TO THE MEMBERS,
GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting herewith for your consideration the Seventy-fourth Annual Report and Balance Sheet of the Victorian Rowing Association.

Three new rowing events were staged during the season, viz., a regatta at Camperdown on 31st December, 1949, a second regatta at Nagambie on Labor Day, 13th March, 1950, and a non-classifying regatta at Bendigo on 18th March, 1950. The program for the Bendigo regatta included an event entitled "Pair Oared Sprint Championship of Victoria."

The regatta at Camperdown proved a most successful venture on the part of the Camperdown Rowing Club. It was well supported, a total of 253 oarsmen, comprising 27 senior and 226 junior, maiden and lightweights, competing in the various events on the program. The course is a very good one, being a large lake in the crater of an extinct volcano.

The regatta at Nagambie on 13th March did not prove as successful as was hoped, the total competitors being 128, none of whom were senior oarsmen.

The regatta at Bendigo on 18th March also suffered from a lack of support, particularly from metropolitan clubs, there being only one crew from the metropolis, a four-oared crew from the Mercantile Rowing Club. Despite the inclement weather which preceded the date the regatta was well organised and well conducted.

The Bendigo Rowing Club is making strong efforts to resuscitate rowing at that centre. That the efforts of the Club should have been frustrated by the apathetic attitude of clubs is to be regretted, and it is hoped clubs will make greater efforts to send representatives to the next regatta at Bendigo, particularly during the 1950-51 season, when Bendigo will be celebrating its centenary, and the Club intends endeavoring to make rowing a prominent feature of these celebrations.

Unfortunately, the Bairnsdale and Sale regattas had to lapse because of the abnormal rains, which caused flooding, making the roads impassable.

The most important events of the season were the rowing and sculling races at the British Empire Games, held in New Zealand from 4th to 11th February, 1950. Australia was represented in the five rowing and sculling events, and succeeded in winning four of them. It gives your Committee very sincere pleasure indeed to record its gratification at the excellent work of its representatives and to congratulate them on having so worthily upheld the prestige of Australian rowing.

A test race to decide representation in the four oared event was held on Lake Wendouree, Ballarat, on 3rd April, 1950, and resulted in a win for the Haberfield Rowing Club, (bow) K. T. Gee, 12 st. 1 lb.; (2) C. W. Winkworth, 12 st. 11 lbs.; (3) F. E. Eder, 12 st. 12 lbs.; (stroke) L. E. Montgomery, 11 st. 12 lbs.; (cox) K. Fox; (coach) J. W. Eddie. Your Committee regrets being unable to record a win for this crew,

Test races were held on the Nepean River on 10th April, 1950, to decide representation in the following events, viz., Sculls, won by M. T. Woods (N.S.W.) from R. V. Rawlins (Vic.); Double Sculls, won by M. Riley and M. T. Woods from R. V. Rawlins and K. P. Webb; Coxswainless Pairs, won by J. Webster and W. Lambert from E. R. Bromley and Spencer Grace. However, a protest was lodged by Messrs. Bromley and Grace, on the grounds of interference by the Haberfield Rowing Club during the race. The Committee controlling the race upheld the protest and ordered a re-row. The re-row took place on the Nepean River and was won by Messrs. Webster and Lambert from Messrs. Bromley and Grace.

The Australian Amateur Rowing Council appointed Mr. E. Kenny manager of the rowing section of the Australian team.

The Annual Report of 1948-49 recorded the fact that the Carrow Cup had been forwarded to the Norwich Union Rowing Club. This should have read City of Norwich Rowing Committee, which is responsible for all competitive rowing in Norfolk. A letter received from the City of Norwich Rowing Committee advised that the Right Honorable the Lord Bruce, M.C., P.C., attended the annual dinner of the Committee on 2nd March, 1950, and, on behalf of the Victorian Rowing Association, handed over the Cup to the City of Norwich Rowing Committee. At the same function, Lord Bruce accepted a trophy which the City of Norwich Rowing Committee had made for presentation to the Victorian Rowing Association. The trophy, which is a plaque carrying the City of Norwich coat of arms mounted on an oak shield, has just been received in Melbourne, and has been awarded by the Committee as a perpetual trophy for the Champion Eight of Victoria.

The membership of the Association showed an alarming decrease during the season from 1532 in 1948-49 to 1332 in 1949-50. The Melbourne University, Preston, Corio Bay and Wendouree Rowing Clubs are not included in the 1949-50 total, as these clubs failed to make a return. However, the total membership of these clubs for the 1948-49 season was 125; it may therefore be assumed that the Association's loss of membership for the season is 75. This loss is a serious setback to rowing, and everyone connected with the sport must make an effort to stop this decline, and encourage new members to the sport.

No further action has been taken in regard to the introduction of night rowing beyond the fact that the Royal Australian Engineers were consulted as to the possibility of utilising Army searchlights for lighting purposes.

The Commanding Officer advised strongly against the proposal because of the strength of the searchlights, which would necessitate coxswains wearing specially prepared colored glasses to prevent their eyesight being affected. He further expressed the opinion that police and river authorities would oppose the project as the lights would interfere with traffic on Princes Bridge and on the river. Taking all these matters into consideration, your Committee decided not to proceed with the proposal for the time being.

AUSTRALIAN EIGHT OARED CHAMPIONSHIP (THE KING'S CUP)

The Australian Eight Oared Championship (The King's Cup) was rowed over a course of two and a half miles on the Lower Yarra at Melbourne on Saturday, 6th May, 1950. All six States were represented in the race.

Weather conditions in the race were excellent from an oarsman's point of view, although not quite so good from a spectator's viewpoint, it being dull and showery. As a result, the race was rowed without any untoward incidents occurring.

The draw for stations was made at the Amateur Sports Club, Melbourne, on Saturday, 15th April, 1950, and resulted:—(1) Queensland, (2) Tasmania, (3) New South Wales, (4) South Australia, (5) Western Australia, (6) Victoria.

Victoria was represented by the following crew:—(Bow) W. Wallace, Mercantile, 11 st. 4 lbs.; (2) A. C. Kingsbury, University, 11 st. 10 lbs.; (3) M. A. Christie, Melbourne, 12 st. 4 lbs.; (4) L. L. B. Moll, Mercantile, 12 st. 4 lbs.; (5) D. S. Macglashan, University, 13 st. 5 lbs.; (6) L. E. Weber, University, 13 st.; (7) A. G. Barrett, University, 12 st. 10 lbs.; (stroke) I. G. Everest, University, 12 st. 2 lbs.; (cox) A. L. Bennett, University; (emergencies) J. Hibben, Preston, 12 st. 7 lbs., R. R. Aitken, Mercantile, 12 st. 4 lbs.; (coach) R. W. B. Todd, Banks; (manager) H. E. Butler, Melbourne.

Mr. Hibben was selected originally as No. 4, but had to withdraw from the crew because of an injury to his hand.

The race was won by New South Wales by four lengths from Victoria, with Western Australia third, South Australia fourth, Tasmania fifth, and Queensland sixth. The time for the race was 12 minutes 40½ seconds. This constitutes a record for the race on the Lower Yarra course. Incidentally, it is the first time New South Wales has won on this course. Your Committee sincerely congratulates New South Wales on its victory in this race, its third in succession, and also on the fine exhibition of rowing. The Victorian crew rowed well in attaining second place.

Messrs. R. W. B. Todd and J. South were appointed by your Committee to select the crew and sculler, and were empowered to appoint the coach, who would become the third selector. At the same time, the Executive was given the power to appoint a third selector should either of the selectors be appointed coach. Mr. Todd being appointed by the selectors to coach the crew, the Executive exercised this power and appointed Mr. C. G. Saleh as the third selector.

To the crew, emergencies, coxswain and coach your Committee extends its thanks for their efforts on behalf of the State.

During the last week of their training, the Victorians were quartered at the Esplanade Hotel, St. Kilda. The quarters proved comfortable, the food was good and in ample supply.

Unfortunately, owing to the absence of the Rt. Hon. the Lord Mayor from Melbourne, it was not possible to arrange a civic reception to the oarsmen and officials.

A picnic was arranged to the Berwick Show Grounds on Sunday, 7th May, 1950. Although the day was not ideal for such a function, all who attended spent a most enjoyable day.

Through the efforts of Mr. M. S. Williams, oarsmen were taken for short runs around Melbourne and suburbs each day. These outings made a welcome break in the monotony of training and were appreciated by all concerned.

Your Committee records its sincere thanks to the headmasters of Scotch College and Xavier College and Mr. J. J. Donald for the loan of speed launches for coaching purposes. This generous action helped considerably in the problem of providing coaching launches for the crews. No charge was made by those concerned for the use of the launches.

Your Committee also desires to extend its thanks to Messrs. H. T. James, M. S. Williams, R. W. Thursfield, A. W. McLeish, A. P. Miller, H. B. Kirsch, L. Bacash, N. S. Muir, J. J. Mulcahy and J. Coghlan for the grand assistance they gave in the conduct of the King's Cup.

AUSTRALIAN SCULLING CHAMPIONSHIP (THE PRESIDENT'S CUP)

Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania were represented in the race for the Australian Sculling Championship (The President's Cup), which was rowed over a two and a half mile course on the Lower Yarra on Saturday, 6th May, 1950, under excellent weather conditions.

The stations at the start were:—(1) Tasmania (W. A. Jones), (2) New South Wales (M. T. Wood), (3) Queensland (S. F. Rogers), (4) Victoria (R. V. Rawlins).

This event proved a most exciting one. It was well contested over the last 100 yards and was won by M. T. Wood by one foot from R. V. Rawlins, with W. A. Jones third and S. F. Rogers fourth.

The time for the race was 15 mins. 30 $\frac{1}{5}$ secs.

This was M. Wood's fifth successive win in the Australian Sculling Championship, whereby he established a new record. To him your Committee extends warm congratulations on his success.

To Mr. Rawlins your Committee also extends sincere congratulations on the magnificent race he rowed and the plucky endeavour he made to gain a victory.

His Excellency the Governor of Victoria (Sir Dallas Brooks) followed both races in a motor launch and presented the Cups to the winning crew and sculler.

Mention must be made of the action of the Little Ship Club in making available launches for umpires and patrolling the river during the King's Cup Race and all championship events conducted on the Lower Yarra.

Throughout the year they have been of invaluable assistance to the Association, and your Committee has pleasure in recording its sincere thanks to the Little Ships Club.

RESULTS OF CHAMPIONSHIP EVENTS

Champion Pairs.—This event proved to be the "problem child" of the season. It was originally decided that it should be rowed at the Colac Regatta on 2nd January, 1950. It attracted an entry of eight crews. However, owing to the very rough conditions which prevailed, it was not possible to row the race at Colac. It was then decided to run it on the Lower Yarra on 20th January, 1950, but again weather conditions ruled against it, and this event was deferred to the Ballarat Regatta on 25th February. Although the race was rowed on the latter date, most of the crews sank. It was decided, therefore, to declare it a "no race," and to re-row it on a date to be arranged. This was held on the Lower Yarra course on 11th March, 1950, when the Preston Rowing Club (bow) R. A. Stanley, (str.) N. Howell, (cox) M. Scott, won from Banks Rowing Club, Albert Park and Melbourne. No time was taken.

Champion Fours (Lower Yarra, 17th December, 1949).—Four entries. Won by Mercantile Rowing Club (bow) I. Holyman, (2) P. Macpherson, (3) L. L. B. Moll, (str.) R. Aitkin, (cox) W. Bailey, (coach) C. Saleh, from Preston, with Banks and Essendon following.

Champion Eights (Lower Yarra, 18th February, 1950).—This race attracted a very disappointing entry of only three crews. It was won by the Melbourne University Boat Club—(bow) D. Watson, (2) A. C. Kingsbury, (3) O. McK. Coltman, (4) R. W. Buntine, (5) D. S. Magglushan, (6) L. E. Weber, (7) A. G. Barrett, (str.) I. C. Everist, (cox) A. L. Bennett, (coach) C. G. Saleh, by two lengths from Mercantile Rowing Club, with Melbourne third. Time, 12 minutes 15½ seconds. This is the first occasion on which Melbourne University has registered a win in the Champion Eights.

Champion Sculls (Lower Yarra, 18th February, 1950).—Only two entries were received for this event, viz., Melbourne Rowing Club (R. V. Rawlins) and South Melbourne Rowing Club (J. Webster). As Mr. Webster did not start owing to his boat having been smashed during training, Mr. Rawlins took the title in a row-over.

2000 Metres Sculling Championship (Lower Yarra).—This event was set down for decision on 17th December, 1950. However, only one entry was received, viz., Melbourne Rowing Club (R. V. Rawlins). Although entitled to take the title on a row-over, Mr. Rawlins expressed reluctance to do this, and the event was deferred to a date to be arranged. It was rowed on 25th March, 1950, and resulted in an easy win for Mr. Rawlins from J. Forsyth (Mercantile Rowing Club) and R. Williams, also of the Mercantile Rowing Club. No time was taken.

Junior Eight Oared Championship (Lower Yarra, 25th March, 1950).—Six entries were received for this event. It resulted in a win for the Mercantile Rowing Club—(bow) A. Kohn, (2) J. Peterson, (3) F. Noble, (4) M. Keely, (5) J. Rowe, (6) D. Oliff, (7) R. Day, (str.) J. Shears, (cox) M. Lee, (coach) N. W. Cairnes, by a canvas from Corio Bay, with Banks third. Hawthorn, Yarra Yarra and Barwon also started. Time, 6 minutes 38½ seconds.

Champion Lightweight Junior Pairs.—This event was set down for decision at the Colac Regatta on 2nd January, 1950, but had to be postponed owing to the rough weather conditions. A second attempt to run it on the Lower Yarra course on 20th January was also frustrated by rough weather. It was then arranged for it to be rowed at Ballarat Regatta on 25th February, 1950. Rowed late in the afternoon on this date, it was won by Ballarat Rowing Club—(bow) J. Hughes, (str.) W. Tainsh, (cox) J. Callagher—from Melbourne Rowing Club, with Richmond, Corio Bay, Warrnambool and Banks also starting.

Champion Lightweight Junior Fours (Lower Yarra, 17th December, 1949).—This event attracted an entry of six crews. It was won by the

The first President of the Council, Mr. Erskine Watchorn, of Hobart, was also present as a visitor by invitation of the President.

RESOLUTIONS**Financing International Representation:**

- (a) A minimum numeral representative of eight be tentatively agreed upon for the Olympic Games, 1952.
- (b) The matter of finance be referred to the State Associations for consideration and further suggestions for establishing a fund to return £300 per annum.

Canterbury (N.Z.) Centenary Regatta:

- (a) The invitation to send an eight oared crew to the Centenary Regatta on 1st, 2nd and 3rd January, 1951, was accepted.
- (b) The eight oared crew to represent Australia be selected in the same manner as the eight oared crew was selected for the recent British Empire Games.

Affiliation Fee:

The affiliation fee for 1950-51 to be £10.

Olympic Rowing Course:

The Victorian Rowing Association be asked to nominate a Committee of which the Hon. Secretary of the Australian Rowing Council shall be

Secretary, to prepare a report on courses for the Olympic Games of 1956, and to submit a recommendation to the Council for consideration.

Olympic Organising Committee:

The Council vote against the proposal to increase the organising Committee by the addition of Messrs. W. S. Kent-Hughes, M.H.R.; F. Keon, M.H.R.; E. Keith Mackay and Dr. W. Chapman.

GENERAL MEETINGS

Two General Meetings of the Victorian Rowing Association were held during the year, i.e., the Annual General Meeting, on 19th October, 1949, and a Special General Meeting, on 15th March, 1950.

At the Annual General Meeting the following addition to the Rules was approved:

XXXV. The Income and Property of the Association whencesoever derived shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the objects of the Association as set forth in the Rules of the Association, and no portion thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise howsoever by way of profits to members of the Association. Provided that nothing herein shall prevent the payments in good faith of payment to any officer or servants of the Association, or to any member of the Association in return for any services actually rendered to the Association or of any allowances or travelling expenses to a member of the Association actually travelling on the business of the Association.

All other motions for amendments to the Rules were defeated.

At the Special General Meeting, the following motion submitted by Mr. D. A. Coe, of Yarra Yarra Rowing Club, was adopted:—

- (A) "That the following proposals to meet the expense of representation in the King's Cup and President's Cup races each year be adopted and enforced—
- (i) Each year £120 of the surplus revenue of the Association be reserved for the King's Cup and President's Cup races.
 - (ii) The seat fees be increased from £3 per man to £10 per man, and that it be a charge against the Club or Clubs with members in the eight, or the sculler, and not against individual members.
 - (iii) The regatta registration fees for registered regatta associations which charge admission fees to their regattas (i.e., Ballarat, Bairnsdale, Barwon, etc., etc.) be raised to £6/6/-, and that a levy of sixpence be placed on each entry fee of **all regattas**. This levy to be paid to the Association.
 - (iv) Affiliation fees be increased from 4/- per capita to 6/- per capita in the case of metropolitan clubs, and from 2/6 per capita to 3/6 per capita in the case of country clubs.
- (B) "That the Rules of the Association be amended as follows:—
- 1(a) Rule XIII be deleted and the following substituted therefor:—
Rule XIII.—No Club within a radius of twenty miles of the General Post Office, Melbourne, shall appoint a representative member to the Committee unless there shall have been paid to the Treasurer of the Association on behalf of the said

Club the sum of six shillings in respect of every member of such Club. No Club without a radius of twenty miles of the General Post Office, Melbourne, shall appoint a representative member to the Committee unless there shall have been paid to the Treasurer of the Association on behalf of the said Club the sum of three shillings and sixpence in respect of every member of such Club.

- 1(a) That Rule XXXI be deleted and the following substituted therefor:—

Rule XXXI.—At General Meetings of the Association the members of any rowing club within a radius of twenty miles of the General Post Office, Melbourne, shall not exercise a greater number of votes than one for each six shillings paid by the Club under Rule XIII, and the members of any rowing club without a radius of the General Post Office, Melbourne, shall not exercise a greater number of votes than one for each three shillings and sixpence paid by such Club under Rule XIII.

- 1(b) That Article II of the Constitution be amended by deleting the words "three shillings and sixpence" appearing in the third line and substituting therefor the words "six shillings."

- 1(c) That Article VI of the Constitution be amended by deleting the amount "£9" appearing in the tenth and thirteenth lines and the amount "£5" appearing in the sixteenth and nineteenth lines and substituting therefor the amounts "£13/10/-" and "£7" respectively.

2. That Rule VII be amended by deleting:—
"The Committee of every regatta held with the sanction, etc., etc., the sum of £4/4/-" and that the following be substituted therefor:—

"The Committee of every regatta held with the sanction or approval of the Committee of the Association and who charge admission fees to their regattas shall pay to the funds of the Association the sum of £6/6/-. All like regatta committees who do not charge admission fees to their regattas shall pay to the funds of the Association the sum of £4/4/-."

- 2(a) That the following be added to item 6 (f) of the Regatta Regulations and Laws of Boat Racing:—

"In addition to the entry fees there shall be imposed on each entry a levy of sixpence per oar. This levy shall be collected by the Committee conducting the regatta and shall be paid to the funds of the Victorian Rowing Association."

3. That Rule XV (a) be deleted and the following substituted therefor:—

"XVa.—Each Club from which is selected the sculler, emergency and/or any member of the crew (but not the coxswain) to represent Victoria in the Australian Sculling or Eight Oared Championships shall pay to the Association the sum of £10 for each of its members selected. Such money to be paid into a special fund to meet expenses of representation in the aforesaid Championships."

COMMITTEE DECISIONS

Division of Races for Maiden Eights and Maiden Fours

That if any regatta committee so desires, it be permitted to conduct two races for crews rowing in the maiden fours and maiden eights respectively, providing the field exceeds thirteen starters.

Honorary Secretary—Leave of Absence

The Honorary Secretary, Mr. H. E. Butler, was granted three months leave of absence.

The Assistant Honorary Secretary was appointed Acting Honorary Secretary during Mr. Butler's absence.

Olympic Levy

Recommended to the Victorian Olympic Council that each member of every body affiliated with the Australian Olympic Federation contribute 1/- per annum to the 1952 Olympic Games Fund.

Sale of London Boat

Tenders to be called for the sale of the Baillieu-Robinson.
