OBITUARY

With deep regret the death of our President, Arthur J. Shepherd, on 19th May, 1954, is recorded. Mr. Shepherd's interest in rowing commenced 70 years ago, when he was Secretary of the Maribyrnong Rowing Club. This club disbanded in 1885 and was re-formed as the Essendon Rowing Club with Mr. Shepherd as its first Secretary. Leaving the Essendon district in the 'nineties, Mr. Shepherd transferred to the Banks Rowing Club, of which he was a vice-president for many years prior to his death. As an oarsman and a coach he had a fine record, rowing in the Victorian crews of 1891 and 1892, in the latter year winning at Brisbane from New South Wales and Queensland. He was regarded as a coach of exceptional knowledge and ability, and was a keen advocate of swivels at a time when all Victorian Clubs used poppets. He coached the Victorian crews of 1911 and 1912, the latter crew winning rowing with swivels at Perth in 15 minutes 33 seconds, which is still the record for the three-mile Swan River course.

Mr. Shepherd was first associated with the Victorian Rowing Association in 1892, when he was elected as a representative of the Banks Rowing Club. He was elected a vice-president of the Association in 1904 and in 1944 he succeeded the late Sir Stephen Morell as President. His generosity was outstanding, and his will contains bequests of £1,000 each to the Victorian Rowing Association, Banks Rowing Club, Essendon Rowing Club and the Amateur Sports Club of

Victoria, of which he was also President.

The passing of our late President, who has contributed so much to the advancement of rowing over such a long period, as an oarsman, coach and administrator, is mourned by all members of the Victorian Rowing Association.

TO THE MEMBERS, GENTLEMEN,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting for your consideration the Seventy-eighth Annual Report and Balance-sheet of the Victorian

Rowing Association.

This has been another successful year for Australian and Victorian Rowing, Australia winning two events out of four entries at the Empire Games in Vancouver, Victoria having its third successive victory in the Australian Eight-oared Championship at Hobart, and the Melbourne University winning the Inter-University Boat Race at Perth.

The Premierships were very closely contested, Albert Park winning the Senior Premiership from Mercantile, following a season of very keen competition, during which the lead changed several times; Mercantile was again successful in the Junior and Lightweight Premierships, only winning the Junior Premiership at the Easter Regattas after being closely pressed by Corio Bay. Albert Park, by the tenacious manner in which it has pursued the Senior Premiership over the past three years, has set an example which may well be followed by all Clubs. It has proved that a Club prepared to enter crews at all regattas, and to keep trying despite defeat, will eventuaully achieve a success worthy of its efforts and the sport. The congratulations of the Association are offered to the Albert Park and Mercantile Rowing Clubs on premiership victories.

The formation of the High Schools Rowing Association during the year should have beneficial results for rowing in Victoria and it behoves all Clubs with High Schools in the district to contact the Head Master and give every assistance to the coaching and boating of the crews. This Association has already conducted two very successful well-patronised regattas, and in order to assist the movement, the Victorian Rowing Association has included a four-oared event for School Crews on the program for its Melbourne Regatta

on Saturday, 20th November, 1954.

The competition in Maiden ranks has been keen and the prospects of increased entries in the forthcoming season augurs well for rowing in the future. However, the failure of Clubs to promote successful junior oarsmen to senior ranks could cause a drift away from the sport and at the same time weaken the State's King's Cup

prospects.

With the object of providing young oarsmen with experienced coaching and competition a series of five events for Maiden Pairs was conducted during the winter period, the points won by the successful crews to count in the 1954-1955 Junior Premiership. These events were well patronised, an average of 6.6 crews competing in each event, and providing those Clubs which were represented with the nucleus of a four- or an eight-oared crew for the opening regattas.

It was unfortunate that the timing of some of our Championship events conducted on the Lower Yarra was upset by shipping movements and it is hoped that by making a later start this trouble will be obviated in future. The Association was assisted in the conduct of the Championships by Messrs. Jack Walsh and Victor Pedler, of the Little Ships Club, in Mr. Walsh's fast motor launch, providing accommodation for the umpire and a safety precaution against accident to the crews.

It is disappointing to report that the membership of the Association, after having increased last year, has slumped during the year under review. The loss of 90 members during the year is accounted for partly by the failure of Preston, Antwerp and Eaglehawk to pay any affiliation fees during the season.

It is regretted that continued indifferent health has prevented Mr. H. T. James (vice-president) taking his usual active part in the work of the Association. Since joining the Committee as an elected member in 1913 Mr. James has been a regular attendant at all meetings for forty years and was a prominent racing official at regattas, Head of the River races and the Australian Championships.

BRITISH EMPIRE GAMES — 1954

The success of the Australian representatives in the rowing and sculling events at the British Empire and Commonwealth Games, held at Vancouver, Canada, on 3rd and 4th August, 1954, was most gratifying. Only a small team consisting of M. T. Wood and M. S. Riley (double sculls); P. M. Evatt (single sculls); D. R. Anderson and G. Williamson (coxswainless pairs) and L. Robberds (coxswain), managed by Mr. R. W. Thursfield, was sent to the Games. The double scull, consisting of M. T. Wood and M. S. Riley, was successful, and a coxed four, M. T. Wood (bow); P. M. Evatt (2); G. Williamson (3); D. R. Anderson (stroke), L. Robberds (cox), won this event. All members of the team won a gold medal. The congratulations of the Victorian Rowing Association are extended to all members of the rowing team who so ably represented Australia, and to our own members, Mr. R. W. Thursfield, who managed the Rowing Section, and Mr. E. Kenny, who was Assistant Manager of the Australian team.

AUSTRALIAN EIGHT OARED CHAMPIONSHIP (THE KING'S CUP)

The Australian Eight Oared Championship was rowed over a course of three miles on the Derwent River, Hobart, Tasmania, on Saturday morning, 1st May, 1954. All States were represented.

Messrs. R. R. Aitken and R. J. March were elected Selectors, and they appointed Mr. N. W. Cairnes Coach and third Selector.

Victoria was represented by D. M. Christie (Albert Park), 11st. 11lb., bow; L. S. Williams (Mercantile), 13st., 2; A. C. Monger (M.U.B.C.), 13st. 2lb., 3; W. O. Granowski (Mercantile), 12st. 4lb., 4; G. O. V. Manton (Mercantile), 13st. 10lb., 5; W. N. Howell (Banks), 13st. 8lb., 6; J. S. Rowe (Mercantile), 12st., 7; B. J. Doyle (Mercantile), 12st., 2lb., stroke; J. B. Mitchell (M.U.B.C.), 8st. 7lb., cox; M. F. Shaw (Albert Park), 11st. 11lb., emergency; N. W. Cairnes (Mercantile), coach, and W. R. B. Todd (Banks) manager.

Victoria won the race in the record time of 14 minutes, 14 seconds, lowering the course record by 16 seconds.

The race was postponed 30 minutes because of rough conditions, a strong following north-westerly making the last mile of the course very rough.

All crews were away to a good start, and after covering half-amile, Victoria rating 38 had a length lead from Queensland and Tasmania with New South Wales a length further back. At the half-way mark Victoria had a comfortable two-length lead from Queensland and New South Wales with Tasmania and Western Australia

almost level in fourth place some lengths further back. In the rough water over the last half-mile Victoria showed excellent oarsman-ship, and maintained a rating 34, while New South Wales rated 38 in an effort to make up the leeway and shake off the tenacious Queensland crew. After the finish of the race South Australia swamped and sank while all the other boats had shipped water over the last three-quarter mile of the race.

Victoria won by one and a half lengths from New South Wales with Queensland a quarter of a length further back third, followed by Tasmania, West Australia and South Australia.

The congratulations of all members of the Association are extended to the crew and emergency on the excellent performance in winning the King's Cup for the third successive year. The success of the crew was due to the enthusiastic manner in which all members applied themselves to training both in and out of the boat. The emergency, Max Shaw, was required to row in various seats of the boat almost continuously for a fortnight prior to leaving Victoria, and while not called on to row while in Tasmania, he was as fit as any member of the crew.

The crew was accommodated at the Beltana Hotel, Lindisfarne, about 100 yards from the boat shed. The accommodation left nothing to be desired and Mrs. Ritchie, the wife of the proprietor, did everything possible to make the crew comfortable and contented.

The Tasmanian Rowing Council and the Honorary Secretary, Mr. M. Will, are to be congratulated on the excellent organisation of the King's Cup Regatta, and for the manner in which they entertained the crews during training and after the race.

The Victorian crew were fortunate in once again having Mr. Harold Vernon as Liaison Officer. He was in attendance at the boat club every day and at the service of the crew at all times throughout the stay in Tasmania. Our thanks are also due to Mrs. Vernon, who entertained the crew in her home after the race.

Thanks are due to the President of the Tasmanian Rowing Council, Mr. J. Berkery, for the manner in which he entertained all visitors and for the buffet dinner with which he entertained officials

and visitors the Wednesday evening prior to the rare.

Mr. S. Hammond was host in his home to officials and visitors with a party which will long be remembered by all. He also extended an invitation to the crews to use his billiards table on any evening. This offer was greatly appreciated by members of the Victorian crew who availed themselves of it.

A trip to the Huon and a visit over the Cool Stores and orchard of Mr. A. J. Shields on the Sunday prior to the race was greatly appreciated. The picnic at New Norfolk on the Sunday after the race, at which Bruce Mitchell, Brian Doyle, John Rowe, Garth Manton, Adrian Monger, and Max Shaw all managed to win trophies in the foot races, completed a most happy visit to Hobart.

The crew was greatly assisted in its training by the loan of the Best Eight of the Banks Rowing Club, which was of a similar build

to the boat the crew took delivery of in Hobart.

AUSTRALIAN SCULLING CHAMPIONSHIP

(THE PRESIDENT'S CUP)

Victoria was not represented in this event, which was won by G. Hubbard (Western Australia), by 15 lengths from B. Green (Queensland), with P. M. Evatt (New South Wales) 12 lengths further back third, and B. J. Foster (Tasmania) fourth. Time: 16 minutes 12 seconds.

The rare started in smooth water and after a mile and a half only two lengths separated the four competitors, but coming into the rough water a mile from the finish the two lighter scullers drew away and G. Hubbard, sculling a shorter stroke, won convincingly.

AUSTRALIAN PAIR OARED CHAMPIONSHIP

An entry of three crews was received for this event, New South Wales, Tasmania and Queensland, with only New South Wales and Tasmania starting. The race was won by New South Wales by two and a half lengths from Tasmania, in 8 minutes 44 seconds.

AUSTRALIAN DOUBLE SCULLING CHAMPIONSHIP

For the second time this event has been conducted it attracted only one entry, and was won on a walk-over by L. R. Alp and G. Frizzell (West Australia), in 7 minutes 37 seconds.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES

The following amendments to the rules were made at the Annual General Meeting held on 21st October, 1953.

Deletion of Weights from Entry Forms: The second schedule (Entry Form) was amended by the deletion of the column titled weight. Distribution of Trophy Orders: Regatta Regulations and Laws of

Boat Racing Number 28a was deleted and the following substituted:-"Except where individual trophies of a specified nature are presented by the Regatta Committee, the winners of all races shall receive orders from the Secretary of their respective clubs to select their trophy or trophies, but on no account is the winner to take delivery of the trophy or trophies excent through the Secretary of his club and upon his written authority. The Secretary of any club when issuing a trophy order shall first satisfy himself that goods to the full value of the amount named in the order have been selected and that the type of trophy is in accordance with the list of permissible trophies, published by the Victorian Rowing Association from time to time.

"In the case of regattas for which trophy orders are issued to winning oarsmen and coxswains, the full amount of the trophy money together with a schedule of all winning crews, shall be forwarded by the Regatta Committee to the Victorian Rowing Association within fourteen days of the date of the regatta. Lists showing the names of individual winning oarsmen and coxswains of each successful club and the value of the trophy due to each shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the clubs concerned by the Treasurer of the Association, together with a cheque to the full value of the trophies won by the members of such clubs. A notice shall be printed in all regatta programmes notifying the value of each individual trophy and indicating that same will be available on application to the Secretary of the club of which the winning oarsman or coxswain is a member. No commission or discount shall be sought or accepted by any club or regatta committee in connection with such trophy orders. Before the 31st August each vear the Secretary of each club shall forward to the Association a list showing the name of each successful member of such club and the type and value of each trophy collected by the member. This list shall be signed by the President, Captain and Secretary of the club."

COMMITTEE DECISIONS

Change of Regatta Dates

At the request of the Geelong Rowing Association and the Ballarat

Rowing Association, the Regatta dates were changed to Barwon Regatta, 27th February, 1954, and Ballarat, 6th March, 1954; to fit in with the Royal Visit Program.

Victorian Selectors

That the Committee will elect two selectors of the Victorian Crews and Scullers, who shall appoint the coach, such appointee to become the third selector. If the selectors fail to agree on the appointment of the coach, the Executive is empowered to appoint a coach. Should the coach appointed by the selectors or the Executive be one of the selectors the Executive is empowered to appoint as third selector the nominee for selector who finished third in the ballot.

Champion Pairs and Double Sculls of Australia

After the selection of the eight-oared crew and sculler, Clubs may nominate crews for the Champion Pairs and Champion Sculls of Australia, and the Victorian Selectors are empowered to select from such nominations a pair, and, or, Double scull crew to represent Victoria if they consider a crew or double scull nominated is of the necessary standard.

The crew or crews selected must-

1. Arrange their own finance without making an appeal to the Association, affiliated Clubs or members of the Association.

2. Provide their own equipment, including blazer pockets.

Country Premiership

It was decided to hold a premiership among all Clubs outside a radius of 20 miles of the G.P.O., the aggregate of points scored in the Senior, Junior and Lightweight Premierships to count for the Country Premiership.

Maiden Pairs in the Off Season

It was decided to conduct a series of pair-oared events for Maiden Oarsmen during the off season, points to count in the Junior Premiership for Season, 1954/55.

Metropolitan Area: 5 events to be held on 3rd, 17th, 31st July; and

7th, 21st August, 1954.

Ballarat: 3 events.
Geelong: 2 events.
Nagambie & Colac: 1 event each.

March Regatta for Henley on the Yarra

The Melbourne City Council and the City Development Association having invited the Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association to stage Henley during March as a feature of the proposed Moomba Carnival approval was granted for the conduct of a two-day regatta on the Labor Day week-end, 12th and 14th March.

Rowing Section—Olympic Games, 1956

Invitations were issued to Regatta Officials to submit their names to the Association if they are prepared to make themselves familiar with the International Rules on Boat Racing, in preparation for the examination set by the International Federation which must be passed by all officials for the rowing events at the Olympic Games.

OBITUARY

In addition to the great loss sustained by the death of our President, Mr. A. J. Shepherd, referred to earlier in this report, the Association and the sport have lost a great supporter in Mr. Alec M. State selector for five years.

Mr. R. Grover Heyward, who represented Victoria in two King's Cup crews, and has been honorary auditor of the Association for a number of years, passed away towards the end of last year.

Another old official of the Association in Mr. W. T. Wilkinson, a

past honorary secretary, also passed away during the year.

Mr. Alec F. Girling, a Vice-President of Richmond and a strong supporter of Victorian rowing, passed away during the year.

Mr. W. J. Cahill, a Vice-President of Melbourne, who died suddenly on 23rd May, 1954, was an active member of the committee of the V.R.A. from 1916 to 1927.
