THE ONE HUNDRED AND ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT AND STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS of THE VICTORIAN ROWING ASSOCIATION INC.

To the Members, Victorian Rowing Association. Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Eleventh Annual Report for the 1986-87 rowing season, together with the audited Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts for the year ended 30th June, 1987.

The 1986-87 Season was very successful in all facets of the Association's activities. The successes of the Association can be seen at both ends of the spectrum from the ongoing promotional and educational programmes completed to Gold Medal performances from Victorians in National crews at both the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh and the World Rowing Championships in Nottingham, England. The achievements of the Association can be directly related to the Association's sponsor relationship with Pilkington ACI, as the funding and support of that company has enhanced the development and indeed the achievements of the Victorian Rowing Association. The support from Pilkington ACI was once again indicative of the close relationship developed between the company and the rowing fraternity. This support has benefited all rowing clubs and schools in Victoria as well as all Association Regattas and Championships. It has also assisted members of the State Team who were highly delighted to have the presence and support of Pilkington ACI at Lake Barrington for the Australian Championships.

The start of the season was dominated by the International scene where Victorian oarsmen and oarswomen competed in the Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh, the World Championships in Nottingham, the World Junior Championships at Roudnice, Czechoslovakia, and the Trans Tasman Senior B series at Lake Barrington, Tasmania.

Australian Rowing had its most successful year ever in winning four gold medals at the Commonwealth Games, together with five silver medals and one bronze medal and in taking out the World Championship in the Men's Eight and Men's Lightweight Single Sculls, as well as two fourths, a fifth and a seventh placing. The publicity that has been attracted to the Men's Eight and Men's Lightweight Sculler in particular has enhanced the reputation of our sport to the benefit of rowing throughout Australia and all of those who support rowing.

All members of the Eight, Peter Antonie and coach Reinhold Batschi are to be congratulated on being awarded Medals of the Order of Australia in the Australia Day Honours List as well as winning many sports awards.

The efforts of the other gold medal winners in Edinburgh should not be over-shadowed by the World Championship successes, nor should the fine silver medals won by our crews; all of whom contributed to Australian rowing's finest achievement.

The successes of Victorian State and club crews at the Australian Championships on Lake Barrington in Tasmania were most satisfying. The State crews winning four out of seven Interstate Championships and Club and School crews winning nineteen of the forty-seven National titles contested.

The organisation and staging of the Australian Interstate and National Championships Regatta at Lake Barrington was a credit to the Organising Committee and we congratulate them on the outcome after having problems associated with a late change of venue. The regatta course at Lake Barrington is no doubt the best in Australia and would have to rank as one of the best in the world.

As this report is being written Victorian oarsmen and oarswomen, members of Australian crews, are preparing for international competition at the World Rowing Championships in Copenhagen, Denmark, the World Junior Championships in Cologne, West Germany, and the Trans Tasman Senior B Series at Lake Karapiro in New Zealand and we wish all team members every success. While the selection of all crews was long and exhaustive and each individual has proven his value as a capable representative, the task of financing such a team is akin to financing a large company and with 38 Victorians in a total team of 93 persons our thanks and appreciation go to Mrs Barbara Gillett, Victorian team members and other supporters for their effort to meet these costs.

The support from the Victorian Department of Sport and Recreation was once again of immense benefit to the Association, in both financial support and guidance and for this we are grateful.

Grants and subsidies were received for salaries of both the State Director and Promotion Officer, and grants for individual athletes and teams through the Victorian Sports Aid Foundation. The Department also assists your Association in the Development and staging of promotions, Level I and Level II coaching courses, a Talent Indentification Programme and the production of promotional material.

Support from the Department must be seen as changing with the Department's policy moving from a funding body approach to one of being treated as any other sponsor would be in its involvement with sporting associations.

The National Water Sports Centre at Carrum is a project in which the Department is actively involved as well as providing joint funding with the Commonwealth Government for a sum of \$3 million for Stage 1. At the time of preparing this report the actual waterway is complete with 2500 metres of eight lane wide clear water to a depth of 2.5 metres, but due to a lack of any facilities, the course is not yet ready for regatta use. Discussions and negotiations are taking place with both the Commonwealth and State Governments in an effort to obtain additional funding which is required if the Centre is to be of International standard.

Discussions are also in hand with the Dandenong Valley Authority, project manager for the Centre, to ensure that all course facilities will be as up to date with anywhere else in the world as is possible.

It is still the intention of your Association to stage a lead up Regatta at Carrum prior to the 1990 World Championships at Lake Barrington and every effort is being made to ensure this happens. It is imperative that all affiliated clubs and schools support the development of Carrum and ensure that they use the venue when it becomes available. If affiliated clubs and schools do not support the venue, it is highly unlikely that the funding bodies will make financial resources available for the completion of further stages of the development. The rowing results achieved over the previous season must be maintained and improved on and of course this can best happen if there is an international standard facility available in Victoria which can be utilised by the sport and also attract top class competition both on a National and International level.

During the Victorian Championship Regattas and the National Selection Trials held in Ballarat, we were pleased to entertain on your behalf members of the Ballarat City Council, representatives of our sponsors. Pilkington ACI, visiting members of the Australian Rowing Council and special guests as a token of appreciation for their effort on behalf of rowing in Victoria.

After lengthy considerations and efforts by a sub-committee headed by Mr. A. Guerin it is pleasing to report that as from 14th April. 1987 the Association has been an Incorporated body. Most rowing clubs in Victoria are now also incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act (Vic) 1981.

The Australian Rowing Council Inc. has had an active and successful season in the management and promotion of Australian rowing and the thanks of the Association are extended to Mr. R. N. McKay, Victorian delegate, Mr. N. F. Wilkinson, Honarary Treasurer, and other members and officials of the Council for their devotion. We extend our thanks to Mr. R. Batschi, National Director of Coaching, for his assistance to Victorian oarsmen and oarswomen and congratulate Mr. S. Gillett on his recent appointment as National Director of Coaching Education.

It was with disappointment that we recorded during the season the demise of the Metropolitan Rowing Committee, a body active over many years in the development of novice and beginner oarspeople and whose funds will continue to assist in the promotion of rowing within Victoria. However, this has been somewhat offset by the reaffiliation of Bairnsdale Rowing Club and the addition of Horsham Technical School as a new rowing school.

To the executive and members of the Oarsmen's Association of Victoria we extend our sincere thanks for the support given to the Association and rowing in general throughout the year. Their support is always so readily given and contributes towards the success of Victorian rowing.

In a number of changes to the Association's administrative structure Mr. J. Paterson, State Executive Director, and Mrs. K. Howett, Administrative Assistant, have resigned and will not be continuing into the new season. The Association takes this opportunity to sincerely thank these people for their dedication and efforts on behalf of the members for the benefit of Victorian rowing. Mrs. M. Harvey has been appointed the new Administrative Assistant and the tasks of the State Executive Director are to be divided between an Administration Officer and a Marketing/Sponsorship Officer in the new season.

Early in the season, Mr. P. Antonie was appointed Promotions Officer for the Association and under the guidance of the Promotion Officer's sub-committee has been active in promoting our fine sport in clubs, schools and to the general public.

During the season regattas were marred by numerous late scratchings of crews which in some cases rendered the printed programme almost useless for spectators as well as competitors and regatta officials. In addition there were far too many ineligible crews appearing at regattas which are inconsiderate to eligible crews who spend so much time and effort in training and competing. As well as attracting monetary penalties these scratchings and ineligible crews do nothing to promote our sport either to the public or among our own members and reflect poorly on club administration. Remember if you want your sport to be promoted and improved the matter is in your hands.

A question often asked among rowers — Who is 'the Victorian Rowing Association?"

You are the Association, the club and the members, so let us all personally strive to develop and promote our sport, whether it be by serving on a committee, assisting or competing at a regatta, encouraging and teaching newcomers or the many other facets of Association activity, for without your effort you will not exist. As has been mentioned in the past — We can't depend on Someone Else!

This season's Inter-varsity Regatta was hosted by the University of N.S.W. and conducted on the Nepean River at Penrith. The total entries for the ten Championships was the highest yet achieved and the weather, during both days of racing, was near perfect, sunny and either no breeze at all or only a slight cross following breeze.

The Harvey Nicholson Trophy for the Men's Four was won by Adelaide by 0.7 seconds from Monash with NSW 3rd and Melbourne 4th in a winning time of 7:07.

The Men's Lightweight Four for the Sir Fred J. Schonell Cup was won by Melbourne by 11.27 seconds from Adelaide with NSW 3rd in a winning time of 7:01.28.

The Carlton and United Goblets for the Men's Pair without coxswain was won by Queensland by 8.25 seconds from NSW with Melbourne 3rd in a winning time of 7:17.3.

A.N.U. won the W. D. & H. O. Wills Trophy for the Men's Single Scull by 20.0 seconds from Monash with Queensland 3rd and Melbourne 4th — winning time was 7:36.29.

The Professor Godfrey Tanner's Cup for the Women's Eight was won by Queensland by 15.3 seconds from Melbourne with Flinders 3rd in a winning time of 7:15.5.

The Women's Four for the Lady Margaret Cup was won by NSW by 8.06 seconds from Queensland with Monash 3rd, A.N.U. 4th and Melbourne 5th in a winning time of 8:07.7.

The Women's Lightweight Four was won by Melbourne by 1.62 seconds from NSW with Sydney 3rd in a winning time of 8:24.8.

The Challenge Trophy for Women's Pair without coxswain was won by NSW by 40.0 seconds from Sydney with Macquarie 3rd in a winning time of 9:01.1.

A.N.U. won the Kath Suhr Sculling Trophy for the Women's Single Scull by 4.0 seconds from Queensland with Sydney 3rd. Winning time was 8:31.9.

The Centenary Cup, held by Melbourne since its inception in 1978, was won by University of N.S.W. with an excellent all round performance.

NOTE: The School affiliation year ends 31st December as against Clubs 30th JUne. School affiliation for 1987 to April 15th are 690 as against 487 in 1986, which is encouraging enough to believe final figures for 1987 will show an increase. The decline 1985 to 1986 does NOT indicate a falling off in numbers of Student competitors. Changed arrangements for the February/March regattas in 1986 meant that many students did not have to affiliate. In February/March 1987 there was a substantial increase in Age events, which are qualifying requiring affiliation. These events were well supported by Schools with a consequent increase in numbers requiring affiliation.

FINANCE

Examination of the accounts for the year shows that the Association has again achieved a satisfactory operating profit (\$26,597). This has been utilised as follows:

There were substantial increases in the running of the State Director's Office, Printing and Stationery, but most other expenditure items followed the inflationary trend.

On the income side members will note increases in affiliation fees (reflecting increased rates). Dragon Boat Regattas, Interest on investments and Fines. In respect of the latter item, while it may assist Association finances, the Treasurer regards it as a most unsatisfactory feature as far as Clubs are concerned. Approximately 90% of the fines relate to Late and Non Scratching of crews and non-observance of the rule governing submission of Age Declarations before entry. A number of Clubs and Schools are paying dearly for something which is quite apparent; a serious fall down in Club administration.

With the recent re-organisation of Association administration and anticipated stabilising of costs, affiliation fees have not been increased for the coming season and the Treasurer is confident there should also be no need for any change in 1988-89, unless extraordinary circumstances arise.

The substantial influence of the financial support received from our sponsor, Pilkington ACI Ltd is reflected in the statements and our ability to provide funds for purposes previously not possible.

However a word of caution is necessary to counter a tendency in some quarters to relax supervision of expenditure. Not withstanding our Sponsor's contributions there are many, many facilities which would make life more satisfactory in the rowing world, if we had them. It is not acceptable for money to be needlessly wasted through a lack of thought or responsibility when such money could very well have been utilised to provide additional facilities.

As most are aware there has been an over-run in expenditure in construction of Stage 1 of the State Water Sports Centre at Carrum. It is possible this Association may have to provide some rowing facilities, which may not otherwise have been necessary. We have a reserve fund, but it is possible that much more will be needed. When one realises the amount expended by the Government on the course it is not unreasonable to expect a request for some contribution on the part of users.

We have no reason to become complacent with our present sound financial position and there is an ongoing need to ensure that all and any expenditure is justified so as to bring a tangible return to the Victorian Rowing Association.

With the incorporation of the Association and to enable easier compliance with the requirements of the Association Incorporation Act, the operational finances of the Director's Office have been combined with the General Account and the financial statements now reflect the combined Association operations.

The incorporation also means that the investments of the Association no longer need to be held in the names of Trustees and transfers are now being effected into the name of Victorian Rowing Association Incorporated.

Geoff Harris and Graham Richardson have completed 25 years as V.R.A. Trustees and sincere appreciation is extended to them for their long service. Trustees of many Associations are not involved in much work, but with our many and increasing investments, our Trustees were involved each time there was a redemption or new investment.
