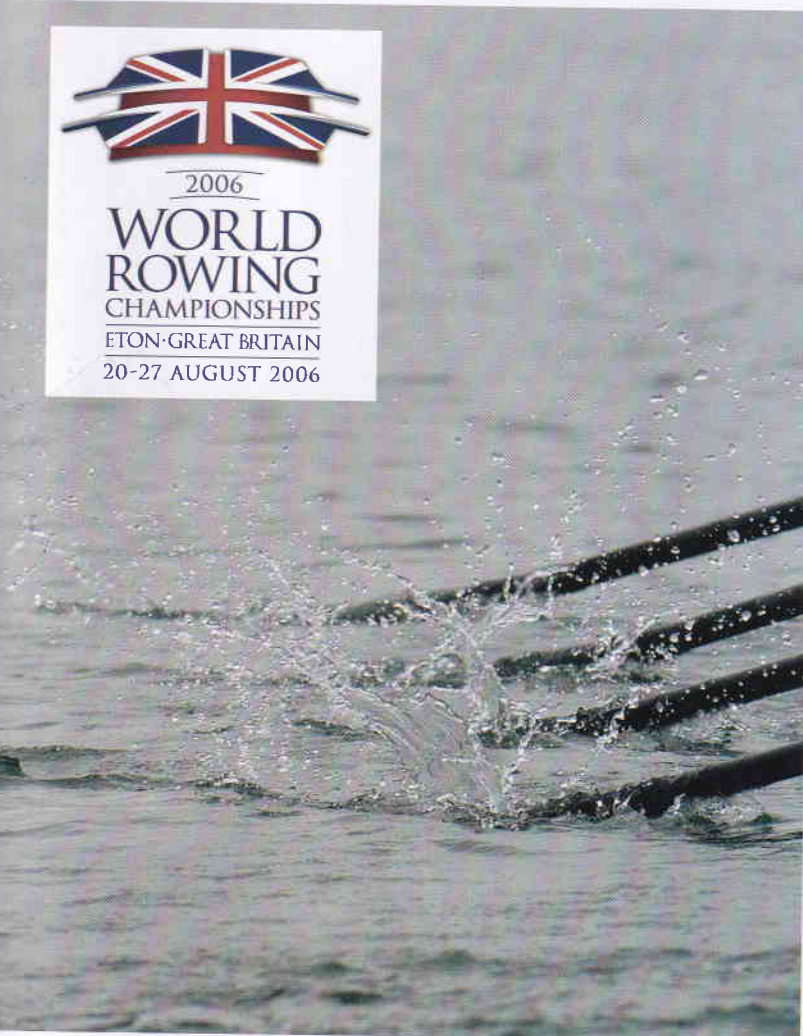

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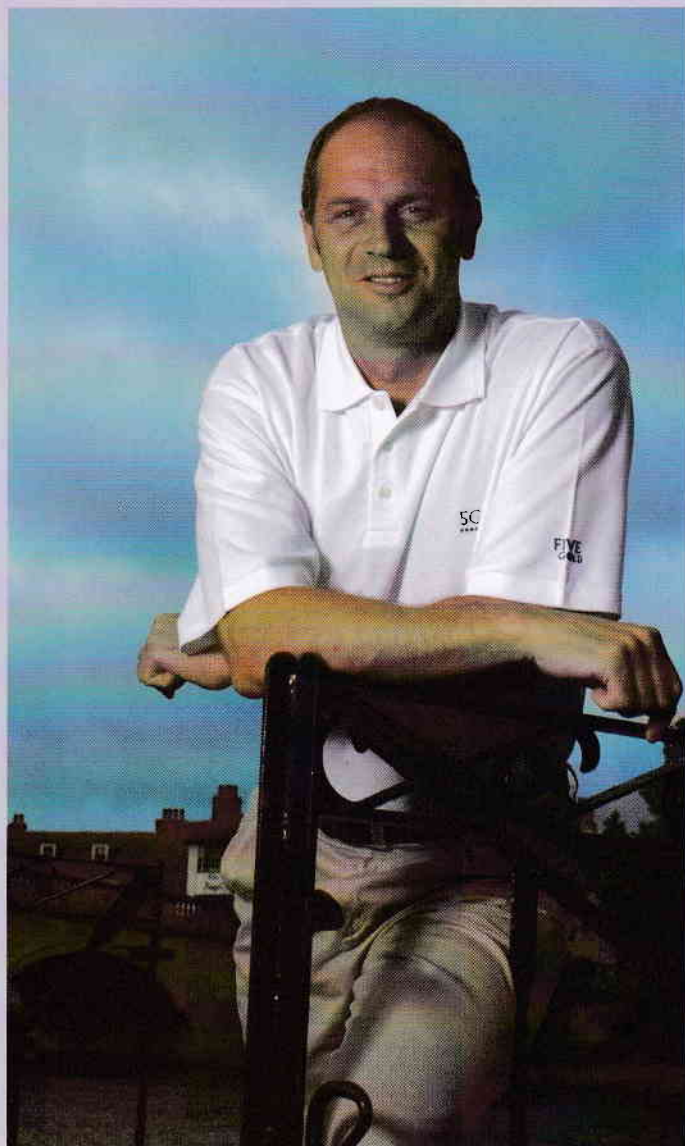

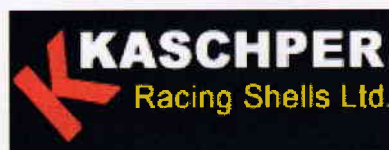
BUCKINGHAM PALACE

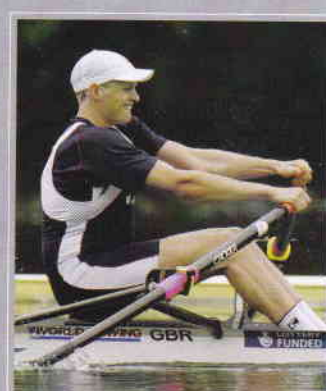
I send my best wishes to all those taking part in these Championships and hope that they have a successful and memorable time.

A World Class Success Story

 As the nation's elite sport agency, UK Sport invests National Lottery funds to support our top Olympic and Paralympic sportsmen and women and bring major sporting events to our shores. What's On & Where

Transport

Shuttle buses will service Windsor and Eton Riverside (from London Waterloo) and Taplow (from London Paddington) Stations to and from the enclosure entrance at Dorney Lake, Eton.

The bus will depart from the stations 10 minutes after the train arrives. The last bus will depart from the site approximately two and a half hours after racing finishes.

At your station ask for a ticket to "World Rowing" – this includes the cost of the train and the shuttle bus. A Groupsave ticket allows three or four people to travel together for the price of just two – these are valid after 9.30am Monday to Friday and all weekend. Shuttle bus tickets can also be purchased on board for £3.00 return.

Parking & Getting Around

Car parking is in the designated area from the Start to approximately 1000m. There is a land train that runs from the Start down the middle road, with stops *en route*, to outside the main enclosure. It then returns directly to the Start via the main road.

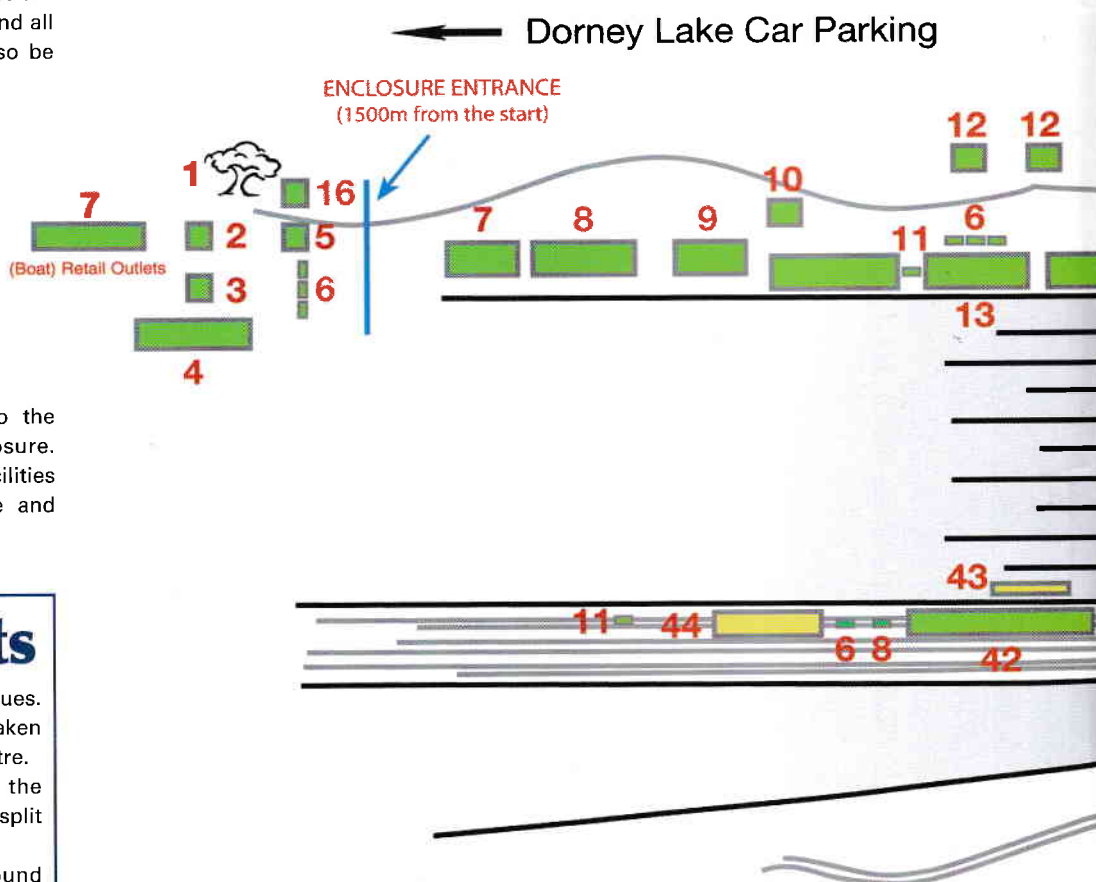
These will form a backdrop for a series of events that take place after the conclusion of racing each day.

Located in the car-park, entrance to the enclosure and inside the enclosure. Disabled toilets and baby changing facilities are at the main enclosure entrance and inside the enclosure.

- ✓ Do try to stagger your journey home. There will be entertainment and re-runs of races on the big screens after the last race and catering facilities will be open.
- ✓ Please ensure that bicycles are parked in the bike racks near the car-park and not secured to the railings.
- ✗ Smoking is not permitted in the Grandstand, Family Fun Zone or catering areas.
- ✗ Please be considerate when using a mobile phone in the Grandstand.



Results

Results of all races will be posted at the entrance to the main enclosure.

Big Screens (11)

There will be two large screens that will show live coverage for all eight days of racing with an additional screen for the last four days.

Refreshments (8)

There will be outlets selling a wide range of food and drink in the main enclosure, the Family Fun Zone and the FISA Family Pavilion. These will remain open until at least two hours after racing concludes. There is also plenty of space to picnic between the car-parks and enclosures.

From **Monday to Wednesday** there will be Adopt-a-Nation ergometer racing.

Thursday sees a GB Supporter's Club reunion.

Friday Morning is a dedicated session for autograph signing whilst on **Friday Afternoon** Rowers Reunited (competitors at past European Champs, World Champs & Olympics) will get together.

Saturday The Bridge Club (GB Olympians) will meet.

The Lion's Train, a *Thomas the Tank Engine* ride around the children's enclosure.

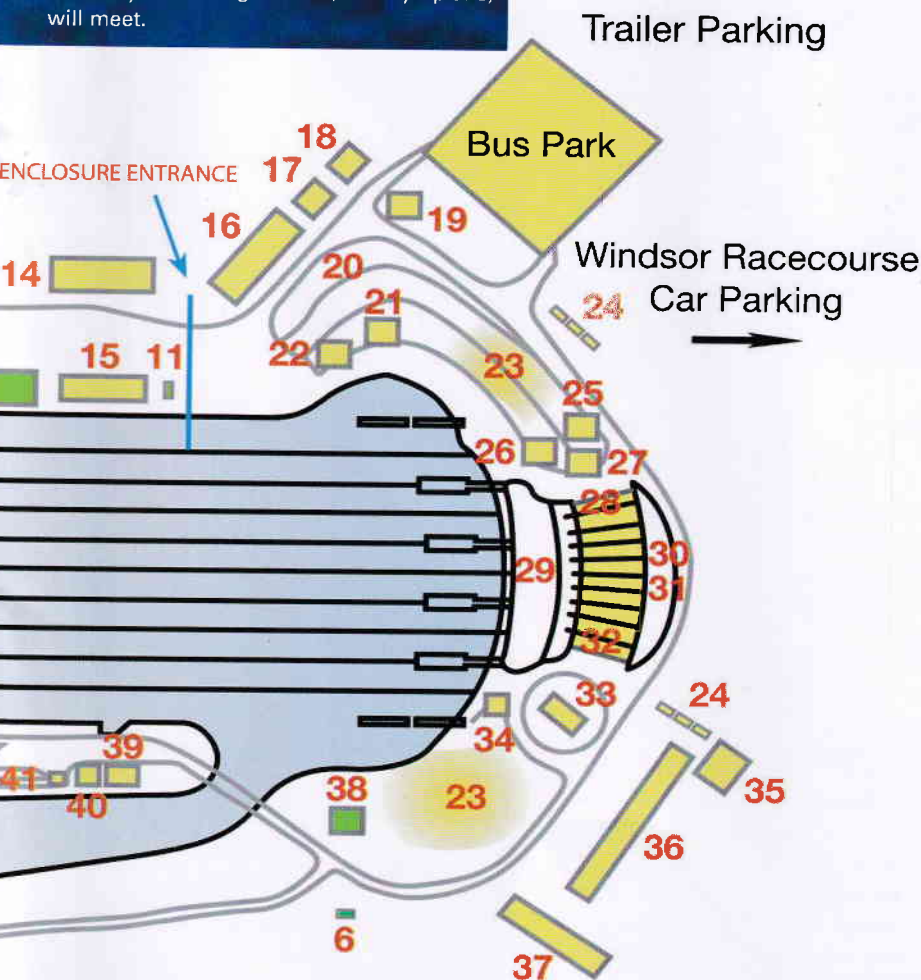
Saturday and Sunday

Around & About

When the day's racing is over why not take time out to see some of the sights that are a feature of this historical and attractive corner of England?



On the doorstep...

Just downstream of Dorney are the towns of Windsor and Eton, joined by a bridge across the Thames. Dominating Windsor is the Castle (below right), a favourite home of Queen Elizabeth II and the largest inhabited castle in the world. The town centre is full of interesting shops and restaurants and is an ideal place to find souvenirs of your visit.



The Windsor Tourist Information Centre is a mine of information about what to do in the area and can be found at Old Booking Hall, Windsor Royal Station (next to Cinnamon Café) – telephone 01753 743900.

Across the river is Eton, famed for its 15th century High Street and Eton College which was founded by Henry VI in 1440. This world-renowned school is famous for its rowing traditions and the rowing course at Dorney Lake is the product of that passion for the sport.

A short way further downstream is Runnymede where visitors can see the place where the Magna Carta was signed and visit the Kennedy Memorial. A riverboat trip from Windsor is a great way to enjoy the riverside scenery at a leisurely place. Maidenhead is the nearest major town to the regatta course and has shops and restaurants. However, if it's activity you're looking for then a visit to the local attractions of Legoland and Thorpe Park will fit the bill.

Further afield...

Upstream is the town of Henley, home to the most famous rowing regatta in the world. The town itself is well worth a visit but there's

nothing to beat a stroll down the towpath, alongside the Regatta course to Temple Island.

Henley is also the home of the *River & Rowing Museum* which is a must for anyone interested in the sport. The museum celebrates the past, present and future of rowing as well as the River Thames and its environs. Visitors to the Museum can enjoy a very hands-on experience in the new Schwarzenbach International Rowing Gallery, including *In the Coxes Seat* – a virtual reality 360° experience of coxing a winning crew at Henley. Alternatively, up to four people can get together to see if they can keep in-stroke with each other on the *Pull Together Interactive Four* simulator. There are timelines for the Boat Race, the Olympics, Henley Royal Regatta and the history of working rowing boats and their uses through the ages. There is also the history of racing boats, including oars and riggers, with famous boats including the four in which Sir Steve Redgrave won his fifth Gold at the Sydney Olympics. The *River & Rowing Museum* is very child friendly and has a charming walk through *Wind in the Willows* diorama which follows the story of Toad of Toad Hall and his riverbank friends.

Around & About



Henley

Travelling to London from Dorney could not be easier, with buses leaving from the site at regular intervals to Windsor and Eton Riverside station for Waterloo and Taplow for Paddington. London has something for everyone whether it is shopping, museums and art galleries, the theatre, the historical sites or just taking a boat trip down the Thames. There are restaurants that reflect every style of cuisine and transport around the city is easy on the buses or the underground.

Alternatively, a visit to Oxford with its 'dreaming spires' and boathouses along the upper reaches of the River Thames and Isis makes a great day out. Oxford is the quintessential British university city with its many colleges, winding streets, good eating places and pubs along the river. The centre is pedestrianised and the local tourist board runs excellent walking tours around the colleges and sites of the city.

Wherever you choose to visit, you're guaranteed a warm welcome and good day out.

Sightseeing excursions

The World Rowing Championships in conjunction with the Windsor & Maidenhead Tourist Board have put together a selection

of afternoon sightseeing trips to the top local attractions. These excursions are at special prices and include taking the shuttle bus into Windsor.

Windsor Castle – Take a guided tour around the oldest royal residence to remain in continuous use by the British monarchy. Adults £15, over-60s £14, under-17 £10, family (two adults and up to three children under 17) £40.

Eton College – A guided tour of this exclusive school gives a fascinating insight into one of England's oldest institutions. Guided tour £8.50: Entrance without tour – adult £7.50, child £6.50.

City sightseeing – Hop on and off this open-top bus whenever you want to see all the sites of Windsor and Eton on this circular tour. Adult £8, concession £7, child £4.50, family (two adults and up to three children) £18.50.

Dorney Court – built in 1440 and owned by the same family for over 400 years this is a fascinating historical mansion. Adult/senior £7.50, child £6.

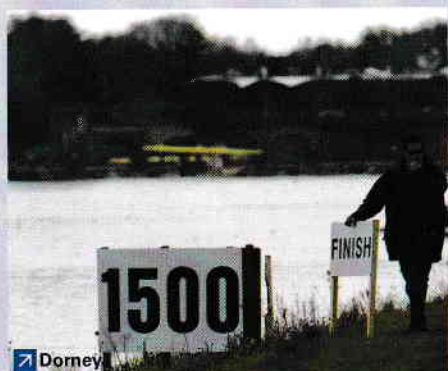
Dorney Lake

In the late 1980s Eton College made the decision to build an international standard rowing course at Dorney, work started in 1996. The aim was to provide a much-needed training and racing facility in southern England, not just for the boys of the school but for the use of international and club rowers alike.

By last year's Rowing World Cup the course was completed, the Finish Tower erected and half the warm-up lake dug out. It has taken 20 years to complete the project, 10 years of planning and 10 years of construction. Dorney Lake is a state-of-the-art rowing course with all the facilities that an athlete could require.

Dorney facts

- It's the venue for both the rowing and flat-water canoeing events at the London 2012 Olympics.
- The course was opened in June 2000 by Kate Hoey MP, the then Minister for Sport.
- 4,000,000 tonnes of gravel has been extracted from the site.
- The first regatta was held in 2001 over 1000m using six lanes.
- The first 2000m races were held in 2003 over seven lanes.
- In 2004 all eight lanes were available.
- Over 100 schools and clubs use the facilities.
- It is host to 10 triathlons.
- The Lake is full of carp to keep the weeds down, but the fish have to be bought big enough to stop cormorants eating them!

Siemens Championship Radio

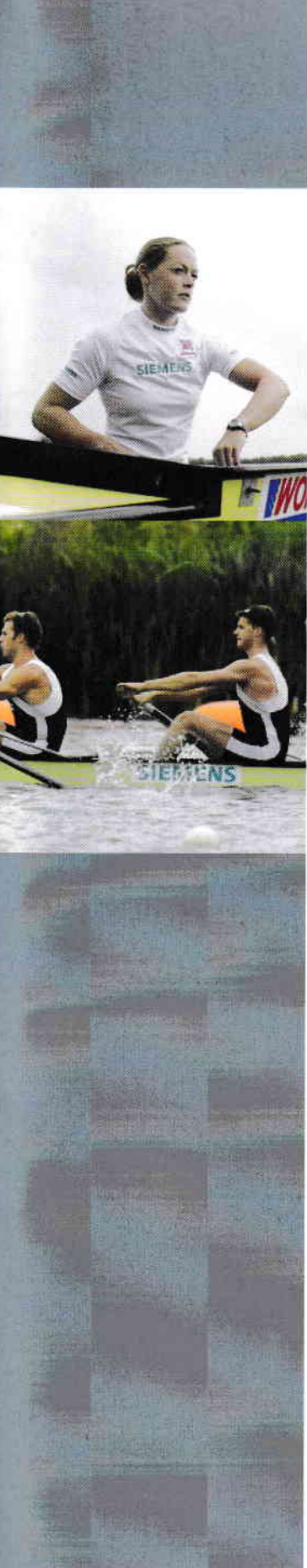
The World Rowing Championships has its own radio station operating for the last four days of the regatta, 24-28 August.

Siemens Championship Radio will be feeding the main course commentary to those around the course who have the special regatta headsets. These are free to all eight-day ticket holders and members of the FISA family. They will also be available for purchase at a price of £7. The radio carries five channels of commentary in five languages – English, French, German, Spanish and Russian.

The radio will broadcast within a radius of 5 to 10 miles around the course on 87.70 FM and will be including traffic reports before and after the racing. As well as commentary there will also be interviews with team managers and up-to-date information on the day's events. Broadcasting starts at 8am and finishes a couple of hours after the last race.

At this, the second World Rowing Championships since the Olympics, national squads are beginning to formalise crews for Beijing 2008. This means that spectators benefit from great rowing as the athletes contend for their 'seats'.

This year's Rowing World Cup (RWC) events have been fascinating with experienced rowers battling against the new blood, winners who have come out of nowhere and the expected Yellow Jersey wearers who failed to impress. At the last RWC in Lucerne in early July it became apparent who the contenders will be – or we *think* will be – for medals at these Championships.

Women's Single Scull (W1x)

Ekaterina Karsten of **Belarus** hasn't lost a race since the 2004 Olympics, but Mirka Knappkova of the **Czech Republic** is continually pushing her. Behind them are two others; Julia Levina of **Russia** – who was in the Quad at the last two Olympics, moving to the Single last year and finishing sixth in Gifu – and Frida Svensson of **Sweden**, who gave Karsten a run for her money at the Dutch Holland Beker Regatta. Sophie Balmory from **France** and Peggy Waleska of **Germany** should not be ruled out for a place – and look out for World Bronze medallist Michelle Guerette of the **United States**.

Men's Single Sculls (M1x)

An interesting field with a strong contender from **GB** in Alan Campbell plus his training partner at Tideway Scullers, Mahe Drysdale from **New Zealand**. Many have hyped this up as a battle between the two but, as the results from Lucerne show, it's not a done deal. Olaf Tuft, Olympic Champion from **Norway**, took the honours at Lucerne, with Drysdale taking Silver and Ondrej Synek of the **Czech Republic** the Bronze. Campbell, rowing with borrowed blades, came in fourth which proved enough to be overall World Cup Champion.

Lightweight Men's Single Sculls (LM1x)

With a Gold medal at the World Rowing Under-23 Championships and now a Gold at Lucerne, 20-year-old Zac Purchase is a **GB** rising star. He leads the field at the moment with Juan Zunzunegui Guimerans of **Spain** and Douglas Vandor of **Canada** five seconds behind him at the last RWC.

Women's Pair (W2-)

Megan Cooke & Anna Mickelson of the **United States** are in their first season together and are out of the stable of coach Tom Terhaar, known for turning US collegiate athletes into international rowers. They dominated at Lucerne with Nicole Zimmermann & Elke Hipler from **Germany** in Silver and Annemarijke Van Rump & Annemiek de Haan of **The Netherlands** in Bronze. Nicky Coles & Juliette Haigh of **New Zealand** could also be strong contenders.

Men's Pair (M2-)

World Champions Nathan Twaddle & George Bridgewater of **New Zealand** are used to being in the medals but are now battling with Henley Royal Regatta winners Colin Smith & Tom James of **GB**, thrown together just weeks ago after finishing their exams – one at Oxford, one Cambridge University. At Lucerne it was Gold to the Kiwis, Silver to the Brits with Germany way back in third. However, out of the picture at Lucerne were the Gold and Silver medallists from the Poznan Rowing World Cup, **Australia** and **Serbia & Montenegro**. Also worth watching are the pair from **Croatia** – Niksa, the younger Skelin brother, teamed with Milan Razov from the Eight.

Women's Double Sculls (W2x)

For some years the **New Zealand** twins, Georgina & Caroline Evers-Swindell, have dominated this event but Annie Vernon & Anna Bebington of **GB** top the list as this year's RWC Champions. This is the first

season together for the two 23 year-olds, who are a product of the British talent identification programme. The Kiwis took Gold at Lucerne by the skin of their teeth with GB second and two-time Olympians Volha Berazniova & Yuliya Bichyk of **Belarus** third. Jitka Antosova & Gabriela Varekova of the **Czech Republic** finished fourth, having moved up from Juniors.

Men's Double Sculls (M2x)

World Champions from **Slovenia**, Iztok Cop & Luka Spik have not had a good season and lost to Matt Wells & Stephen Rowbotham of **GB** at Henley Royal Regatta. At Lucerne the Slovenians kept the stroke rate high and won, the British charged to take Silver with the duo of Adrien Hardy & Jean-Baptiste Macquet from **France** getting the Bronze. Akos Haller & Tibor Peto of **Hungary** and the accomplished Rene Bertram & Robert Sens from **Germany** cannot be ruled out.

Men's Four (M4-)

The **GB** Four of Alex Partridge, Steve Williams, Peter Reed & Andy Hodge have never lost a race since coming together after the 2004 Olympics. They are the GB flagship crew coached by Jurgen Grobler. Their main rivals are crews from **The Netherlands** and **Germany** who took Silver and Bronze respectively at Lucerne. **Slovenia** and a new-look **New Zealand** crew are also in the battle for medals.

Lightweight Women's Double Sculls (LW2x)

Tracy Cameron & Mara Jones of **Canada** look like the crew to beat. Lucerne was their first time racing together and they lead from the start. The double from **Finland**, Sanna Sten & Minna Nieminen took Silver from the **US** duo of Renee Hykel & Julia Nichols

in third. Sinead Jennings & Niamh Ni Cheilleachair from **Ireland** were a close fourth. However, the double from **China** weren't at Lucerne yet could be in medal contention at Dorney.

Lightweight Men's Double Sculls (LM2x)

Elia Luini & Marcello Miani represent **Italy** and Luini has been in the medals at every international competition (except the Athens Olympics) since becoming a senior in 1998. Mads Rasmussen & Rasmus Quist of **Denmark**, who have been together for six years, battled the Italians for Gold at Lucerne but had to settle for Silver. Vasileios Polymeros & Dimitrios Mougios from **Greece** continue improving and sprinted past the World Champions from **Hungary** to take the Bronze medal

Lightweight Men's Four (LM4-)

The crew of Gearoid Towey, Eugene Coakley, Richard Archibald & Paul Griffin from **Ireland** are the ones to beat, with the current World Champions from **France** and the **German** crew hot on their canvas. **Egypt** made history this season by winning bronze at one RWC and hope to better that at Dorney.

Women's Quadruple Sculls (W4x)

The **GB** combination of Debbie Flood, Sarah Winckless, Frances Houghton & two-time Olympic medallist Katherine Grainger have triumphed this year, despite a wake-up call from **China** early in the season. At Lucerne they took Gold and the RWC Championship with a gutsy **German** crew in second and the **Russians** third. At Dorney, crews from **China** and **Denmark** could also be in the medals.

Men's Quadruple Sculls (M4x)

This is an open race with current World Champions **Poland** and Poznan Silver medallists **France** up against the medallists from Lucerne – **Czech Republic** took Gold, **Germany** the Silver and the **US** (with Olympic Champion from the Eight, Wyatt Allen) taking Bronze.

Women's Eight (W8+)

The **US** crew that won at Henley Royal Regatta were expected to triumph at Lucerne but had to settle for Silver behind a very strong and talented crew from **Romania**. **Germany** took the Bronze and are likely to find themselves battling with eights from **GB** and **China** at Dorney for the lower rankings.

Men's Eight (M8+)

The Eight from **Germany** has seen many changes this season and now in the powerhouse are former Cambridge University rowers Thorsten Engelmann, Sebastian Schulte & Bernd Heidicker. **Italy** has also had an overhaul but **Poland** kept its crews intact. At Lucerne this resulted in Germany taking Gold, Italy the Silver and Poland Bronze. The **GB** Eight made it into the 'A' final but has a long way to go to match the success in Sydney.

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Adaptive Rowing Takes Centre Stage



A record number of Adaptive athletes from over 16 different countries are expected to compete at Dorney Lake during the last three days of the World Rowing Championships. Adaptive Rowing is going from strength to strength and, since the first World Rowing Championships in 2002, the number of athletes and nations competing in these events has seen a steady increase. The recent inclusion of Adaptive Rowing in the Paralympic Games has given the sport an even greater boost.

Adaptive Rowing is for athletes with sensory, intellectual or physical disabilities – eligibility is assessed to see which classification they will row under. Based on their level of ability, athletes are matched in three classes:

Legs-trunk-arms (LTA) athletes who can use their legs, trunk and arms for rowing, but are at a significant disadvantage compared to able-bodied rowers. Typically

this class includes rowers with visual impairment, intellectual impairment or minimal physical impairment.

Trunk-arms (TA) athletes who can use their trunk and arms for rowing. They use a fixed seat. Most in this class have lost leg function as a result of an amputation, spinal cord injury or cerebral palsy.

Arms only (A) athletes who use their shoulders and arms for rowing. They also row with fixed seats. The majority of these rowers have a spinal cord injury or cerebral palsy.

These examples of disabilities are only an indication since the level of ability (and not disability) determines the competition class. FISA has established a comprehensive classification system that ensures that athletes of similar abilities compete in the same class and that competitions are as fair as possible. The principles of this system can be compared

to the lightweight vs heavyweight classes in able-bodied rowing.

At the World Championships there are four Adaptive events:

Mixed Gender Coxed Four for LTA athletes (LTA4+): 2 female LTA athletes and 2 male LTA athletes + cox.

Mixed Gender Double for TA athletes (TA2x): Female TA sculler and male TA sculler.

Male Single for A athletes (A1xM).

Female Single for A athletes (A1xF). This is the first year of this category at the World Rowing Championships.

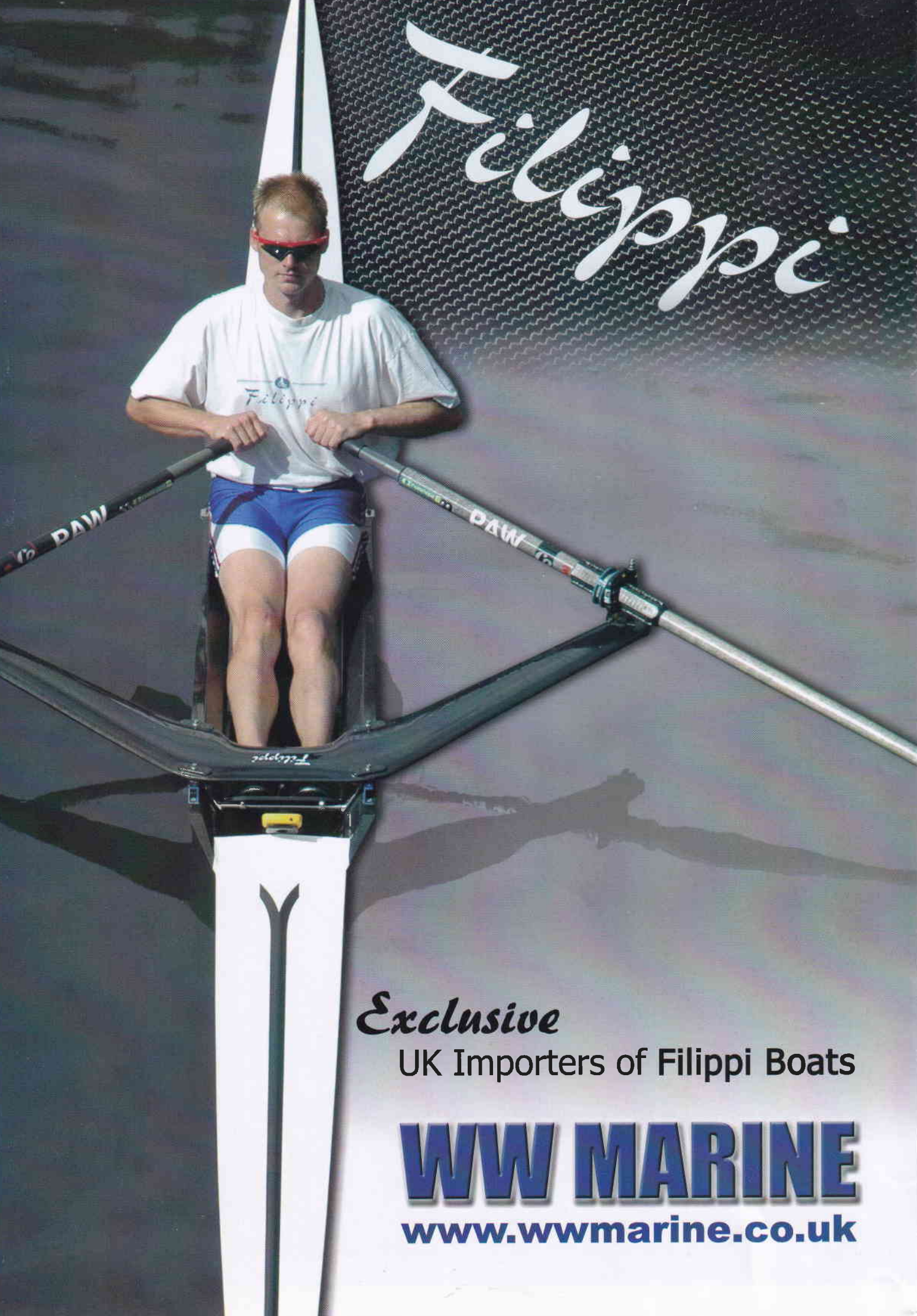
All Adaptive events take place over 1000m from a free-flowing start.

The Ones to Watch

In the LTA4+ event, the GB crew of Alan Crowther, Alistair McKean, Katie George Dunlevy and Vicki Hansford with cox Alan Sherman has a very good track record taking Gold in 2003, 2004 and 2005. However, this year crews from The Netherlands, Australia, US and Portugal are all strong so it should be a good race. The US pair of Scott Brown and Angela Madsen has dominated the TA2x event over the past few years but there is a good double from Poland in contention. Australian Dominic Moneypenny is strong in the A1xM class but Ron Harvey of the US has him in his sights.

The newly gained Paralympic status has resulted in such a huge upsurge in the number of competing crews, and their quality, that it is increasingly difficult to predict the winners. One thing is certain though, the Adaptive athletes will provide spectators with exciting races and close finishes.

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Taking that first stroke...

With all the interest that has been generated in the UK around these World Rowing Championships, there are many people asking what they can do to take up the sport.

The ARA recognised that the Championships would stir up interest in rowing and have been working on developing a *Learn to Row* (LTR) programme in clubs all around the country. It has been keen to get away from the stereotypical image of an oarsman – private school and Oxbridge – and to show that the sport really is the ideal exercise for people of all ages and abilities and from every walk of life. Clubs have also realised that they have to be active to attract new members – and that there's an untapped pool of adults out there, such as ergo users at the gym, who could be interested in joining a rowing club given the right approach.

The first stop for a potential new recruit is to contact their nearest rowing club – all affiliated clubs are listed on the ARA's website (www.ara-rowing.org). Most clubs have websites which carry details of LTR

programmes, how to join, what activities are scheduled and relative costs.

Closest to Dorney is Eton Excelsior Rowing Club which has a very informative website. They run courses for complete beginners, have recreational rowing for more experienced adults as well as Junior LTR courses. Kath Everard, Membership Secretary, provides the point of contact for all courses and encourages people to discuss a suitable programme with her. "We've run two very successful courses so far and could have run more as the interest meant we were over-subscribed," commented Kath. "It has proved successful for the club as over 70% of these novices have chosen to stay on over the summer to practice before joining a regular crew in the autumn."

The Club also runs a popular Pubs & Clubs Regatta; this year on 3rd September, it's a fun event for crews of four non-rowers who have up to five training sessions before the event. It gives complete novices a taste of how to row and is a great way to attract new members. Marlow Rowing Club will be

holding a similar event, called the First Row Challenge, on the 10th September.

Just upstream of Dorney, Maidenhead Rowing Club have been successfully running LTR courses for a few years. On average they run five courses a year and in the past two years every course has been filled. During May novices from BBC Radio Berkshire and the Slough Observer joined one of these courses to see what rowing was like prior to covering the Championships.

In Peterborough, Steve Brown – ARA Coaching & Development Officer but working as a volunteer – has been running LTR courses with juniors the past four years. When the scheme was extended for adults he saw no reason to change the format of the course and the current participants have had great fun swapping boats mid-stream, holding backing down races and learning balance by standing up in the boats. Steve believes that those who get on best at these courses have experienced other balance sports such as skiing, sailing and gymnastics. He found that the courses fill up quite quickly by word-of-mouth and could run more sessions than he has time for. The age range of the participants is wide, from 17 to over 50, as are their backgrounds. "One pair of early 20s car mechanics found the concept of not smoking between sessions a bit strange," commented Steve, "but they were quite happy to comply when they realised that they were being taken seriously as sportsmen."

At Tees Rowing Club they've found that being at the River Tees Watersports Centre has been the catalyst for expansion. "We've had an upsurge of people joining the LTR scheme as we now have pedestrians passing the boathouse doors and looking in to see what's going on," said Robert Cree, ARA Coaching Development Officer. "These are people who wouldn't normally consider rowing but want to give it a try and we're getting 30 to 40 per year coming through." At Tees they put the onus on the novices themselves to organise the crews and the coaches, which gives them ownership of their own programme. They are then encouraged by the Club's squad system to progress from novice through intermediate to senior squad if they wish to.

The LTR courses are proving popular in the clubs currently running them and the ARA has prepared a full pack of information to help any club that wants to start the scheme which can be downloaded from the website at www.ara-rowing.org

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Adopt-a-Nation



One of the most successful aspects of the Rowing World Cup held at Dorney Lake in 2005 was the *Adopt-a-Nation* scheme. Youngsters from schools local to Dorney Lake came to the regatta to encourage the competitors from other nations as well as the UK. The scheme involved the children learning about their adopted country before coming to the World Cup, making banners and flags and then shouting for their crews on the day.

This came as quite a surprise to some of the crews. They had travelled across the world without any supporters and suddenly found that they had encouragement from the bank. It proved very popular, giving the early stages of the competition an added air of excitement. It was, therefore, decided to expand the scheme for the World Rowing Championships so that it wasn't just restricted to youngsters in the immediate vicinity of Dorney Lake.

The take-up by schools and groups around the country has been fantastic and there are over 50 schemes around the country from Norwich and Peterborough to Avonmouth and Southampton. Each school or group has picked a country (or countries) to study that either falls within the curriculum or has a specific interest to members of the group. Some have chosen their country to reflect the ethnic mix of the group whilst others have chosen one that they expect to find interesting.

At Teddington School in South-West London, which has links with Walbrook Rowing Club and where ex-GB international Richard Hardy is a member of staff, they decided to use the *Adopt-a-Nation* scheme to give years seven, eight and nine a project to do during their 'Timetable Breakout' week. This is a time when the students work amongst themselves over a few days whilst their classmates are called out one by one to assess targets with their tutor. As the scheme was spread across so many classes Teddington chose to study seven nations: Poland, Australia, Finland, Slovenia, China, Italy and Norway.

The students had access to all the resources within the school to prepare an A3 size poster with all the information they found that reflects the history, background and cultural aspects of each chosen country. These posters were then displayed in the school.

Those taking part in the scheme were offered the opportunity to come to Dorney at the end of August to support the crews racing from the countries of their choice. As the Championships are during the holiday period, Teddington – like other schools – not only had to get to the pupils to commit to coming to Dorney but also to ensure there were enough helpers available. As some of the students row at local clubs, the school and clubs joined forces to ensure there would be support for their chosen countries.

The enthusiasm shown by the students doing the project at Teddington was a great endorsement of the scheme and it was good to see cross-curriculum learning based around a major sporting event.

Because so many schools are closed during August, it is the groups that come from outside the school network that may be providing the most enthusiastic supporters during the early days of the Championships. One area where a lot of supporters will be travelling from is Southampton, where Gus McKechnie and ARA Community Sports Coach Laura Wheeler have been busy getting together groups of youngsters from rowing clubs and schemes to join the *Adopt-a-Nation* scheme. The clubs that are involved are Ryde, Coalport, Itchen, Southampton and BTC RC. On 9th August, 66 children from these clubs will get together to prepare banners and chants for when they are at Dorney supporting their chosen countries, Japan and New Zealand.

Gus has found that activities like this are great at getting social interaction between the clubs in his area and last year he also arranged the Southern Indoor Rowing Championships with over 400 children taking part.

Whilst the groups are at the World Rowing Championships they will have the opportunity to take part in ergometer racing, keep fit circuits with ex-breakfast TV presenter Lizzie Webb and international craft sessions.

The *Adopt-a-Nation* scheme has captured the imagination of children and their teachers alike as it provides an interesting slant on studying another culture. It is expected that programmes such as this one will become even more popular for the London Olympics in 2012.





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Getting the Show on the Water



Putting a World Rowing Championships together is a bit like one of the swans that glide past on the Thames – serene on the surface but paddling like mad out of sight.

What the athletes and spectators don't necessarily realise is that work started from the moment the bid to hold the event was successful, back in 2002 – and it's been rising in intensity ever since. It also isn't well-known that it's mostly been achieved by a team of dedicated volunteers who have given up their leisure time over the past three or more years to ensure that the best possible World Rowing Championships takes place at Dorney Lake.

Volunteering has a long tradition within the world of rowing, so when the call went out for help at both events the response was immediate. Over 300 people were on hand to help out at the Rowing World Cup and more than 700 have signed on for these Championships. Of that number around 50 people have been meeting, phoning and e-mailing each other virtually every day to make sure that no stone is left unturned.

There are the backroom boys who have been working on IT and making sure the website is kept up-to-date. There have been the upfront girls (with apologies to the men on the team!) who have been working in marketing and media to ensure the message that the World Rowing Championships was coming to Dorney reached the maximum number of people.

Having a Royal Patron meant that the protocol and hospitality team were liaising with the Palace, whilst the health and safety team have made sure that every eventuality has been covered. Those with responsibility for Adaptive Rowers made detailed plans so that all disabilities are catered for on-site.

Many of these teams found aspects of their remit crossed with others – such as the spectators' services team, the transport organisers and the Supporters Club co-ordinators – and so the e-mail list and number of meetings grew.

There has been a series of volunteer training days where all the team leaders have been on hand to meet the volunteers, old and new, to make sure they know both the site and their role well before the Championships started.

There are also the Junior Official volunteers from local schools and clubs who have been giving up their time to train hard to help out at the start. Their timetable had to be planned carefully around school commitments to ensure everyone got the right amount of training in before the Championships started.

And now at the event all 700 volunteers are on-site to do their best to make sure that the racing runs smoothly, the spectators have a great time and that the rowers have everything they need to make it a truly "athletes' championships"...

"We couldn't have done it without our volunteers," said Mike Baldwin, Chairman of the Organising Committee. "Two years ago we knew that we had to get the best people for each job on board if we were to succeed in our aim to make this a Championships to remember – and we did. The Organising Committee would like to thank each and every volunteer for the time they have given up to this event – those who have been in it for the long term and those who are helping out at Dorney during the weeks of training and racing. Everyone has had a part to play in making this a successful event and if our volunteers are anything to go by visitors to the Olympics in London 2012 will be well looked after."

"But this is what we in Britain do well – respond to the call and get on with the job. We just hope that all the paddling that has been going on over the past 15 months turns into an exciting and enjoyable World Rowing Championships for athletes and spectators alike."

Here cardboard, steel, aluminium and some plastics are separated ready for baling and their onward journey to a re-processing plant which handles approximately 50,000 tonnes of waste per year, reclaiming up to 40% of the throughput.

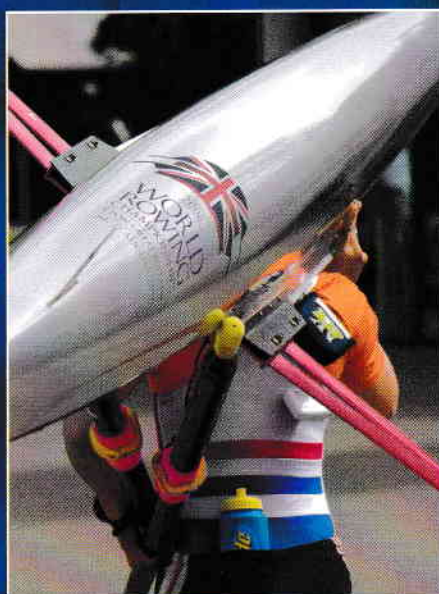

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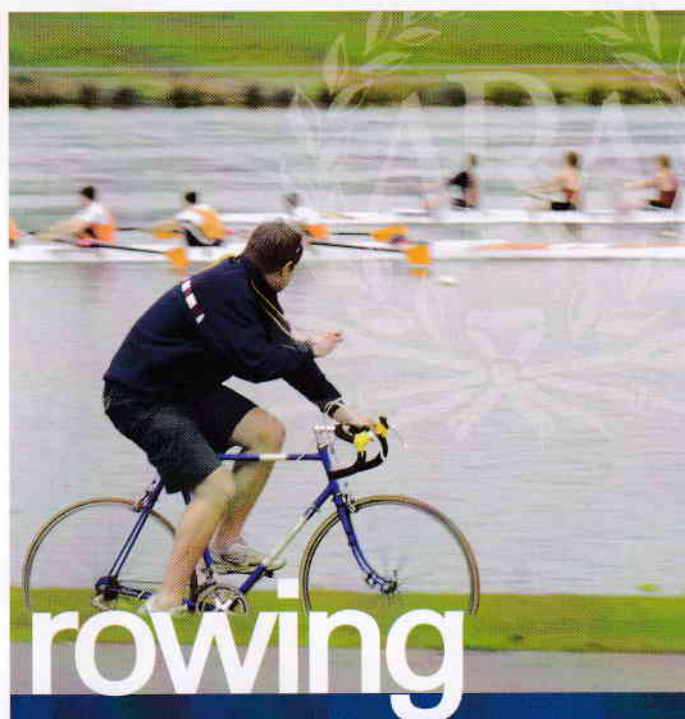
