Pair, our best gold medal chance. It was decided that Scott and Weightman would travel with the Australian Team to Europe. Ginn's back was improving and the doctors advised he should be able to race in Europe. It was decided that whichever pair won the Lucerne leg of the World Cup would gain the right to race at the Olympics.

The Australian Team left for Europe on 15 June for six weeks. It would be an important stage of the preparation. They would be racing the very same crews they would be racing at the Olympics. The two major regattas were the two Zurich World Cups to be held in Vienna and Lucerne. The qualifying

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regatta for the Women's Quad, Men's Double and Single was to be held a few days before the Lucerne World Cup.

The Team got off to a very good start at the Vienna World Cup. Nearly every crew made the final. The Women's Eight finished an encouraging 3rd, the Men's Eight finished a very creditable 2nd behind Great Britain. The Women's Pair of Slatter and Taylor had a very good win, but the most encouraging thing of the regatta was the return of Drew Ginn with James Tomkins. In their first race since the 1999 Worlds, they came from behind to beat the Italian crew home. Scott and Weightman were also in the race and finished 6th.

Following the Vienna World Cup, the Team split into various training squads. The Men's Four, Eight and Quad travelled to the famous Henley Regatta in England. The Men's Eight won the Grand Challenge Cup, reversing the finishing order of Vienna.

One of the major objectives of the European Tour was to qualify the three remaining boats, the Women's Quad and Men's Double and Single. They all had tough calls. The Women's Quad was required to finish 1st, the Men's Double at least 2nd and Tom Laurich in the Single at least 3rd. All put up great shows but unfortunately missed the cut. It was devastating for all concerned. The Women's Quad for

example were beaten by just 0.42 seconds.

As the three crews drowned their sorrows, Team Management successfully argued that, owing to other withdrawals and that the Women's Quad was the closest crew, they should be included. FISA announced that the Australians Women's Quad would race at the Olympics. The only problem was that they could not find some members of the Quad to tell them. Thinking they had missed the Olympics, they were eventually found and told the great news. Despair turned to joy.

The Lucerne Regatta is always the best regatta of the European season. It would give the best indication of form for the Olympics. But, for Australia, it was the race off for the pair between Tomkins and Ginn, and Scott and Weightman. As Tomkins and Ginn warmed up for the heat, the worst happened. Ginn's back gave in. They returned to the pontoon, where both Tomkins and Ginn were visibly upset. Their coach, Noel Donaldson, quickly called in reserve Matt Long to take Drew's place. Long filled in perfectly and, under extreme pressure, Tomkins and Long won their heat. But Heat 2 was won by Scott and Weightman in a faster time.

In the final, Tomkins and Long won convincingly, with Scott and Weightman 10 seconds behind. Tomkins and Long could now make claim to the pair. Tomkins said it

was the most emotional weekend of his life, with his mate forced out of the Olympics, then turning around and winning with a new partner.

There were also some other excellent results from Lucerne. As with Vienna, the majority of crews reached the final. The Women's Pair finished a close 2nd. The Men's four showed that they would be a force to be reckoned with, finishing third. But the upset was that Redgrave's British four could only manage 4th. It was the two Eights that had a great regatta. The Women's Eight had a podium finish, collecting a bronze medal, and the men finished 0.3 seconds behind the British for the silver.

With the European Tour finished, Australia had 12 crews qualified, bettered only by the USA with 14 qualified crews. Expectations were very high.

With just four weeks to the Olympics the final Team assembled in Penrith for a two week camp, which was to be followed by a two week camp in Bundaberg Queensland before returning to Sydney for the Olympics.

The two week camp in Penrith was a busy affair: the Olympics were starting to gain momentum. There was some excellent rowing done on home turf and it was good to be all back together again after Europe and with one goal in mind.

The Team was officially announced before a large media contingent. As well as the rowers, the Team included a coach for each crew, a head coach, a manager and assistant manager, a doctor, a psychologist, two physiotherapists, a masseur, a boatman, an athlete liaison officer and a press attaché. Nothing was left to chance in the final preparation period.

The two week camp concluded with a lunch for the Team and their family and friends. The Team were given their blazers, the first of any of the Australian Team. The inauguration into the Team and the handing over of the Blazers was done by 1948 Single Scull gold medallist, Merv Wood, probably Australia's oldest living gold medallist. The feeling was indescribable: the Olympics were almost here.

The final camp was to be at Bundaberg for a number of reasons. It was important that there were not the constant distractions that would occur in Sydney. The weather would be a lot warmer and the facilities excellent.

The Team travelled by chartered jet to Bundaberg. Upon arrival, the media was there to greet them. The only problem, they found out later, was that the real story was with the jet the Team had flown in on. It was the biggest plane ever to land in Bundaberg and the airstrip could have struggled to take the plane.

The local community had worked for many years to make sure the Team had everything they wanted. The major project had been the building of a rowing course and boatshed at Bucca Weir, about 35 minutes from Bundaberg. The local rowing club had laid an eight lane, fully-buoyed course. The crews could row up to seven kilometres upstream. A number of local functions were held including a civic reception at the Bundaberg Rowing Club. A mini regatta was held during the camp. All crews showed that they were on the pace.

With the opening ceremony scheduled for Friday 15th September, the Team arrived back in Sydney on the Tuesday evening. Due to the travelling involved, it was decided that the Team would not stay in the Olympic village but at the University of Western Sydney, about 10 minutes from the course. They would be joined there by the canoeists. The great thing about the UWS was that each Team member had their own room.

It was decided that, for the Team to show the rest of the world they were back on home turf, they would arrive as one unit into the Regatta Centre. With the Rowing Team theme song blasting out it was hard not to notice the green and gold.

The other countries had been complaining about the wind but the strong winds the Team had heard about had abated. The Aussies responded, with a cheeky grin, "What wind?"

The final stage of preparation continued on the Olympic course; it was now just a matter of waiting for the heats to start. Many years of preparation were about to be put to the test.

Due to the remoteness of the rowing course at most Olympics, the rowers are unable to attend the Opening Ceremony. However at Sydney the majority of the Team marched. It was the experience of a lifetime as they walked into the Olympic Stadium to the cheers of 110,000 people.

The heats started on the Sunday. The crowds were screaming "Aussie, Aussie, Aussie". It seemed they did not see anything apart from green and gold. The first day's results were reasonable. However, they were unable to win any heats. Most crews were pleased though to have the first race, and the attendant nerves, out of the way.

The second day saw more heats with some good results: wins by the Lightweight Four, Lightweight Double and Men's Quad Scull and Eight. It was a far better day than the first.

The Team was very aware of the high expectations placed on them. The most important thing was to ensure that, on finals day, you were there. By the end of the week, 10 of the 12

crews had qualified for the finals. That was more than any other country.

The first person to race was Gina Douglas. Gina is the first female sculler to reach an Olympic final, a stand out achievement in itself. Gina finished 5th, but perhaps the proudest person in the 30,000 crowd was her dad, who won a silver medal in Eight in 1968 at Mexico City.

The first medal came from an almighty row by Kate Slatter and Rachel Taylor in the pair. They had to come from behind to take the silver. It was a great result.

The Men's Pair had high hopes. No higher than Matt Long's mum who, like hundreds of the rowing fraternity, was working as a volunteer. Tomkins and Long picked up the bronze medal, not far behind France.

The biggest race of Day 1 of finals was to be the Men's Four where Australia was hoping to spoil Steve Redgrave's hopes of a 5th gold medal in the British Four. The Brits rowed superbly to take the gold with the Australians collecting the bronze. It was a historical moment as Samaranch presented Redgrave with an IOC Olympic pin.

Day 2 of the finals saw the two Eights in action, along with the Women's Lightweight Double, Men's Lightweight Four and the Men's Quad.

The Men's Lightweight Four appeared to have the gold medal with 50 metres to go. However the French passed them with less than 10 metres to go. Without a doubt, it was the best performance by an Australian crew at the Sydney Olympics.

Hope was pinned on the two Eights. The Women's Eight finished 5th and it now all rested on the final race of the Men's Eight.

After a slow start the Australians looked gone at the 1000 metres. But with an almighty push they nearly caught Great Britain on the line. Another five metres and it would have been gold. However after the initial disappointment, they were happy with the silver.

Australia finished the Olympics second on the overall rowing medal table and 10th on a gold medal table, with five minor medals. Although there was no gold, there was a silver lining.

The Olympics was an experience that will stay with us forever. It brought about such a mixture of emotions. It is the ultimate in sport and those of us who experienced it first hand will never ever forget it.

Status of Competitors

Senior A

All rowers shall be eligible to compete in a Senior A category in the appropriate division.

Senior B

A rower ceases to be Senior B on 31st December of the year in which he or she reaches the age of 22 years (i.e. Born on or after Jan 1 1979). After that the rower is classified as Senior A.

Youth

A rower ceases to be Youth on the 31st December of the year in which he or she reaches the age of 20 (i.e. Born on or after Jan 1 1981). This definition also applies to the coxswain of a Youth crew.

Junior A

A rower ceases to be Junior A on the 31st December of the year in which he or she reaches the age of 18. (i.e. Born on or after Jan 1 1983). This definition also applies to the coxswain of a Junior A crew.

Junior B

A rower ceases to be Junior B on the 31st December of the year in which he or she reaches the age of 16. (i.e. Born on or after Jan 1 1985). This definition also applies to the coxswain of a Junior B crew.

School

A rower who is attending Secondary School as a full time student and also qualifies as a Youth rower shall be eligible to compete in the School category. This definition also applies to the coxswains of a School crew.

Lightweight

Lightweight races are restricted to male rowers weighing 72.5 kilograms or less and female rowers weighing 59 kilograms or less in the case of single sculling races. In all other classes of boat, to male rowers weighing 72.5 kilograms or less and female rowers weighing 59 kilograms or less providing that the average weight of all members of the crew in which such rowers race (excluding the coxswain) does not exceed 70 kilograms in the case of male rowers and 57 kilograms in the case of female rowers. Lightweight rowers shall be weighed in racing uniform.

Notice to competitors and coaches

1. Competitors Briefing

- A meeting of managers, competitors, coaches, and boat race officials shall take place at 3.00pm Monday 2nd April, 2001 under the Gold Pass Reserve marquee.

2. Withdrawals and substitutions

- All withdrawals and substitutions must be made to the Regatta Secretary at the Regatta Information Centre.
- Official withdrawal and substitution forms must be fully completed and signed by an official of the respective State Association.
- Withdrawals must be made not less than one hour before the respective event / race.
- Substitutions in any crew can only be made according to Rule 4.8 of the Rowing Australia Rules and Racing Code.
- Substitutions can only be made up to one hour prior to the start time of the first race of the event for that crew.
- No change can be made to a crew which has already raced in a heat of its event, except in cases of serious illness or accident - refer to Rule 4.8.2.

3. Lightweight and coxswain weighing

- Scales will be available for check weighing from 8.00am Saturday 31st March 2001.
- On competition days scales will be available for official weigh-in one hour prior to the first race of the day.
- Lightweight competitors shall weigh in not more than two hours and not less than one hour before their first race on each racing day.
- Coxswains shall weigh in not more than 24 hours and not less than 1 hour before their first race of the Regatta. Coxswains may be check weighed after their event.
- Coxswains found underweight will be referred to the Jury. Crews could be disqualified if they are found to have competed with an underweight coxswain.
- Coxswains will be weighed in racing uniform without any article of racing equipment. Dead weight shall be in a sealed bag and placed in the boat as close as possible to the coxswain.
- Coxswains of men's crews will have a minimum weight of 55 kilograms.
- Coxswains of women's, schoolboys, schoolgirls, and all junior crews will be a minimum weight of 50 kilograms.

4. Boat weighing

- All boats are to be weighed and checked for the appropriate safety equipment prior to their first race.
- Crews/scullers rowing in boats that have not been weighed will be disqualified.

- All safety equipment, particularly shoe release, heel ties and bow ball, must be correctly fitted and functioning when boats are presented for weighing or boats will not be weighed. Control Commission will be monitoring all boats that are launching for competition and will not allow any boats on the water that do not comply with the appropriate safety equipment rules.

- Heel tie downs must limit the heel of fitted shoes to be raised no higher than 60mm above the heel of the footstretcher.

- Official boat weighing will be available from Sunday 1st April 8.00am and from one hour prior to the first race of each competition day. Scales will be available for check weighing on Saturday 31st March 2001, 8.00am.

5. Bow numbers

- All competing boats are required to display an official bow number (colour coded) on the bow of the boat, representing the allocated lane number for that race.
- Lane numbers will be supplied by the Regatta Officials in the bow number tent (see site map) for a deposit of \$10. This must be returned to the Officials immediately upon return of each boat to the launching area for deposit refund.

6. Boat trailers

- Volunteer trailer marshals will be on hand to direct trailers on arrival. All trailers are to be fully unloaded on arrival and subsequently removed from the regatta park area to the designated trailer park area as directed by the marshals.

7. Boat racking

- Boat racking will be specifically marked for the various boat classes. Please adhere to this direction and rack boats accordingly. Disregarding this direction will result in an inability to correctly store all competition boats. Your cooperation is appreciated.

8. Ceremonies

- First, second and third placed crews and scullers in the finals are to proceed via the warm down loop (back to 1500m) to the Victory Dais for presentation of trophies and medallions immediately after the race.

9. Racing code

- The Zurich 2001 Australian Rowing Championships and Interstate Regatta is conducted under the Rules and Racing Code of Rowing Australia Inc and amendments agreed between Rowing Australia and the Organising Committee.

- Managers, coaches and athletes should make themselves familiar with the rules of racing.

10. Starting times

- Competitors are to be within the start zone five minutes before the time appointed for starting their event (In the case of heats, five minutes before the first heat).
- Competitors must be held in their starting position at least two minutes before the time laid down for the start of their event.
- The starter may warn or exclude from the race any crew/sculler arriving at the starting position less than two minutes before the scheduled starting time. A warning has the same effect as one given for a false start.

Starting procedure will be as approved by F.I.S.A. using "traffic" lights system.

11. False start

- If a crew/sculler starts too soon, the Starter stops the race by ringing a bell and then waving a red flag or an intermittent audible sound with flashing lights will be used. In the case of a false start the Starter warns the offending crew(s)/sculler(s).
- A crew causing two false starts shall be excluded from the race.

12. Equipment damage

- If a crew while still in the first 100 metres of the race indicates that it has suffered damage to its boat or equipment, the Starter or Umpire stops the race.
- The signal by an Umpire to stop the race shall be by ringing a bell and waving a red flag.

13. Umpire's directions

- The Umpire may not steer a crew/sculler unless there is an obstacle in its lane.
- If a crew/sculler is about to impede another by its wash or by leaving its lane, the Umpire raises a white flag and calls the crew/sculler at fault, indicating the required change of direction by lowering the flag to one side.
- If a crew/sculler is about to cause a collision, the Umpire may call its attention by raising the white flag and stop it by giving the command "STOP".
- Crews/scullers interfering with their opponents may be excluded from the race.

14. Finish

- The Judges at the finish shall indicate the crossing of the line by the each crew in the race by sound signal.

15. Rowing six lane progression system

Racing for all Championship and non-Championship events will take place over six lanes using the six lane progression system.

1 - 6 Entries

- Final only

7 - 8 Entries

- Two heats and one repechage and no semi-finals.
- The winner of each heat goes forward to the Final; the remainder go into the repechage.
- The first four crews in the repechage go forward to the Final. The remainder are eliminated.

9 - 12 Entries

- Two heats, two repechages and no semi-finals.
- The winner of each heat goes forward to the final; the remainder go into the repechages.
- The first two crews in each repechage go forward to the final. The remainder are eliminated.

13 - 15 Entries

- Three heats, one repechage and two semi-finals.
- The first three crews of each heat go forward to the semi-finals; the remainder go forward to the repechage.
- The first three crews in the repechage go forward to the semi-finals, the remainder are eliminated.
- The first three crews of each semi-final go forward to the final; the remainder are eliminated.

16 - 18 Entries

- Three heats, three repechages and two semi-finals.
- The winner of each heat goes forward to the semi-finals; the remainder go forward to the repechages.
- The first three crews of each repechage go forward to the semi-finals; the remainder are eliminated.
- The first three crews of each semi-final go forward to the final; the remainder are eliminated.

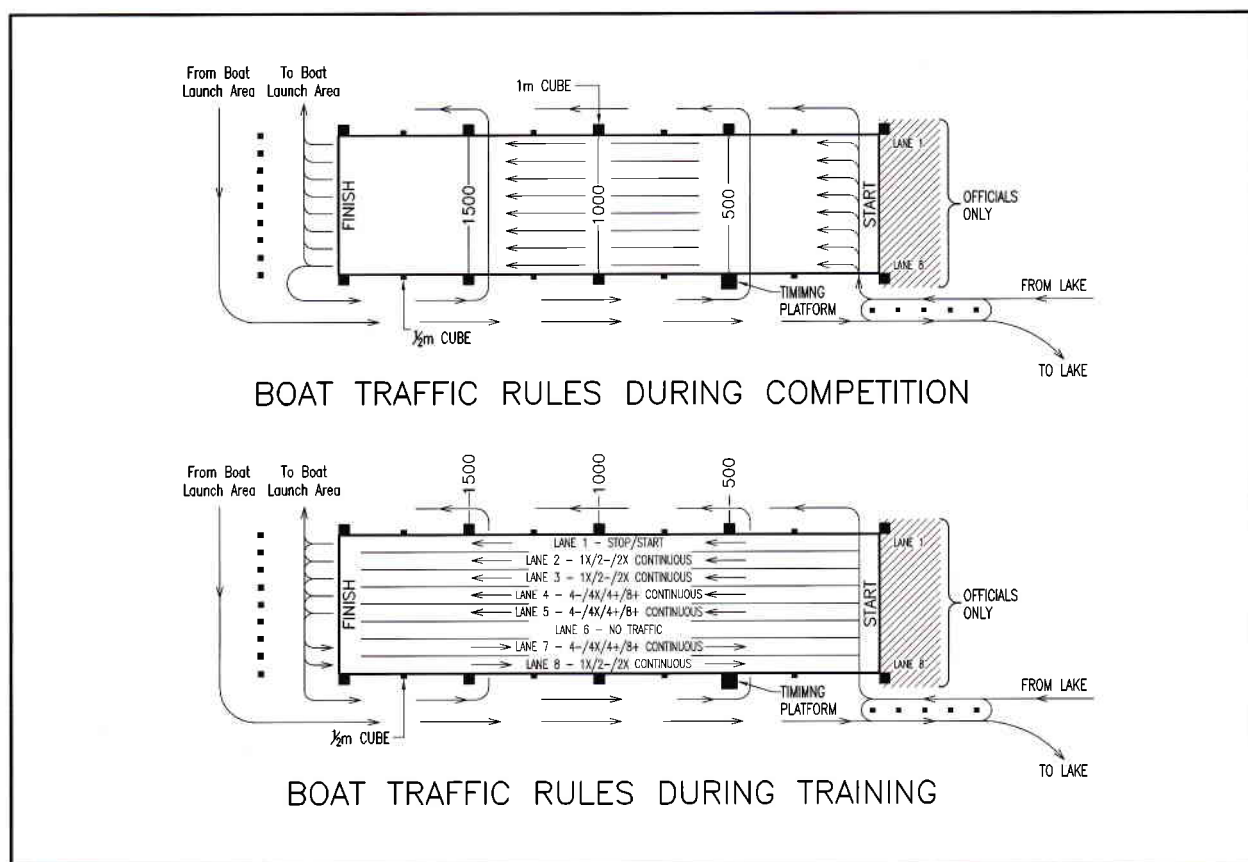
19 - 24 Entries

- Four heats, four repechages and two semi-finals.
- The winner of each heat goes forward to the semi-finals; the remainder go forward to the repechages.
- The first two crews of each repechage go forward to the semi-finals; the remainder are eliminated.
- The first three crews of each semi-final go forward to the final; the remainder are eliminated.

25 - 36 Entries

- Six heats, six repechages and three semi-finals.
- The winner of each heat goes forward to the semi-finals A/B/C; the remainder go forward to the repechages.
- The first two crews in each repechage go forward to the semi-finals A/B/C; the remainder are eliminated.
- The first two crews in each semi-final A/B/C go forward to the final, the remainder are eliminated.

Boat traffic rules



Lanes number from the judges (Northern) side of the course.

1. Rules must be obeyed

- For the safety and convenience of all competitors using these confined waters it is essential that the following traffic rules be observed during both training and competition periods.
- Any crew breaking the rules will be referred to the jury for confirmation of the appropriate penalty that can be the issuing of a warning or false start.

2. Procedure for boat launching

- All boats must be launched facing west (away from the start line) and proceed to the far (southern) side of the course before proceeding to the start. This procedure is required during both training and competition periods.

3. Boat traffic rules during training - (see on water map)

- On competition days the competition course will be closed to training from 30 minutes prior to the scheduled starting time of the first race each day until 30 minutes after completion of the final race each day.

- Lane 6 will be closed to all traffic during training.
- Lanes 7, 8 and the transit lane outside the course on the far (southern) side, will be for traffic proceeding to the start. (See on water map).
- Lane 1 will be for crews wishing to stop and practise starts in their progress down the course.
- Lanes 2 & 3 will be for continuous rowing down the course in small boats (1X, 2-, 2X).
- Lanes 4 & 5 will be for continuous rowing down the course in big boats (4X, 4X+, 4+, 4-, 8+).
- Competitors entering the course must give way to competitors already on the course.
- Competitors training on the lake outside the course area in Sheep Station Inlet, normal rules of navigation apply.
- Please note the exclusion zone near the dam spillway. Crews and scullers are not to go within 400m of the spillway gates under any circumstance. STAY WELL CLEAR.

4. Boat traffic rules during competition

- All competitors proceeding to the start shall keep to the south (far side) of the course and all installations.
- Boats proceeding to the start must stop 100m prior

to an oncoming race so as to avoid giving racing boats a wash.

- When stopping in the transit lane on the way to the start care should be taken so as to not hinder the progress of following crews.
- Crews and scullers may warm up beyond the start zone at their own risk. Normal navigation rules must apply.
- On reaching the start zone, competitors are to await marshalling instructions in the area immediately to the south of the start installation.
- If time permits, you may row in your race lane if allowed by the Starter. However it is your responsibility to be in position for your race start two minutes prior to scheduled start time.
- Any competitors missing their scheduled race or having been removed from a race at the start must, with permission of the Starter, cross the course within 100 metres of the start, proceeding to the finish between lane 1 and the northern bank.
- Competitors returning from training on the main lake must, with permission of the Starter, cross the course within 100 metres of the start, proceeding to the finish between lane 1 and the northern bank.

■ Competitors who wish to warm up or cool down may only cross the course from south to north at two specific points. Provided a race in progress is not within 500 metres, competitors may cross at either the 1500 or 500 metre lines.

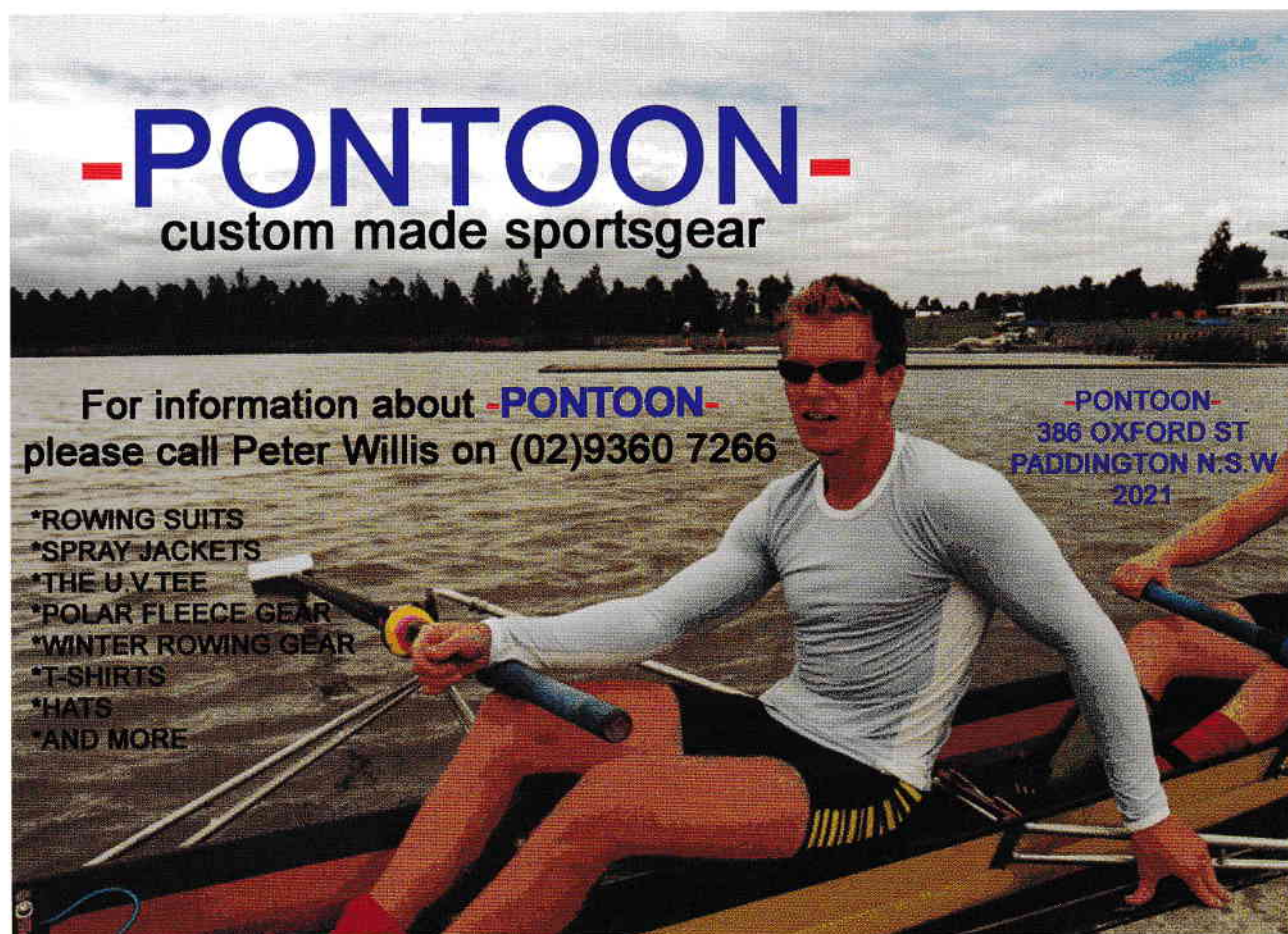
■ When warming down after a race all crew are required to return to the transit lane and proceed back up to the 1500m line before crossing to the northern bank (near side) and rowing back to the boating area between the northern bank and lane 1. **DO NOT ROW BEYOND THE FINISH LINE PAST THE LINE OF LARGE BOUYS.**

■ On finals days first, second and third placed crews will cool down by returning only as far as the 1500 metre line before crossing to the northern bank (near side) and rowing down to the Victory Dais.

■ Crews are not to pass between the Judge and the course while a race is in progress.

THE QUESTIONS:

I established the now called "EURO" boat building business in Sydney 13 years ago, with the commitment to service the rowing community from novice to elite. The standard of Australian boat building was well behind the European and North American standard. If we can't get that kind of recognition, why would the club and school market be willing to pay top dollars for the boats? But also in these markets people have opinions and attitudes which can't be justified from a boat building point of view, because for the money they like to pay it can't be done in Australia. These were the questions we had to find positive answers for.

At the Olympic games in our own country, where I was the sports equipment supervisor for SOCOG, and responsible to deal with all the boat builders, which supplied the boats for all the teams, it showed that none of the other Australian boat builders had any noticeable elite recognition either. Not even the majority of the Australian team rowed Australian made boats!

This indicates how hard it is to make a living as a manufacturer of rowing boats in this country. I also know that the majority of Australian boat builders would agree with this, but would not publish this like I do. This is the situation which we still want to change.

THE ANSWERS:

Two and half years ago we had the opportunity to get involved with the Hangzhou Flying Eagle Boat Co from China. We took the possibility to investigate the level of quality and make of their products. It did not take long to make a decision in their favour, and please have a look and judge by your self our newest products we supply as "EURO". FISA just bought 20 boats for the development centre in Seville (Spain) from the Chinese company. By close comparison you will find that our boats can match every other product made in Australia. Feel free to contact us to discuss all the details regarding the products and circumstances.

Where does that leave us getting a reputation? Our answer is very simple. We can't get a reputation, profit and happy people by making our own boats.

But we can get a reputation "VALUE FOR MONEY", profit and happy people by selling them the overseas product. This is our goal, for people to understand, that this way we can be of best assistance to help their needs.

Our government tells us that we are part of ASIA and we should deal and trade with our neighbours. Please check your clothing, car and home and see if you have bought everything Australian Made. If you have, we accept not to be your supplier. If you haven't, we are here to do business with you.

We do not claim to sell the Rolls Royce, but as mentioned we do sell "VALUE FOR MONEY" and that value is of very high quality. We believe that competition improves the product, and China was our way of improving the product to benefit our customers and our self.

Interstate rowing and Perpetual trophies

King's Cup

There are few sports that have an event where all states race at the one time, and that has been held virtually on an annual basis for 122 years. It is the magic of the King's Cup that still commands the premier spot in our sport.

The King's Cup is the most sought after trophy for Men's Rowing in Australia. The history of how the King's Cup came to be the main trophy for Men's Rowing in Australia is as colorful as many of the races over the years.

Interstate eight oared rowing was first held on 6th March 1878 when the colony of Victoria recorded the first victory over the colony of NSW. It was raced in Melbourne. The following year the race took place in Sydney over a distance of four miles and was won by NSW. Racing continued with other colonies joining in until 1915 when the outbreak of World War 1 suspended interstate competition.

At the completion on the War the allies conducted a special race for eights at the famous Henley Regatta. A special trophy was to be presented by the King of England to the winners. Crews competing were Cambridge University, Oxford University, New Zealand, Canada, France, United States of America and two crews from Australia entered as Australian Infantry Forces (AIF) Number 1 and Australian Infantry Forces Number 2. The winning crew was AIF Number 1 who defeated Oxford University in the final.

The AIF Number 1 crew was presented with the special trophy by His Majesty King George V. The battle for the trophy however did not stop there. The Australian Military authorities immediately took custody of the trophy. Upon its return to Australia it was handed over to the Australian War Memorial Council and placed in the Australian War Memorial.

Interstate eight oared racing resumed in 1920 and as there was no perpetual Trophy for an event that had already been contested for 42 years the Australian Rowing Association as it was then known asked the War Memorial Council for the Cup as a perpetual trophy. This was refused. Later in the same year the Victorian Rowing Association also made the same request with a compromise that the trophy be kept in the winning state's War Memorial. Again this was refused. The refusal only stirred more action and a petition to His Majesty King George V, signed by Captain H.C. Disher, who rowed at number seven of the winning AIF Crew, and was dispatched to England on 30th October 1920. A reply took seven months and when received it was the desired result. The reply signed by the Secretary of the Colonies, Mr. Winston Churchill, stated that "His Majesty commands to inform you that it is his wish that the Cup should be used as a permanent trophy and to be competed for annually in the Interstate Eight-Oared Race of Australia."

The current distance of 2000 metres was first adopted in 1960 at Launceston. Prior to this the distance was usually three miles or approximately five kilometres.

With the introduction of the National Championships in 1962 and the growth of the National Championship program, the King's Cup and other interstate events could be considered glamorous races of days gone by. But, in fact, the opposite is the case. Interstate events are now more competitive than ever.

Dual Olympic Gold medallist and multiple World Champion, Jim Tomkins, will be going for his 12th victory in the 2000 King's Cup. In his words "The King's Cup remains Australia's premier race. We very rarely get a chance to race in Eights. There is only one thing better in Australian rowing than lining up at the start in an Eight for Victoria and that is crossing the line first for Victoria in the King's Cup."

The Governor General Plate:

This trophy was first presented in 1999 for Interstate contest between Women's Eights. It was considered that an eight oar event should be contested for women.

Interstate women's rowing has been contested since 1920 in fours. The first race was won by South Australia. A trophy to be known as the ULVA Trophy was struck, as it was presented by United Licensed Victuallers Association of Queensland, which depicted Dorothy Arnold Ekins

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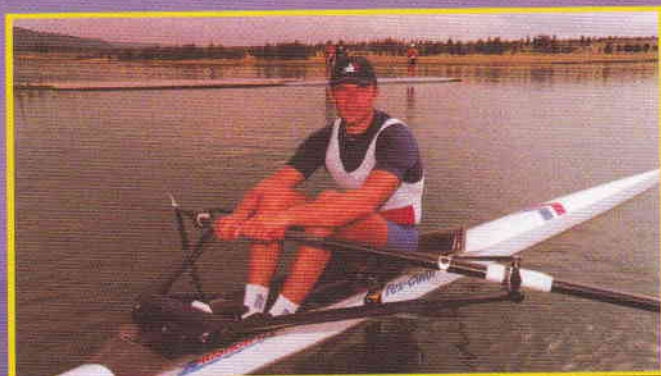

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from the winning Southern Australian crew holding an oar and dressed in the rowing garb of her day...floppy hat, sailor top and billowing bloomers.

The distance of women's races has varied over the year, originally 1/2 mile, then from 1922 to 1937 1/2 mile, 1938 to 1959 1 mile, 1960 to 1984 1000 metres and 1985 to present 2000 metres.

The Penrith Cup

The first official interstate lightweight race was held in 1958 at Penrith. No oarsman could be heavier than 140 pounds. However, prior to this, in 1948 a lightweight four race took place at Ballarat between Victoria and New South Wales. It was part of the 1948 Olympic Selection Regatta. Penrith City Council presented a trophy to the Australian Rowing Council in 1958 as the perpetual trophy for Lightweight Fours. This laid the foundation for this class of event in Australia.

The weight limits have varied from time to time, however it is now set at a crew average of 70 kgs with no person heavier than 72.5 kgs.

Australia has always been a strong performer in lightweight rowing on the international stage. In 1974

Australia won the first ever FISA Lightweight Four World Championship. In 1999, at St Catherines, Canada, a silver was won in the same event.

The only change to the format of the Penrith Cup since 1958 occurred in 1979 when the event became a Coxless Four.

Phil Gardiner, who has won a record six Penrith Cups, sums up the feeling of Interstate racing "the Penrith Cup for me was always the highlight of the Regatta."

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The Victoria Cup

The first Interstate Women's Lightweight event was held on the Yarra River in Melbourne with a victory to Victoria. The crew was stroked by Margaret Agnew McKenzie who pressed hard with the Women's Rowing Council to have Lightweight rowing as part of the Interstate Program. The Victoria Cup was presented by the Victorian Ladies Rowing Association as the perpetual trophy for this event.

Internationally Lightweight women have recorded many victories and Australia was at the forefront for inclusion of Lightweight women's rowing at the World Championships and Olympic Games.

With the inclusion of sculling in the Olympic Games and a Lightweight Quad at the World Championships, the Victoria Cup was changed from Four to a Quad Scull in 1999.

Presidents Cup

Single sculling has held a special place in Australian sport. In the late 1800s, huge crowds would line the shores of the Parramatta River in Sydney to witness the World Professional Sculling Championships. The current World Professional Sculling Champion is still an Australian, George Cook, who won the event in 1948, and has not been challenged since.

Interstate single sculling began in 1892 and the winner was MJ Slack of Queensland.

Following the formation of the Australian Rowing Council in 1925 the then President, Mr. E.C. Watchorn, donated a trophy for Annual Australian Interstate Single Sculling.

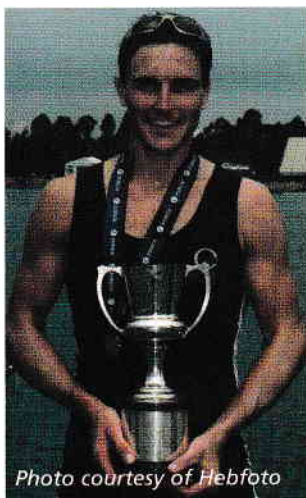

M.T.(Mervyn) Wood, the only Australian Rower to win Gold, Silver & Bronze Olympic Medals has won the trophy a record eight times. Peter

Antonie (1991) and Steve Hawkins (1993) who won a Gold Medal in double sculls in Barcelona in 1992.

The event continues to demonstrate the best Single Sculler in Australia.

Nell Slatter Trophy

Dating back to 1901 at the Great Federation Regatta staged at Albert Park Lake, Cassie Woolly McRitchie represented Victoria. She used a skiff loaned to her by the then Governor of Victoria, Lord Brassey, and defeated her

challenger from Sydney, Elizabeth Messenger. She was presented with a magnificent pearl and ruby bracelet by the Duke of Gloucester. So great was the public interest in the female scullers that police were required to keep the inquisitive spectators at bay.

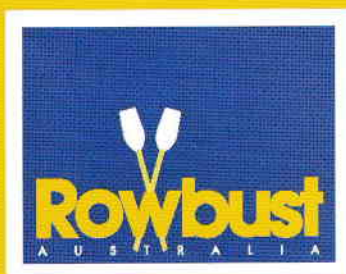
Cassie McRitchie

passed away in 1973 at the great age of 96, and will for all time be remembered as the founder of the first all-women's rowing club at Albert Park in 1907. She is justifiably known as the 'mother' of Victorian women's rowing.

First introduced in 1963 in Brisbane, the Women's Interstate Single Sculling Championships has continued as an annual event for which the Nell Slatter Trophy,



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presented by the Queensland Women's Rowing Association as a tribute to the then President, is the perpetual trophy.

Races were held over 1000 metres; the then International distance for women. In 1985 FISA adopted a standard distance of 2000 metres for both men and women and Australia followed. The event was not held in 1989, nor were any other Interstate events that year due to gale force winds that caused the cancellation of the National Championships and Interstate Regatta.

Noel F. Wilksion Trophy

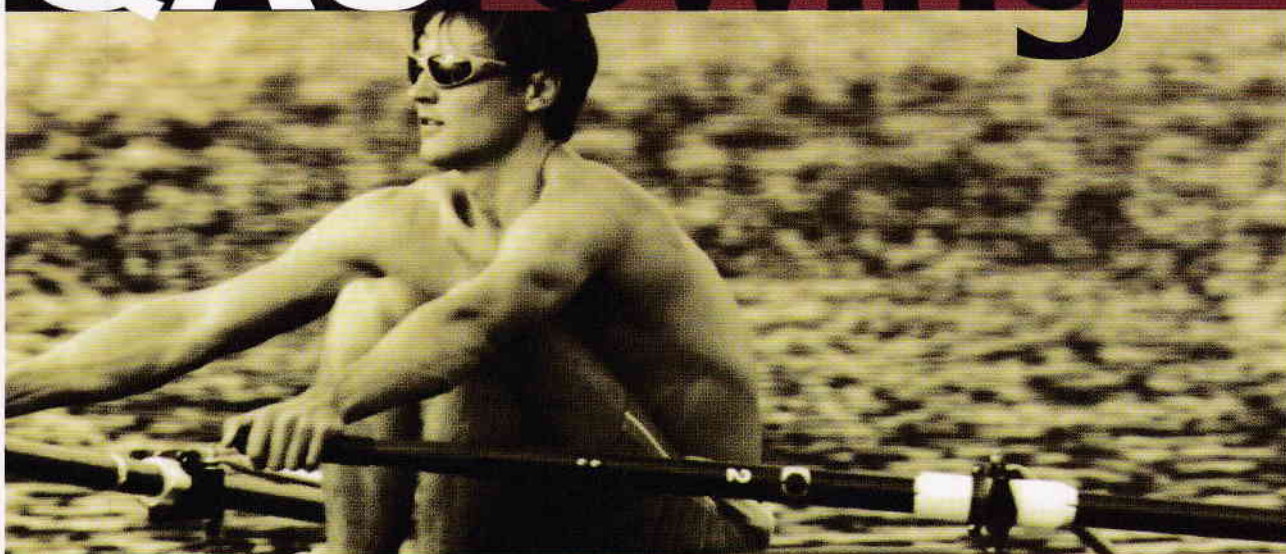
Recognising the necessity to introduce a class of rowing in which Australian Youth oarsmen could compete, the Australian Rowing Council initiated the interstate Youth Eight Oared Championships at an age limit some 18 months older than the Internationally accepted Junior age limit. The first Championship was conducted in Victoria in 1974, and in that same year the Council accepted the offer by Noel Wilkinson to provide a perpetual trophy for the event.

Junior (age limit) events for other classes of boats forming part of the National Regatta programme now collectively



fulfill the purpose originally envisaged by both the Council and the Donor, namely, an incentive to young oarsmen to continue in the sport subsequent to completion of their secondary education by providing acceptable competition at a National level and fostering their development into higher classifications

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The Bicentennial Trophy

Donated by the NSW Rowing Association as part of the 1988 Bicentennial celebrations, this trophy is for the contest of Women's Youth Eights. It was first conducted as a four oar event and changed to an eight in 1994.
