TO THE MEMBERS.

GENTLEMEN.

It is a source of gratification to your Committee to present to you this evening the Forty-sixth Annual Report and Balance Sheet, which contains ample evidence that the sport is now firmly re-established on its pre-war basis. Indeed, the membership for the past season, 2077, is the highest in the history of the Association. This is an increase of 31 over the previous season. There has been a corresponding increase in regatta entries, which also constitute a record, the figures for the past two seasons being:—

### INTER-STATE ROWING CONFERENCE.

The Inter-State Rowing Conference was held at the Sports Club, Hunter Street, Sydney, at 8 p.m. on Friday, 5th May, 1922, Mr. Q. L. Deloitte, President of the N.S.W. Rowing Association, being in the chair. Your Association was represented by Cr. S. J. Morell, and Messrs. G. I. Stevenson and E. Kenny.

The regulations concerning the control of the King's Cup were adopted with a few minor amendments.

A proposal to admit New Zealand to the Inter-State race was on the agenda paper. The matter, however, was not dealt with, as the necessary particulars from New Zealand had been received too late for circulation to the States by 1st March, as provided by the regulations covering matters for discussion at the Conference. Your Committee, however, does not favour the admission of other than the representatives of the six States of the Commonwealth to the race for the King's Cup. New Zealand's suggestion is that they should compete every second year.

It was decided that coaches should not give advice or assistance to crews during the progress of the Inter-State races.

### AUSTRALIAN EIGHT-OARED CHAMPIONSHIP.

This race was rowed over a three-mile course from Ryde to Henley Wharf, on the Parramatta River, on 6th May, 1922. The selectors chose the following to represent Victoria:—H. C. Maling, 11st. 1lb. (bow); C. N. McKay, 11st. 4 lb. (2); H. Smyth, 12st. 1lb. (3); J. L. Mounsey, 11st. 9lb. (4); H. Rush, 12st. 9lb. (5); J. Harding, 12st. 7lb. (6); R. V. Gregg, 12st. 13lb. (7); J. M. Buchanan, 11st. 9lb. (stroke); J. McGregor (cox); G. Anderson, 10st. 10lb. (emergency). All the members of the crew were members of the Mercantile Club, the coxswain and emergency being members of the Albert Park Club. This is the first occasion that the State has been represented by a club crew. The crew was coached by Mr. A. B. Sloan, and finished second to South Australia, which State was again represented by the Murray Bridge eight. The Victorian Crew's performance in finishing second is the best that this State has put up since it won in 1912, and if the same standard of rowing is maintained and improved on the prospects of next year's crew should be particularly bright. The South Australians are heartily congratulated on their victory.

In connection with this event it has been noticed that in all references to the race the time (16 mins. 19 secs.) has been claimed to be a record for the course. Apparently, however, the fact has been overlooked that the course for this year's race was exactly three miles in length, whereas the previous races on the Parramatta were rowed over the full championship course to Searle's monument (3 miles 167 yards), which was covered by the Victorian crew when they beat Tasmania in 1905 in 16 mins. 25 secs.

Before the Victorian Eight left for Sydney the Ballarat Regatta Association, on behalf of the three Ballarat clubs, issued a challenge to the crew with a view to the winners of the challenge race representing the State. Your Committee decided not to entertain the challenge, as it did not admit the right of any club or combination of clubs to challenge the crew selected by the Selection Committee, which your Committee had appointed.

The annual regatta was held over the Henley course on Saturday, 29th October, 1921, being run as a double with Henley. An excellent entry was received in the Maiden and Senior events. The various races were won as follows:—Maiden Pairs, Footscray (C. Hardy bow.

J. Reidy stroke, H. Allen cox.); Maiden Fours, Ballarat (A. Gilbert bow, H. Williamson, J. Doull, R. Gallagher stroke, A. King cox.); Light-weight Maiden Fours, Albert Park (V. Langsford bow, L. Merrigan, W. Newbound, C. A. Everett stroke, N. Fisher cox.); Maiden Eights (Buchan Cup), Richmond (C. Jarvis bow, P. E. Irving, J. Ward, J. Foullie, J. Martin, G. Lyndon (since deceased), F. Chanter, C. Markham stroke, C. Harris cox.); Senior Sculls, Richmond (J. Barton); Senior Fours, Albert Park (A. King bow, H. R. Duncan, S. Smyth, R. Muir stroke, J. McGregor cox.); Senior Eights (Morell Cup), Mercantile (H. C. Maling bow, C. N. McKay, H. Rush, J. L. Mounsey, H. Smyth, J. Harding, R. V. Gregg, J. M. Buchanan tarks W. F. Shows sort). stroke, W. F. Shaw cox). Mercantile won the Morell Cup outright, this being their third win. Cr. Morell has generously offered another cup for the Senior Eight race.

The following public regattas were also held during the season, and in every instance excellent entries were received:—Henley (22nd October, 1921), Nagambie (26th December, 1921), Warrnambool (26th December, 1921), Colac (2nd January, 1922), Upper Yarra (28th January, 1922), Albert Park (30th January, 1922), Ballarat (4th March, 1922), Barwon (11th March, 1922), Bairnsdale (15th April, 1922), Sale (17th April, 1922).

The Amateur Sculling Association held several handicap and

novice sculling events.

The following races were also held during the season, Inter-Collegiate Eights (21st and 22nd April, 1922), won by Queen's College (J. F. Williams bow, C. W. Scott, J. W. Cook, H. S. Thomas, R. H. Holyman, L. C. Abernethy, D. I. Fitzpatrick, K. H. Hadley stroke, J. James cox., Mr. C. Donald coach); Head of the River (12th and 12th May 1922) and 13th May, 1922), won by Geelong Grammar School (S. L. S. Jackson bow, K. W. Kernot, J. J. Fagan, E. L. G. Guest, W. H. S. Newman, R. L. Wilkins, R. W. M. Onslow, G. C. Northcote stroke, J. H. Webb cox., Mr. L. C. Robson coach); Inter-Banks Fours (20th May, 1922), won by the Bank of Australasia (L. G. Montgomery bow, A. G. Treharne, H. Smyth, W. R. Fraser stroke, E. de la Perrell cox.).

The Inter-University Eight-oared Race was rowed at Port Adelaide on 3rd June, 1922, Brisbane winning from Melbourne, with Sydney third and Adelaide last. The Brisbane crew is congratulated

on its first win in this event.

### CLUBS' REGISTERED NUMBERS.

Your Committee adopted a suggestion by the Ballarat Regatta Association that the bow and coxswain of all crews should wear a Association that the bow and coxswam of an erews should wear a registered number at public regattas. The following are the registered numbers of the Clubs:—1, Albert Park; 2, Bairnsdale; 3, Ballarat; 4, Ballarat City; 5, Banks; 6, Barwon; 7, Melbourne (formerly Civil Service); 8, Corio Bay; 9, Eaglehawk; 10, Essendon; 11, Footscray; 12, Hawthorn; 13, Lake Colac; 14, Mercantile; 15, Nagambie; 16, Preston; 17, Richmond; 18, Sale; 19, Sandhurst; 20. Shepparton; 21, South Melbourne; 22, University; 23, Warrnambool; 24, Wendouree; 25, Yarra Yarra. The wearing of registered numbers at all regattas is compulsory, and several clubs were fined during the search for failure to compuls with this memberian. the season for failure to comply with this regulation.

### WEIGHTS OF COMPETITORS.

Your Committee has decided that the weights of competitors shown on entry forms and regatta programmes must be authentic. Regatta Committees are authorised to check the weight of any competitor about whom they may be doubtful, and in the event of serious discrepancies to report the matter to your Committee for any action deemed necessary.

INSTRUCTIONS TO COMPETITORS AT REGATTAS.

With a view of assisting competitors and regatta committees, your Committee, at the request of the Ballarat Regatta Association, has drawn up a concise and uniform list of instructions to competitors which must be printed in the programme of every regatta. This will avoid the confusion which previously arose through the varying instructions appearing in the different programmes.

TROPHIES.

During the year a Sub-Committee was appointed to report on the question of trophies. Your Committee decided to adopt the recommendation of the Sub-Committee to limit the selection of trophies to the following articles:—Jewellery, cutlery and plate, clocks, cameras (but not photographic materials), ornaments and travelling bags. It was also decided that applicants, when making requests for their trophy orders, must state the nature of the articles they intend to obtain as trophies. In future, trophy orders will hold good only for two months from the date of issue.

FINANCES.

In view of the heavy expense now incurred by being represented in the annual Inter-State contests, your Committee appointed a Sub-Committee to review the financial position of the Association. The following recommendations of the Sub-Committee were adopted:—(1) That the registration fees for regattas be increased from £2/2/- to £4/4/-; (2) that supporters of the sport be again invited to subscribe to the funds of the Association, and that tickets for the steamer following all championship races on the Lower Yarra be issued to such subscribers; (3) that blazers be not provided by the Association to members of Inter-State crews.

OARSMEN'S MEMORIAL.

A competition was conducted by the Royal Victorian Institute of Architects for designs for the Oarsmen's Memorial. Your Committee is now awaiting the decision of the judges, Messrs. Alsop and Blackett, and it is hoped that the memorial will be completed during the ensuing season.

AFFILIATED CLUBS.

As the result of long protracted negotiations two of the oldest clubs in the State, Civil Service and Melbourne, amalgamated in June last, and will in future be known as the Melbourne Rowing Club. The combined club will occupy the boat-house of the old Melbourne Club, which is now being renovated and enlarged. It is 25 years since the old Melbourne Club withdrew from the Association.

The Yarra Yarra Club has let a contract for extensive additions to its club-rooms, and the Barwon Club has enlarged its premises considerably at a cost of over £1000. The Corio Bay Club has removed its boat-house from Corio Bay and re-erected commodious premises on the banks of the Barwon. The Hawthorn Club will shortly undertake extensive alterations to its premises, whilst Footscray has raised almost enough money to erect its proposed new boat-house in Footscray Park. The Essendon Club is now in possession of its fine new boat-house in the Maribyrnong Park, whilst South Melbourne Club recently opened a fine billiard room, which has been erected adjoining the Club's present premises. This activity amongst the clubs in improving their accommodation provides striking evidence of the strong position the sport now occupies.

In April last your Honorary Secretary visited Rutherglen at the request of the Murray Rowing Association to attend a conference on

rowing matters. As a result of the conference it is anticipated that the Murray Rowing Association and its associated clubs will again affiliate with your Association at an early date.

REGATTA DATES.

Your Committee recently decided to alter the date of the Melbourne regatta from the Saturday after Henley to the first Saturday in December. The Champion Eight and Sculls have been fixed for 16th December, the Champion Four for 20th January, and the Champion Pair for 10th February at Ballarat. The dates for all other regattas correspond with the dates allotted last season. In connection with Nagambie and Warrnambool regattas on Boxing Day, it has been decided that if a race at one of these regattas lapses for want of entries the crews which have entered should be allowed to transfer their entries to the similar race at the other regatta, provided sufficient entries have already been received to make a race at the latter regatta.

OBITUARY.

It is with extreme regret that your Committee has to record the deaths of two very able and prominent members of your Association, Sir Joseph Hood and Mr. Charles McDonell. Sir Joseph Hood, who died on 29th January, 1922, was one of the founders of the Association; in fact, it was as a result of his proposal that the Association was formed at a meeting on 7th October, 1876, and he drafted the original rules. Sir Joseph Hood was a well-known member of the Richmond Club in his younger days, when he met with success as an oarsman. A very interesting volume of rowing records collected by the deceased gentleman has been handed to your Association by his relatives, with whom the deepest sympathy is expressed in their bereavement.

Mr. Charles McDonell was for 30 years a highly respected member of the Albert Park Club, which he successfully represented in many senior and champion races. He was Secretary of your Association from 1902 to 1904, and proved himself to be a most obliging and highly efficient officer. For many years he retained a seat on the Committee, but eventually had to resign owing to ill-health. He passed away in June last, and to his widow and children your sincere

sympathy is expressed.

INTERNATIONAL ROWING.

Mr. Arthur A. Baynes, of the Commercial Rowing Club, Brisbane, competed in the Diamond Sculls at Henley-on-Thames last July. After winning his first and second heat with comparative ease, he was defeated in the semi-final by Mr. W. M. Hoover, United States, who afterwards won the final. The semi-final in which Mr. Baynes was defeated was the fastest heat in the race.

THANKS.

Your Committee tenders its sincere thanks to Mr. H. T. James for his splendid services in collecting £127/4/- towards the expenses of the Inter-State crew; to Councillor S. J. Morell for his generous donation towards the expenses of the crew and sculler, and also for presenting another cup for competition in the Senior Eights at the Melbourne regatta; to Captain A. M. Treacy for presenting the pennant for the Champion Eight; to all those who have assisted the Association by donations; to the Press for the prominence given to all matters concerning the sport; to the officials at the annual regatta and championship events; and to the Royal Victorian Institute of Architects, and Messrs. Blackett and Alsop for their valuable assistance and advice in connection with the competition for designs for the Oarsmen's Memorial.

This report would not be complete without reference to the work of the Hon. Auditors, Messrs. W. W. Senior and A. W. Massina. In view of the large sums of money handled by your Association, parti-cularly in connection with the trophy system, which involves the issue of orders to the value of nearly £1000 per annum, the audit of the books involves a considerable amount of work.

Your Committee desires to Specially thank Messrs. Senior and

Massina for their services in this respect.

Mr. Senior first audited the books of your Association in 1886, and this year's was the thirty-sixth successive audit that he has made, a record of service which is unique in the history of the Association.

### AMENDMENTS OF RULES.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Sub-Committee which dealt with the finances of the Association in March last, the members at the annual meeting will be asked to amend Rule VII, by altering the registration fee for regattas from £2/2/- to £4/4/-.

The confirmation of the members at the annual meeting is asked

to the following amendments made on 6th March, 1921:

(1) Regatta Regulation No. 15.—After the words oarsmen, through the secretaries of their clubs, shall notify the Secretary of the Victorian Rowing Association," insert the following, "of the article which they desire to select as a trophy and." Before the words "No commission, etc.," insert the following: "All applications for trophy orders shall be dealt with by a Sub-Committee appointed by the Committee of the Association, and the decision of such Sub-Committee as to whether the article applied for can be regarded as a trophy shall be final."

(2) First Schedule (Trophy Order Form) .- Cancel the list of articles referred to as trophies and insert the following: "Jewellery, cutlery and plate, clocks, cameras (but not photographic materials), ornaments and travelling bags."
