FIFTY-FIRST

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

VICTORIAN ROWING ASSOCIATION.

TO THE MEMBERS, GENTLEMEN,

The Committee have great pleasure in submitting for your consideration the 51st Annual Report and Balance Sheet.

The season is unparalleled in the history of the sport. Confronted by disaster immediately prior to the opening regattas, when fire was responsible for the loss of a boat building establishment, Clubhouse, 42 boats, 200 oars, affecting seven Clubs and six scullers, it would be expected that the disorganisation which would arise, and the subsequent shortage of equipment, would be reflected in the figures for the season. It is recorded with special satisfaction that the 1926-27 season has been a record for the Association. Club membership for the 30 affiliated Clubs totals 2174, an advancement of 52 members on the previous record. Numbers of competitors at regattas has increased in a surprising and pleasing manner, the season's total being 3230, which exceeds the Association's best figures by 637. The above figures in relation to the numbers of competitors, in view of the shortage of boats, are amazing, and have only been made possible by the co-operation of all Clubs in assisting one another throughout the year in the loan of equipment. The many disabilities which some crews trained under during the season, the action which made it possible for those crews to compete, and the general spirit of sympathy which existed between Clubs, is a tribute to the sport, and, if possible, will further cement the comradeship of all oarsmen.

As disaster marked the opening of the season, oarsmen were consternated when the Mercantile Rowing Club boathouse and fleet was entirely destroyed by fire at the end of the racing season.

The loss of equipment and accommodation, totalling over £6000, suffered from the devastations of fire must necessarily impose hardships on Clubs, and it will be some time before replacement work is fully completed. The Committee are confident, however, judging by the manner in which Clubs surmounted difficulties during 1926-27 season, that obstacles will be again overcome by the spirit of enthusiasm, determination and sacrifice prevailing amongst rowing clubs, and that the 1927-28 season will produce still further records, evidence of the advancement of the sport, and maybe the efforts will be crowned by the winning of the King's Cup for Victoria.

AUSTRALIAN AMATEUR ROWING COUNCIL.

The second Annual Meeting of the Australian Amateur Rowing Council was held at the Derwent and Tamar Buildings, Hobart, on Thursday, 5th May, 1927. Present: Messrs. E. Sorrell (Tas.), R. S. Jeffreys (W.A.), G. R. H. Gill (Q.), J. P. Marcus (S.A.), E. Kenny (V.), and J. Daly as proxy for H. G. Alderson (N.S.W.). The following office-bearers were elected:—President, Mr. E. Sorrell; Honorary Secretary, Mr. E. Kenny; Hon. Auditor, Mr. A. W. Massina; Delegates to Olympic Federation, Messrs. E. Kenny and H. G. Alderson.

The following resolutions were passed at the Council meeting:-

- Reports.—"That each State Association be asked to furnish
 a report within two months of the date of holding of the
 contests, setting out matters of complaint and criticism,
 if any, as to the arrangements and conduct of the races
 for the King's Cup and President's Cup. Such reports to
 be forwarded to the Council for transmission to the rowing
 Association in each State."
- 2. Competitors and Officials Meeting the Council.—"That prior to all future Interstate races the coaches, strokes, coxswains, scullers, umpire and starter be called to a meeting of the Australian Amateur Rowing Council, at which the Council's laws of boat racing will be explained and all concerned given to understand that these laws must be complied with under penalty of disqualification; further, that the Council should accompany the coaches, strokes, coxswains, scullers and officials for the race when the preliminary inspection of the course is being made."
- 3. Olympic Games.—"That in consideration of the great expense and tremendous handicap an Australian eight-oared crew is under by reason of the long journey involved in travelling to the Olympic Games, as compared with other countries which compete, it is not considered advisable for the Commonwealth to be represented at the next Olympic Games by an eight-oared crew. Further, that all efforts be concentrated on preparing and sending a sculler to represent Australia, provided a man of sufficiently high standard is forthcoming."

- Levy.—"That the levy for 1927-28 be fixed at £3 3s. for each Association."
- 5. Certificates for Winners of Interstate Races.—" Each Association to be asked for an expression of opinion as to the suitability of design of certificate and purchase of the block, submitted by the Queensland Rowing Association, with a view to uniform adoption."
- Thowl Pins.—"Resolved to ask boat builders to adopt as a standard a thowl pin as submitted by Mr. Frank Shaw, of the W.A.R.A."
- 7. Railway Concessions.—"That the Railway Commissioners be written to, asking that consideration be given to the granting of ordinary concessions when crews are compelled to travel at Easter time, and that a refund be considered in the case of crews which had to pay full fare this year; further, that the State Associations be asked to take into consideration the date of Easter when fixing the date of the Interstate race in future."

Mr. C. L. Baillieu was appointed as the representative of the Council in London.

A Special Meeting of the Council was held on Sunday, 8th May, 1927, when it was decided that a race be held on a course of a mile and a quarter (Olympic distance), on the Yarra, on Monday, 24th October, 1927, to give a selector an opportunity of seeing aspirants for the Australian representation and making a provisional selection for nomination to the Olympic Federation, subject to any further tests which the selector may decide on prior to making a final selection before the Olympic team departs; further, that Mr. C. L. McVilly be appointed as the sole selector.

Postponements.—A motion was passed that the Chairman of the Weather Committee be asked for a report as to the postponements in connection with the 1927 races.

AUSTRALIAN EIGHT-OARED CHAMPIONSHIP. (King's Cup).

All States were represented in the King's Cup Race, rowed on the River Derwent (Lower Course), Hobart, on Saturday, 7th May, 1927. Boisterous weather conditions somewhat marred the race. The start was delayed in order to allow an improvement in the weather conditions, which did not eventuate. The race resulted in a two lengths victory for the West Australian crew, New South Wales being three lengths ahead of Victoria, South Australia fourth. Tasmania and Queensland swamped before the finish of the race. After the finish of the race both the South Australian and Victorian crews swamped. The personnel of the West Australia crew were:—A. P. crew used swivel rowlocks. The West are heartily congratulated on their meritorious win, and also on their third victory in the Interstate race in the last six starts.

The following were originally selected in the crew, but, owing to business reasons, were unable to afford the necessary time:—L. Scully (Richmond), J. C. Duncan (Hawthorn), B. Coombes, cox. (Melbourne). The system of sole selector and coach was again adopted, and Mr. E. Horsburgh had the crew doing light work in February. The crew trained assiduously, and their efforts and that of the coach, Mr. Horsburgh, to win for the Association the right to hold the King's Cup, are highly appreciated. Mr. A. H. Cambridge (Sandhurst) was selected as the sculling representative. As Mr. Cambridge did not enter for the Victorian Sculling Championship, the selector, in order to arrive at a decision, arranged a race between him and the winner of the Victorian Sculling Championship on Saturday, 15th January, 1927. A. H. Cambridge won easily.

In the President's Cup race our representative finished second to the promising New South Wales sculler, Mr. R. Pearce, who is heartily congratulated on his victory.

To the following who rendered assistance in connection with the training operations of the Interstate crew the Committee acknowledges its thanks:—Melbourne Rowing Club (loan of boat and accommodation), Banks and Essendon Rowing Club (loan of boats), Mr. J. FIRE-EDWARDS' BOATSHEDS.

The destruction by fire of the Edwards' Boatsheds and the Richmond Rowing Club on 21st October, 1926, is the greatest calamity which the sport has suffered. Just prior to Henley and Melbourne Regattas, with accommodation taxed to the utmost by the influx of suburban and country crews, oarsmen were greeted in the morning papers with the news of the loss by fire of their boats. In all 42 boats and 200 oars, besides miscellaneous items of Club equipment. was destroyed, representing to rowing Clubs alone a loss approximating £3500. Jas Edwards and Sons, boatbuilders, workshops were totally destroyed, and the consequent shortage of boats made the question of replacement of equipment more difficult for Club executives. The Clubs who had not suffered from the fire and Public Schools volunteered to help the distressed as regards accommodation and boating of crews. With the exception of scullers, it was possible, by means of the generosity and help of Clubs, to see that practically every crew that a Club entered was boated. Boats were often made available at a distinct disadvantage to the Club lending the boat, and many sacrifices were also made by crews as regards late training to obtain the loan of boats. The general helpful spirit which existed between oarsmen in the frequently occurring emergencies was something for the sport to be proud of.

The Melbourne University Boat Club are specially thanked for their assistance to the Richmond Rowing Club. When Richmond members were "homeless" as a result of the fire, the M.U.B.C. kindly offered the use of their clubhouse and entire fleet to Richmond during the 'Varsity vacation. This sportsmanlike action of the Melbourne University Boat Club greatly benefited the Richmond executive in the work of keeping their members together.

Individual Club losses in the fire were as follows:—Richmond: 1 Best Eight, 1 Clinker Eight, 3 Practice Eights, 1 Best Four, 2 Clinker Fours, 2 Practice Fours; 2 Clinker Racing Pairs, 2 Practice Pairs, 1 Practice Scull, 2 Racing Sculls (privately owned), 60 Oars; Clubhouse, records and all rowing accessories.

Albert Park: 1 Best Eight, 1 Clinker Eight, 1 Best Four, 2 Clinker Fours, 1 Clinker Pair, 30 Oars, 1 Racing Scull (privately owned).

A.N.A. REGATTA, 31/1/27.

The Albert Park Regatta, having been abandoned by the Albert Park Regatta Committee, the Association decided to take advantage of the vacant date, and organised a regatta as a benefit to the Clubs who sustained losses in the fire at Edwards' Boatsheds. The regatta was a decided success. Numbers of competitors exceeded all previous figures for A.N.A. week-end regattas. The Veterans' race was highly successful, and created considerable enthusiasm. Canoe races helped to make an attractive programme. Spectators were more numerous than at any regatta held on the Yarra, with the exception of Henley, and was a reflection of what each of our regattas should be if members of Clubs interested themselves wholeheartedly in the success of regatta functions.

Financially, the regatta resulted in £180 being made available for distribution to the Clubs affected by the fire. This sum was made possible by the magnificent response to an appeal for trophies; supporters of rowing freely contributed (a list of donors is included in the report), and donations amounted to £117 10s. Sale of buttons considerably augmented the fund. To all who assisted in the success of the A.N.A. Benefit Regatta the Committee are deeply grateful. The profit of £180 from the regatta was distributed to the Clubs and scullers as follows:—

Footscray City Rowing Club, £47 10s.; Richmond Rowing Club, £37 7s. 11d.; J. C. Hardy (scull), £28 10s.; Albert Park Rowing Club, £23 1s. 4d.; Essendon Rowing Club, £16 14s. 9d.; Hawthorn Rowing Club, £14 16s.; P. W. Fisher (scull), £12 10s. In the case of scullers, the amount will not be paid until satisfactory evidence is produced of the purchase of a new scull. The method of allocation of the above amounts was that from claims received the Committee valued the loss of boats and oars, allowing for depreciation according to age, and from the loss as then estimated; if not insured, paid in full; if insured, paid on a percentage basis of loss as estimated.

FIRE-MERCANTILE ROWING CLUB.

On the 17th April, 1927, the Mercantile Rowing Club Boathouse was destroyed by fire. Mercantile Club had just finished a successful regatta season by winning the Junior Premiership when the devastations of fire destroyed their entire fleet and clubhouse. The loss to the Mercantile represents over £3000. The following boats were destroyed:-1 Best Eight, 2 Best Fours, 1 Clinker Eight, 1 Clinker Four, 3 Practice Eights, 1 practice Four, 3 Practice Eights, 3 Practice Fours, 2 Racing Pairs, 2 Practice Pairs, 4 Practice Sculls, 4 Racing Sculls (privately owned). The executive of the Mercantile Club has made rapid progress in the erection of a new boathouse. Already a commodious Clubhouse of modern design is practically ready for occupation. The Committee sympathise with the Mercantile Club in their loss, which necessarily must take time to recover, but the best wishes of all are extended to Mercantile for the prompt manner in which they have tackled the reconstruction work, and also on the palatial new Clubhouse, which is an adornment to the river banks.

VICTORIAN EIGHT-OARED CHAMPIONSHIP.

This race was rowed over a three-mile course from the 3 mile 2 chain mark to the 2 chain mark at Queen's Bridge on Saturday, 13th November, 1926, being won by the Melbourne crew, Wendouree second, Hawthorn third, Essendon fourth; Barwon did not start. INTER-UNIVERSITY EIGHT-OARED RACE.

The Thirty-sixth Annual Australian Universities boat race for the Oxford and Cambridge Cup was held on the Nepean River, Penrith, N.S.W., on 4th June, 1927. All States were represented, and Western Australia were the victorious crew:—J. B. Johnson (bow), G. Builder, H. V. Reilly, H. Braham, H. P. Witchell, W. R. Nunn, H. M. Wilson, F. A. Williams (stroke), T. A. Rodiquez (cox.), S. B. Gravenhall (coach). The Victorian crew finished second. The Western Australian University crew, who used the same boat as the States King's Cup crew, are warmly congratulated on their splendid performance in their initial attempt. Mr. K. A. Flavelle (Sydney) is congratulated on his victory in the first Inter-University Sculling race.

VISIT OF WENDOUREE CREW TO NEW ZEALAND.

Consequent upon the visit of the Otago (N.Z.) Senior Four to Melbourne, where they competed at the Henley and V.R.A. Regattas, winning all events in which they competed, an invitation was received from the New Zealand Amateur Rowing Association for a Club Senior Four to compete at the following New Zealand regattas:—Wanganui, 5th March; Wellington, 12th March; Picton (Championship events), 19th March. The Wendouree Rowing Club nomination of the following crew was endorsed by the Association:—R. Merriman (bow), G. Hutchins (2), W. R. B. Todd (3), J. R. Jopling (stroke). Boat and coxswain were loaned by the New Zealand Clubs. The crew left Ballarat on 23rd February, 1927, returned on 30th March, 1927, and whilst in New Zealand competed in five four-oared events, with the following results:—Two firsts, two seconds, and a fourth.

During the tour the crew defeated at one time or other all the Senior Fours they met, with the exception of the Otago crew. The members of the Wendouree Four speak in high praise of the hospitality received, the standard of New Zealand oarsmen, and their methods of training. The following is an extract from a letter recived from Mr. A. D. Bayfield, Honorary Secretary New Zealand Amateur Rowing Association, after the termination of the visit of the Wendouree crew:—"My Council are very glad indeed to have had the opportunity of having a Victorian Club crew visit us. The crew does you credit, both on and off the water, and we trust that the visit will prove to be of benefit to the sport of amateur rowing both in Victoria and New Zealand." The wishes of the N.Z.A.R.A. are heartily reciprocated, and the felicitious remarks regarding the Wendouree crew, to whom the Committee tender sincere thanks, are appreciated.

STAGING.

The staging fronting the boatsheds on the Yarra has for sometime been in a dilapitated condition, and, besides being a menace to oarsmen, was not in keeping with the surroundings. Proposals were submitted by the City Council for the construction of a new staging, but the financing of the project, estimated to cost £2360, was a severe handicap to the six metropolitan Clubs vitally interested. The Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association gratefully came to the assistance of the Clubs by donating £700 towards the cost of the staging, the river Clubs paying the remainder over a period of years. A contract for £2081 18s. was let for the construction of a staging 490ft. long, with foundations of two rows of 12in. reinforced concrete piles, 10ft. centres each way. Platform 14ft. wide, the landing edge 18in. below low water, and the upper or rear edge 30ft. above low water mark. Superstructure of 3in. x 2in. battens, spaced 1in. apart and supported on 6in. x 4in. jarrah joists at 2ft. 6in. centres, the joists in turn supported on 10in. x 4in. jarrah beams bolted to concrete piles.

The work is now practically completed, and will be ready for the forthcoming Henley and V.R.A. Regattas. The new staging will be a boon to oarsmen, and remove previous fears of danger to limbs in the handling of boats on the water front. The Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association are sincerely thanked for the generous gift of £700, which has considerably lightened the burden of the Clubs, and

also expedited the construction of the new staging.

CONFERENCE OF COACHES.

On 20th July, 1927, a conference of coaches was held at the Amateur Sports Club, Melbourne. Forty coaches, including representatives from Ballarat, attended. An interesting and instructive discussion took place as to the laying down of a uniform basis of coaching throughout Victoria. General lines of coaching were approved by the meeting, and a pamphlet will be issued at an early date setting out the principles to be adopted as a standard for the coaching of crews in Victoria. At the conclusion of the above meeting the merits of swivel rowlocks were discussed by the coaches. The concensus of opinion of all those coaches experienced with swivels was that swivels had a distinct advantage over fixed poppets, and tendered in every way to facilitate the work of the oarsman.

ALTERATION OF RULE XXVII.

At the Annual Meeting on 4th October, 1926, Rule XXVII. was amended to read, by inserting after the words "consisting of":—

"Five (5) members of the Committee of the Association, any three (3) of whom shall form a quorum. The Permit Committee shall have power to call evidence, and no application shall be considered by the Permit Committee unless the applicant for the permit and each Club concerned shall have been notified of the time and place at which such application is to be considered, and shall have then and there been given an opportunity of tendering evidence."

Rule then continues:- "The report and recommendation, etc."

JUNIOR RULE.

During the season a notice of motion was submitted for the repeal of that portion of the junior rule allowing of crews composed of 50 per cent. junior oarsmen who had already won that particular class again competing in a similar event. After lengthy discussion, during which proposals were introduced for the modification of the present rule, the Committee decided that the rule stand as at present.

ERRORS IN REGATTA PROGRAMMES.

Club Secretaries are reminded of the necessity for completing in detail entry forms for regattas. A resolution has been passed by the Committee requesting regatta Associations to report omissions in entry forms to the V.R.A., who will take suitable action against the offenders.

TRAFFIC-PRINCE'S BRIDGE.

During the year two boats were damaged by collision with motor cars passing along the road between the boatsheds and the river. The traffic along this highway has always been a source of danger to oarsmen. It is gratifying to report that the City Council has taken action to divert the roadway along the back of the boatsheds. The work has been started, and, on the erection of the Richmond boathouse, will be completed and the present roadway closed to vehicular and motor traffic.

RULE OF THE RIVER.

Breaches of the rule of the river were of frequent occurrence during the season. In view of the possibility of damage to life and equipment, Clubs are reminded that action will be taken against offenders in the future.

MANAGER INTERSTATE CREW.

The Committee has recommended to the incoming Committee that the question of the appointment of a Manager for the Interstate crew be considered at the first Committee Meeting after the Annual Meeting.

AFFILIATED CLUBS.

The 30 Clubs affiliated with the Association are in a strong position, as indicated by the following figures:—Value of the combined Clubs' boats, oars, etc., £17,000; clubhouses, etc., £28,000—a total of assets to the value of £45,000.

The Footscray City Rowing Club are now in possession of a fine new Clubhouse fronting the Maribyrnong River at Footscray. The Clubhouse was officially opened on the 27th November, 1926. The members of the Club are congratulated on their enterprise and perseverance.

Preston Rowing Club have completed valuable extensions to their Clubhouse at Edwards Lake, and their accommodation for oarsmen

of the Club leaves nothing to be desired.

The City Council has called tenders for the construction of a Clubhouse for the Richmond Rowing Club, on a site west of the Melbourne Rowing Club. The building will be two storey, and accommodation will be provided for the boatbuilding firm of Jerram and Sons on the upper storey. The members of the Richmond Club have had a trying time since the fire, and have done remarkably well to hold their members together. With the advent of the new shed they will speedily regain their prominent position in the sport.

OBITUARY.

It is with regret that the deaths of the following enthusiasts of the sport are recorded:—Mr. J. Donald, Mr. H. Lyons, Mr. O. Hume, Mr. R. Connor and J. A. Strong.

RULINGS OF ASSOCIATION.

The following rulings of the Association are published for general information:—

Competition Points: Championship events, 3 points per man; Maiden events, 1 point per man; Junior events, with the exception of Junior Sculls, 1 point per man; Junior Sculls, 2 points; Lightweight Maiden events, ½ point per man.

Method of Starting: "Get ready," "Are you ready," then, if no

response from competitors fire the pistol.

Weight of Competitors: Regatta Committees are authorised to check the weight of any competitor about whom they are doubtful, and, in the event of serious discrepancies, to report the matter to the V.R.A. for any action deemed necessary.

On Boxing Day and New Year's Day (double regattas), if a race lapses at one of the regattas for want of entries, the crews which have entered should be allowed to transfer their entries to the similar race at the other regatta, provided sufficient entries have already been received to make a race at that regatta.

MELBOURNE AMATEUR REGATTA ASSOCIATION.

The Committee greatly appreciate the efforts of the Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association in popularising the sport, and their valued assistance to the Association and Clubs. During the season the M.A.R.A. have been responsible for a number of Interstate crews, as well as a crew from New Zealand, competing in Melbourne; donation to the Association of a best eight-oared racing boat, and also contributing £700 towards the cost of the construction of a new staging for Clubs at Prince's Bridge.

SIR STEPHEN MORELL, K.B.E.

The Committee tenders its heartiest congratulations to our Vice-President, Alderman Sir Stephen Morell, K.B.E., Lord Mayor City of Melbourne, on the honor which His Majesty has conferred upon him. Sir Stephen, who has won Championship honors in rowing, and has been President of the Mercantile Rowing Club for over 20 years, is still an enthusiastic and ardent admirer of the sport.

GENERAL.

Messrs. A. J. Shepherd, A. L. Dobbie, and E. Kenny have kindly given talks over 3LO on rowing topics. The action of these gentlemen in furthering the interest in rowing is greatly appreciated. Mr. H. E. Butler, who has carried out the ardous duties of Trucking Officer for the metropolitan rowing Clubs during the past season, has considerably lightened the work of Club and Association officials in the matter of trucking arrangements for country regattas. The thanks of all Clubs are extended to Mr. Butler.

Footscray Regatta, originally founded in 1903, was revived this year after a lapse of 16 years. The regatta, which takes the place of the Maiden Regatta conducted by the Association, was held on the Maribyrnong River over a straight course three-quarters of a mile in length, and was a decidedly successful function. The Footscray Club are to be congratulated on their initiative in organising the regatta.

At the Association Regatta on 30th October, 1926, there were 49 events, and a re-row made the total 50.
