FIFTY-SECOND
ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
VICTORIAN ROWING ASSOCIATION.

To THE MEMBERS,

GENTLEMEN,

In submitting for your consideration the Fifty-second Annual Report and Balance Sheet of the Association the Committee is pleased to record further progress during the 1927-28 season. Increasing number of entries at regattas is a healthy indication of advancement. For the period under review the record figure of 3326 competitors was reached. A pleasing feature of the analysis of competitor figures is the remarkable increase in number in the Senior and Championship class. For the past seven years this class of entry has been on the wane, but this season, with an increase of 152, the total for Senior and Championship entries is 522, the highest which the Association records reveal.

Affiliated Clubs now total 31, with a membership of 2114. A decrease of 174 on last year's total. Fourteen qualifying regattas and 4 Championship Races were held, the additional regatta being the Mildura Rowing Club regatta on Easter Saturday. The Association regatta, held on the 9th October, 1927, established a further record for number of registered competitors, 423, necessitating 49 events for the afternoon, an Australian record for a rowing regatta.

Whilst the Committee are pleased with the progress of rowing in Victoria, it must be remembered that, despite the numbers of oarsmen in the State, Victoria is still lagging behind in the premier rowing race in Australia, the King's Cup, and, until such time as victory is achieved in the classic event, the work of the Committee is unfinished. The membership of the Association and number of competitors during the past eight seasons is as follows:—

AUSTRALIAN AMATEUR ROWING COUNCIL.

The Third Annual Meeting of the Australian Amateur Rowing Council was held at Tattersall's Hotel, Penrith, N.S.W., on Thursday, 3rd May, 1928. Present: Messrs. H. G. Alderson (President), E. Kenny (Victoria), J. P. Marcus (South Australia), G. R. H. Gill (Queensland), E. C. Watchorn (Tasmania), S. O'Brien (West Australia). The following office-bearers were elected:—President, Mr. R. S. Jeffreys; Hon. Sec., Mr. E. Kenny; Hon. Auditor, Mr. A. W. Massina; Delegates to Olympic Federation, Messrs. H. G. Alderson and E. Kenny. Mr. S. A. Middleton was appointed representative of the Council in London, vic Mr. C. L. Baillieu.

The following new Rule was adopted:—

“30a. When fixing a course and time for an Interstate Race, the Association making the arrangements for such race shall, if possible, provide an alternative course and time, and shall notify the Council accordingly.”

It was resolved by the Council that it be recommended to the Associations that the starter, when giving instructions for the start of a race, and when actually starting the race, shall be in such a position that whatever breeze there may be will carry the sound towards the farthest crew.

OLYMPIC SCULLS.

(Won by Mr. H. R. Pearce, Australia).

Following on the decision of the Australian Amateur Rowing Council not to send an eight-oared crew to the Olympic Games, but to concentrate on preparing and sending a sculler to represent Australia, provided a man of sufficiently high standard was forthcoming, Mr. C. McVilly, the selector appointed by the Council, decided on a test race being held on the Yarra over the Olympic distance, 2000 metres, on Monday, 24th November, 1927. Mr. H. R. Pearce (Sydney Rowing Club) scored a six length victory in 7 minutes 24 seconds. His nomination by the Council for the Olympic team was endorsed by the Olympic Council, and Mr. Pearce duly represented Australia in first-class style, winning his heats and final of the Olympic Sculls without being seriously troubled, and establishing a world's record in time for the 2000 metres, 7 minutes 1.4/5ths seconds.

Mr. H. R. Pearce is heartily congratulated by the Committee on his brilliant performance and for the advertisement he has gained for Australia.

AUSTRALIAN EIGHT-OARED CHAMPIONSHIP.

(King's Cup).

All States were represented in the King's Cup Race, rowed on the Nepean River, New South Wales, on Saturday, 5th May, 1928. The conditions and course were ideal, and the New South Wales Rowing Association are to be complimented on the excellence of the arrangements for the race. West Australia were once more successful, winning by a length, with Queensland second, Tasmania third, Victoria fourth, New South Wales fifth, and South Australia. The race was one of the finest of many memorable contests for the King's Cup. For three-quarters of the journey barely a length separated the six crews, and at the finish there was not three lengths between the first and last crews. The following were originally selected in the crew, but were unable to accompany the crew to New South Wales:—C. N. McKay (Mercantile), R. Emms (Mercantile). The crew was selected by three selectors, Messrs. J. B. Suffren, E. Kenny and E. Horsburgh. The Victorian crew put up an excellent performance in the race, despite the handicaps which they labored under in the early portion of their training, and last minute alterations necessitated by changes in the crew. Mr. A. H. Cambridge (Bendigo) again represented the State in the Sculling Championship, but was unable to pace it with the phenomenal sculler, Mr. H. R. Pearce, of New South Wales, who scored an easy victory. Mr. Marsh (Tasmania) was second, and Mr. Cambridge third.

The Committee acknowledge thanks to all those who rendered assistance to the Interstate crew and sculler, and desire to especially thank Mr. Hutton for his services in connection with the motor boat, and to the citizens of Penrith for the manner in which they entertained our representatives whilst at Penrith.

Mr. H. E. Butler acted as manager of the Interstate crew, and the Committee record its appreciation to Mr. Butler for the efficient manner in which he carried out his arduous duties.

Rowed over a three-mile course from the 3 mile 2 chain mark to the 2 chain mark at Queen's Bridge on Saturday, 18th February, 1928, being won by the Melbourne crew:—T. S. Flint (bow), G. K. McLeod, G. O. Heyward, J. B. McFarlane, F. C. Borrman, E. V. Porter, B. C. Edwards, H. Schlichting (stroke), J. Dutton (cox.), Mr. E. Horsburgh (coach); Hawthorn second, Ballarat third, Richmond fourth, Banks fifth, Mercantile sixth, Albert Park seventh, University. Owing to a dredge being working at the starting post, it was necessary to reduce the distance about 250 yards. VICTORIAN FOUR-OARED CHAMPIONSHIP.

The Four-oared Championship was rowed over a 2½-mile course from 2 chains below the 2½-mile mark in Coode Canal to the 2 chain mark at Queen's Bridge on Saturday, 17th December, 1927. Nine crews entered, Hawthorn Rowing Club winning the event for the first occasion (J. Murphy bow, V. Barker-Hays, G. Coleman, T. Wicks stroke, R. Alexander cox, G. Anderson coach), Banks second, Richmond third, Albert Park fourth, Barwon fifth, Essendon and Melbourne. Wendouree and Ballarat City did not start. Hawthorn are heartily congratulated on their initial victory in the event.

The Victorian Interstate crew for the King's Cup Race, to be held at Perth on the 4th May, 1929, will be selected and coached by Mr. Cecil McVilly. After consideration, the Committee has decided that better results are obtainable from the Sole Selector and Coach system. Mr. Cecil McVilly is well known as the successful coach of two winning Tasmanian Interstate crews. Representations were made by several country centres that representation in the King's Cup race should be decided by a system of Test Race. It was finally resolved that:—"The crew selected by the Sole Selector and Coach be subject to challenge by any combination of members of the Victorian Rowing Association, up to a date six weeks prior to the date fixed for the King's Cup contest. In the event of a challenge being lodged, the date of the race to be determined by the Sole Selector, and the winning crew shall represent the State. The Sole Selector shall have the right to order the race to be re-rowed. If no challenge is lodged, the crew appointed by the Sole Selector shall represent the State. Should more than one crew challenge, an eliminating contest to be held amongst the entrants for the purpose of deciding which crew shall meet the Sole Selector's crew in the Test Race. Except with the consent of the Executive, no member who expresses his inability to row in a crew appointed by the Sole Selector shall be available for inclusion in any challenging crew. Expenses of Test Race to be borne by the challenging crew."

PAMPHLET ON BASIC PRINCIPLES OF ROWING.

Resulting out of the Conference of Coaches, held at the Amateur Sports Club on 20th July, 1927, a Sub-Committee, consisting of Messrs. J. M. Macfarlane, A. B. Sloan, C. McVilly, A. J. Shepherd and E. Horsburgh, was appointed to prepare a pamphlet outlining the basic principles of rowing on a sliding seat. The work has now been completed, after numerous meetings, involving considerable time of the gentlemen mentioned above, and is recommended by the Association as the standard of instruction for Victorian oarsmen. Oarsmen are indebted to the members of the Sub-Committee for the time and care which they have taken in the preparation of the pamphlet. Copies are available on application.

CLUB MEMBERSHIP.

During the season a check of regatta entries and Club lists revealed a considerable discrepancy in membership figures, actually 114 members, representing a revenue of £19 2s. 6d., was the outcome of the check. It is pointed out that an affiliation fee has to be paid on all members who pay an entrance fee or annual subscription, or any portion thereof to a Club. A brief check to date on Club lists for 1927-28 show further omissions. Club Secretaries are requested to pay particular attention to the compilation of list of members.

MOTOR BOAT.

The Committee decided during the year that it was in the interests of Victorian Rowing that a motor boat should be purchased for the purpose of coaching the Interstate crew. A suitable boat was obtained at a satisfactory price, and to date has proved invaluable for the Interstate coach. When not required by the Association, the boat is available for hire to Club crews. To meet the expenses of the boat, it was necessary to circularise Clubs for donations. The response to

date, as revealed from the list appended, has been unsatisfactory, and it is hoped that further donations will be forthcoming from Clubs who have not yet contributed.

Mr. George Hutton has considerably helped the Association by taking charge of the boat and maintaining it in running order. The trespasses on Mr. Hutton's leisure time has been great, and the Committee is thankful for the services which he has rendered.

MEMORIAL JUDGE'S BOX.

With the balance of the Oarsmen's Memorial Fund, it has been decided to erect a Memorial Judge's Box at the finish of the Upper Yarra course. Mr. F. S. Nason kindly prepared plans of a proposed design, which has been approved of by the Committee and the required civic authorities. As the estimate for the construction of the Judge's Box was in excess of the funds available, it has been decided to defer the matter till early in the forthcoming season. Mr. Nason is sincerely thanked for the amount of time which he has given in connection with the work.

CHAMPIONSHIP MEDALS.

Following on representations by Clubs as to the size of the Championship Medals, the Committee has decided that future Championship Medals shall be gold and in a smaller design.

AFFILIATED CLUBS.

During the season South Hawthorn Rowing Club became affiliated with the Association. The Club has made remarkable progress during its first year, and has finished the season with 51 members. The Committee congratulates the new Club, and wish them early success in regatta racing.

Delegates from the Dimboola and Antwerp Rowing Clubs were received at a meeting of the Committee to state their case for affiliation with the Association. The Clubs are at present considering the proposals in connection with information submitted to them by the Committee.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.**Additions to Rules and Regatta Regulations.**

During the season the following additions to Rules and Regatta Regulations were made:—

Regatta Regulation 8 was amended to read:—"8. (a) A coxswain shall not be permitted to steer for any Club in any regatta or race held under the control or with the approval of the Association unless he shall have been registered as a coxswain of such Club as provided in Regatta Regulation No. 9.

"(b) A coxswain shall not be allowed to steer for more than one Club in any regatta or race held under the control or with the approval of the Association unless permission be first obtained from the Committee conducting such regatta or race. The Committee shall report to the Association within three days any case in which permission is granted for a coxswain to steer for more than one Club."

Regatta Regulation No. 9, addition to:—"Should a coxswain desire to register for more than one Club in any season, he can do so only with the permission of the Club for which he was first registered for that season, which Club shall at all times have prior claim to his services."

Regatta Regulation No. 19, para. 5:—"A Senior Race shall not be deemed to include oarsmen who have won a Junior Senior or Senior Junior race with oars in any other State."

Laws of Boat Racing.—The following addition was made to Laws of Boat Racing:—"In the event of the sinking of all competing boats in a race, the race thereby be declared no race."

Umpiring.—As the result of a controversy on the positions of Umpires at the regattas conducted on the Upper Yarra Course, it was decided that the mile course be divided into four sections for umpiring purposes, and the position of two of the Umpires should be on points determined on the North Bank. The system was tried at regattas later in the season, and proved successful, allowing greater control and minimising the risk of collision through over-zealous or faulty steering whilst rounding New Cut Corner.

Umpiring Championship Races.—Arising out of a protest in the Champion Eights race, the Committee has ruled:—"That in future Championship races an emergency Umpire be stationed on another boat following the race, and that he is to act as Umpire in the event of the Umpire's boat being unable to keep up with the race."

VICTORIAN AMATEUR SCULLING ASSOCIATION.

Due to the efforts of sculling enthusiasts the Victorian Amateur Sculling Association has been reformed. To date the new Association has accomplished a great deal in infusing interest in sculling; several handicap and scratch races have been held, and entries have been highly satisfactory. On the suggestion of the Sculling Association, the One Mile Sculling Championship was included in the Championship fixtures. The Sculling Association intend approaching several of the Regatta Associations with a view to inclusion of Handicap Sculling Races in the programme in lieu of qualifying races, it being contended that better competition will result. The Sculling Association are congratulated on their enterprise and success in the revival of sculling.

FINANCES.

In connection with the forthcoming Interstate Race, the expenses of representation in the King's Cup Race at Perth will be a heavy strain on the financial resources of the Association. It is estimated that it will be necessary to raise the sum of approximately £400 more than the ordinary revenue of the Association. With the number of members the Association has, and everybody co-operating, it should not be a difficult matter to obtain the required sum. Each member of the Committee of the Association will act as a collector in connection with the sum required, and it is hoped that the response will be general throughout the State, thus lightening the burden for all. An early lead has been given by the Nagambie Rowing Club, who have forwarded a donation for £5 5s.

REGATTA ASSOCIATIONS.

For the continued interest and money which the various Regatta Associations throughout the State are contributing towards the sport the Committee is grateful. The increasing popularity of the sport is in no small measure due to the various Associations which conduct Regattas. Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association is especially thanked for their continued assistance and in providing the opportunity for the best of the other State crews and scullers to be seen in action at the Australian Henley.

GENERAL.

At the January meeting, Mr. R. R. Sullivan was appointed as Assistant Honorary Secretary, and his work has been of considerable assistance in connection with the administration duties of the Association.

The Metropolitan Rowing Committee, which was established early this year, has helped the metropolitan Clubs to keep the sport going through the winter. The initial Winter Regatta of the Committee was very successful, over 200 competing in various non-qualifying races for oarsmen who had not won a regatta race.

Action has been taken several times during the season to impress upon Clubs the necessity for crews in training to wear the Club colors. The improvement has been marked, and will tend to advertise both the Club and sport.

Captain A. M. Treacy, O.B.E., Vice-President, was granted leave whilst on a tour abroad. Captain Treacy has advised that he received every facility while at the Henley-on-Thames Regatta, and attributed the attention to his office as Vice-President of the V.R.A.

It has been decided that the Victoria Shield, donated by Albert E. Nash, Esq., in 1899, as a perpetual shield for the rowing Premiership of Victoria, shall, consequent upon the establishment of the Junior and Senior Premiership, be inscribed with the names of the Clubs winning the respective Premierships.

THANKS.

The Committee tender their warmest appreciation to the following:—Mr. E. T. Bradshaw, donation of trophies for V.R.A. Combination Eights; Captain A. M. Treacy, Championship Pennant; Messrs. W. W. Senior and A. W. Massina for their continued services as Auditors; to the subscribers of the Association; to the Press; management of 3LO; and to those gentlemen who have so willingly assisted as officials at regattas; to the Melbourne Harbor Trust Commissioners, for favors in connection with Championship Races; to the Melbourne Metropolitan Board of Works, for metropolitan regattas and the general improvement of the streams around Melbourne; to the Melbourne City Council, for the beautification of the surroundings of the Clubhouses at Prince's Bridge.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The following addition was made to Rule 1 at the last Annual Meeting:—"In each year at the meeting of the Committee next following the Annual General Meeting the Committee shall elect an Executive Committee, consisting of seven (7) members, together with the Honorary Secretary and Treasurer. The Executive shall have such power as the Committee shall delegate to it." The following powers were delegated to the Executive by the Committee at the meeting on 7th November, 1927:—"The Executive be empowered to act in place of all existing Sub-Committees, excepting the Permit Committee also to deal with any urgent matters which may arise from time to time, and that they shall furnish a monthly report to the General Committee."

The following members were appointed on the Executive:—Messrs. E. Kenny, H. T. James, H. E. Butler, N. S. Muir, G. Hutton, C. McVilly, and A. L. Dobbie. During the year 27 Executive meetings, exclusive of Committee meetings, were held, the average attendance being 9. The regular attendance of the Executive members and their recommendations on matters to the Committee has greatly assisted the administration of the Association.
