“That No. 5 of the Constitution be altered to read: ‘The Committee of the Association shall from the members thereof appoint a Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Treasurer, and seven (7) Executive Members. Any member so appointed shall be ex-officio a member of Committee, and shall hold office accordingly until his resignation or dismissal by the Committee. Unless otherwise directed by the Committee, the Assistant Secretary, in the absence of the Secretary, may carry out any or all of the duties pertaining to the Secretary.’”
 - (c) Notice of Motion by Mr. J. HOFMEYER—

“That subject to the provisions of any existing 50/50 rule, any man of 10 stone or under shall be permitted to row in any Light-Weight race with oars, irrespective of the status of the race or the man. Further, that any Light-Weight race at a qualifying regatta shall be a qualifying race for the Junior Premiership and one point shall be awarded for each and every man in the winning crew.”

TO THE MEMBERS.

GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the Sixty-second Annual Report of the Victorian Rowing Association.

The year just ended has been a momentous one in the history of Australian Rowing, in that crews and scullers from England, Canada, and New Zealand visited these shores for the purpose of competing at the British Empire Games of 1938, which were held at Sydney. Further reference to this is made later in this report.

This State had four oarsmen selected to represent Australia at the Games, one of whom rowed in the winning crew in the Four-Oared event.

Although Victoria was unsuccessful in the King's Cup Eight Race, your Committee feels that, generally, it may be taken that the sport is flourishing in this State and that there is no need for pessimism as to the future. Criticism there is, and always will be, but so long as that criticism is constructive, and not merely destructive, it will be welcomed and cannot lead to other than good results.

Club membership figures for the year show a slight decrease, being 1,430, as against 1,475 for 1936-37. At the same time your Committee desires to point out that the figures for this year cannot be taken as altogether correct, as two clubs have not submitted any list for the year.

The number of competitors, Maiden and Junior, shows an increase, being 2,430, as compared with 2,309 for 1936-37. The total

of Senior competitors remains at the same figure, viz. 549. The following table shows the entries for Regattas and Championships for the past two seasons:—

BRITISH EMPIRE GAMES OF 1938.

The British Empire Games of 1938 were held in Sydney from 5th to 12th February, 1938. The rowing programme comprised Eight-Oared, Four-Oared, and Single Sculling events. A Double Sculling event was subsequently included as an Invitation event.

Crews from England, Canada, New Zealand, and Australia competed in the rowing events, whilst all these countries, except Canada, were also represented in the Single Sculls and Invitation Sculling Races.

Won by nine lengths, with ten lengths between second and third. Time, 7 min. 29 $\frac{1}{2}$ secs.

Mr. E. E. Keary was sole selector of the Australian crews and scullers, whilst Mr. John Rook, Hon. Secretary N.S.W.R.A., was the Hon. Manager. Mr. Keary coached the Eight-Oared crew until three weeks before the race, when he resigned owing to ill-health.

Sincere congratulations are offered to the winning crews and scullers.

Messrs. S. J. Elder, M. Gaskin, J. B. Suffren, and F. A. W. Le Soeuf were selected from Victoria to represent Australia, and to these gentlemen the Committee offers its warmest congratulations on securing such an honour.

AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS.

The Australian Eight-Oared Championship (King's Cup Race) was rowed over a course of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles on the River Yarra, Melbourne, on Saturday, 7th May, 1938. It was contested by crews from all States, and the standard of rowing was excellent, being quite the best seen for some years.

The race was rowed under ideal weather conditions, and the Starter (Mr. H. L. LaRoche) sent the crews away to a perfect start.

A magnificent struggle was witnessed between New South Wales and West Australia, there not being at any time more than three-quarters of a length between the two crews. Eighty yards from the finishing line New South Wales led by a quarter of a length. The crew then seemed to momentarily falter, and West Australia, by superb rowing, took the lead and won by a canvas, with Tasmania, four lengths away, third. Victoria, one-third of a length behind Tasmania, were fourth, South Australia fifth, and Queensland sixth. The time for the race was 14 min. 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ secs.

West Australia is warmly congratulated on its magnificent victory in one of the most thrilling King's Cup Races held on the Yarra.

Although Victoria only secured fourth place, the crew put up a plucky fight and seriously challenged Tasmania for third position.

New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia were represented in the Australian Sculling Championship, which was rowed prior to the King's Cup Race. The result was a win for C. A. Pearce (N.S.W.), with L. A. Purves (Victoria) second, and R. M. L. Ninham (South Australia) third. The time for the race was 17 min. 18½ secs.

Mr. Pearce is heartily congratulated on his third successive win in this event.

The selectors of the King's Cup Eight were Messrs. W. N. Ricketts, R. W. B. Todd, and G. M. Hutton. The selectors appointed Mr. B. S. Thompson to coach the crew.

The Committee places on record its thanks to the crew, coach, and selectors for their efforts on behalf of the State. It also expresses appreciation to those gentlemen who placed their cars at the disposal of the Association for the picnic on Sunday, 8th May, 1938. Their action in this connection is deeply appreciated by those who had control of the arrangements.

Mr. Aaron Beattie voluntarily offered to conduct a physical training class for the selected men and emergencies. This offer was readily accepted, and Mr. Beattie held classes on two evenings per week over a period of six weeks. The classes were each of one and a quarter hours duration, and that the exercises carried out at them were highly beneficial to the men concerned goes without saying. To Mr. Beattie for his splendid gesture the grateful thanks of the Committee are due and are tendered accordingly.

Thwaites; Delegates to the Olympic Federation and Australian British Empire Games Association, Messrs. H. G. Alderson (N.S.W.) and E. Kenny (Vic.); London Representative, Major S. A. Middleton.

RESOLUTIONS.

- (a) Blazers.—That application be made to the Commonwealth Government for permission to use the Australian Coat of Arms on blazers to be worn by members who represent the sport of rowing or sculling in International or Inter-Dominion contests, and that, if such permission be obtained, the Council authorises the wearing of blazers by the Australian team who represented Rowing and Sculling at the British Empire Games of 1938.

- (b) Coaches.—That action be taken by the Council's delegates to the Olympic Games Federation and the British Empire Games Association to ensure that a coach for a Rowing crew shall be regarded as being part of the crew, and that he shall be entitled to receive any awards and to have expenses paid in the same way as any member of the crew, provided such coaches are bona fide amateurs.
- (c) Representation at Olympic and British Empire Games.—The opinion was expressed that the Council should concentrate on sending a Single and Double Sculling entry for the Olympic Games in 1940, and that it should endeavour to be represented in all Rowing and Sculling events at the British Empire Games in Canada in 1942.
- (d) Levy.—That the levy for 1938-1939 be £4 4s.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

Two General Meetings of the Association were held during the year, viz., the Annual General Meeting on 4th October, 1938, and a Special General Meeting on 3rd November, 1938.

At the Annual General Meeting the following amendment to the Regatta Regulations and Laws of Boat Racing was approved:—

“A new sub-paragraph to be inserted in Regulation 2, to be known as ‘d.l.’, and to read:

‘A Senior race shall not be deemed to include oarsmen who have won a Junior-Senior race or Senior-Junior race with oars in any other State.’”

OLD OARSMEN'S ASSOCIATION.
